Lighthouse MI was established in 2019 when Lighthouse of Oakland County (LOC) and South Oakland Shelter (SOS) combined forces and merged agencies. LOC was founded in 1972 and started with a group of volunteers who provided food and clothing from the back door of a local church. SOS was established in 1985 by seven religious congregations in Oakland County. The new Lighthouse leverages the best of both agencies, providing direct services (food, shelter, rental/utility and other financial assistance, clothing, crisis referrals) and stability and housing programs that develop and support self-sufficiency.

What do they do? The SOS program maintains 30-35 unrestricted shelter beds. SOS accepts men, women, and children. Lighthouse has three operating food pantries across southeastern Michigan. The Direct Services program helps people with basic needs. They provide a continuum of services that begins with short-term emergency food, utility and rental assistance. Lighthouse also works diligently to move individuals and families from homelessness to housing as quickly as possible. This is done through a variety of programs including transitional housing, rapid re-housing and permanent supportive housing. There is also Crowdfunding via HandUp.org - a web-based social enterprise serving more than 100 homeless service agencies and their clients. Finally, after people have exited the LOC programs and moved into housing, follow-up care case managers meet with them in their new homes for a full year.

How can you help? Since the Pandemic, we have not been able to host SOS in our church, BUT we have continued to be involved and actively engaged with Lighthouse. Our Outreach Team, led by Joan Morgan, has accepted returnable bottles and cans (you can drop them off at the side door of the church) and donated the proceeds. Your donations of paper products and food have been and will continue to be much appreciated. Finally, your financial support is more important than ever – you can read more about this in the St. Stephen’s and SOS article.

A quick list of supplies Lighthouse needs:

- Paper towels
- Toilet paper
- Diapers – especially sizes 5 and 6
- Baby wipes
- Tissues
- Soap – bar or body wash
- Laundry detergent – especially pods
- Disposable razors – male & female
- Toothbrushes & toothpaste



Father's Day

I know this is a bit after the fact, but since I gave a brief history of Mother's Day in the last Witness, it's only fair I do the same for Father's Day. Father's Day was founded in Spokane, Washington in 1910 by Sonora Smart Dodd. Its first celebration was in the Spokane YMCA on June 19, 1910. Her father, the Civil War veteran William Jackson Smart, was a single parent who raised his six children there. After hearing a sermon about Jarvis' Mother's Day in 1909, she told her pastor that fathers should have a similar holiday honoring them. Although she initially suggested June 5, her father's birthday, the pastors did not have enough time to prepare their sermons, and the celebration was deferred to the third Sunday of June. Americans resisted the holiday during the first few decades, perceiving it as just an attempt by merchants to replicate the commercial success of Mother's Day, and newspapers frequently featured cynical and sarcastic attacks and jokes. By the mid 1980s Father's Day was widely observed and had become a commercial success.

In Australia, Father's Day is celebrated on the first Sunday of September, and is not a public holiday. The Father's Day Council of Victoria annually recognizes fathers in the Father of the Year Award.

In Brazil, Father's Day is celebrated 3 months after Mother's Day. The date was selected in honor of St. Joachim, the patron saint of fathers and grandfathers. It is not an official holiday, but it is widely observed and typically involves spending time with and giving gifts to one's father.

In Germany, Father's Day is celebrated differently from other parts of the world. It is always celebrated on Ascension Day, which is a federal holiday. Regionally, it is also called men's day, or gentlemen's day. It is tradition for groups of males (young and old but usually excluding pre-teenage boys) to do a hiking tour with one or more smaller wagons, pulled by manpower (this is fun?). In the wagons are wine or beer and traditional regional food (ah, now it makes sense!)

Russia also celebrates differently than other parts of the world. Russia continues the USSR tradition of celebrating Defender of the Fatherland Day instead of Father's Day. It is usually called "Men's Day" and considered the Russian equivalent of Father's Day.



In Spain and Italy, according to the Roman Catholic tradition, fathers are celebrated on Saint Joseph's Day, March 19. In Italy it is not a public holiday. In Spain it is celebrated in some regions as a public holiday.

In Philippines, like many countries, Father's Day is not an official holiday, but it is widely observed on the 3rd Sunday of June. Most Filipinos born in the 1960s and 1970s did not celebrate Father's day, but Filipinos now follow this tradition and other American holidays, most likely due to the influence of the United States through television and the internet.

In India, Father's Day is celebrated on the third Sunday of June and is not a public holiday. Father's day is not an Indian tradition though, in the Vedas, father has always been given a very high status. In India, a father is held in supreme veneration and next only to God.

I hope everyone had a great time celebrating the Dads in your life!

St. Stephen's and SOS

How often have we heard the phrase “the pandemic has changed” Just like everything else, this is also true for the way Lighthouse MI runs the South Oakland Shelter (SOS) program. This past year we were not able to do our hands-on ministry of hosting SOS for a week. Many of us were looking forward to engaging in this ministry once again this year. Unfortunately, due to changes in the way SOS is administering the program and our aging membership, we will not be able to host SOS at St. Stephen’s again this year. BUT! That does not mean we cannot continue to make this an important part of our purpose and an expression of our discipleship. Last year we raised and donated over \$6,000 to help Lighthouse keep SOS alive through the pandemic. We can – and should – continue to offer significant financial support, not just what we can do for Lighthouse, but specifically toward SOS.

For instance: \$7,000 will provide two meals per day for a full week for 100 guests, \$3,000 will convert a fully furnished transitional housing unit into an emergency shelter for a mother and her children, \$2,100 will provide two meals per day for 30 guests for a full week.

We will be conducting a fund raising drive as we get closer to the fall to support SOS. If you can make a donation to SOS, please remember to write SOS in the memo line. We were able to give over \$6,000 last year. Can we get closer to \$8,000 this year? We will with God’s help!

She will be spending her summer before college as a counselor at Black River Farm and Ranch horse camp where she also spent many years as a camper.


