Why Church?

The year may be slowly nearing the end, but that doesn't mean that we are not at the beginning, so-to-speak. In the fall, students are beginning a new academic year. In the fall, the church begins a new year of programing. In the fall, many are returning from summer vacation to begin a new year of employment. While the leaves may be falling, and the pumpkin spice may be brewing, it doesn't mean that we are not at the beginning of something new. As we return once again to more normal routines, we find ourselves also returning to church. Consequently, the fall becomes a time to ask ourselves: why do I go to church?

Today, there are just so many options for meeting our spiritual needs. If it is not the cable news reminding us of our ultimate concern, then it is the self-help guru floating across our social media feed who promises to meet all our spiritual needs in three easy steps. On any given day, none of us feels particularly religious and so we wonder to ourselves: why do I go to church? Why do I commit myself to a life in community? THE SENIOR WARDEN'S THOUGHTS

If this were a "normal" year (as I get older, I'm not sure what "normal" is anymore) but if this were a normal year at St. Stephen's we would be winding down our year and you would be getting a mailing or two with a pledge card to fill out for your financial commitment to St. Stephen's for the next year. Well, this has not been a normal year and it is certainly not "business as usual" here at St. Stephens.

As we emerged from the lockdowns and restriction of the pandemic, we also welcomed Fr. Brian as our priest. Both of these "events" have created opportunities for new ideas, new ways to think about our mission and how we bring Christ into our lives and our community. We have been and will continue to be discussing how we might take advantage of these new opportunities to revitalize and invigorate our parish. Your thoughts and prayers are vital to these conversations. Please read my article "It Takes all Hands ..." to learn more about these small group conversations.

I want to take this opportunity to let you know what we are doing out there in the mission field through our many outreach initiatives.

- We made a \$2,500 donation for CCRT
- We were at Crossroads on June 26, 2022. We bought all the food, our ten volunteers prepared it and helped serve 368 meals.
- The Baby Shower was on July 17, 2022. We combined this with the Bishop's Ice Cream Social. As usual, the collection was a success! A rough count was about thirty boxes of diapers.
- The Blood Drive was July 18, 2022. There were fewer than normal signed up to donate, but we still collected nineteen pints of blood.

Fr. Brian challenged us to find a local hands-on outreach project that would provide us the opportunity to help on a routine basis, perhaps beginning quarterly, but hopefully growing into something we could do more frequently. We are looking into several activities, but one close to home might be serving breakfast on Saturday mornings at All Saints in Pontiac. They serve free breakfasts every Saturday. The meals are in a carry-out box, so the client has the option of eating there or outside. All the prep work happens on Saturday morning. They need a team of 6-8 people (4 is the minimum). Prep begins at 6:30am, Breakfast is from 8-10am and clean-up is over by 11am. If you think you would like to be involved in this ministry, please contact me or Joan Morgan.

On September 24th we held our *Rise Against Hunger* meal packaging event. Our goal for this year was to package 10,000 meals in a one-day event. Begun in 1998, *Rise Against Hunger* is committed to providing nutrition and resources for the world's most vulnerable while simultaneously engaging and inspiring volunteers around the globe to "take action". The organization works with groups like St. Stephen's to package nutritious meals that then are distributed to their partners in need all around the globe. (Continued on page 4)

WE NEED HELP!

We are a small, but vibrant parish and desire to keep things running smoothly. If you find that you have a few hours a month to help... Many Hands Make Light Work! Thank you!

- We need more plate counters! The goal is to have a minimum of 4 two person teams so everyone only has to count once every 4 weeks. We are currently down to 2 teams. If you feel called to this ministry and for more information please contact Dave Eldon.
- We need more singers for the choir. We all love to hear music on Sundays, but the choir could use more sopranos, altos, tenors and basses. We rehearse on Wednesday evenings from 7:30-9 pm and again at 9:30 am on Sunday before the 10am service. If you feel called to this special ministry please contact Sue Gore, organist-choir director.
- We need more help with the altar set up. Currently there are only five members, each doing one Sunday a month. It would really help if there were at least two members for each Sunday. What it takes is a willingness to serve by setting the table. On Friday or Saturdays you set for the 8am Sunday service, and then between the 8 and 10 am service you set up for the 10am. After the 10am service you wash the "dishes" and put items away. This is open to men and women who have an hour or so monthly. But while church is all about the cure of the soul, we may say that this is not all that church is about. The gathering of God's people in worship of the transcendent God of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, is not only about the cure of souls, but is also about the love of neighbor. Yes, we come to church not only to find a Balm in Gilead and a cure for the sin sick soul, but we come also to transform our navel gazing into genuine concern for our neighbor and our community. All of us know well how to be concerned with our own affairs, but where we need help is in directing our self-concern outward. Some of us have noticed that when the participants of the liturgy process out of the sanctuary, in the bulletin, we no longer call it a "recessional." But the term, "recessional" suggests that our primary work is now completed in the gathering around the altar of the Lord. The term suggests that we are now "recessing" back to where we were before! But oh, how au contraire, having partaken of the holy things in bread and wine, our work has just begun! We do not recess out into the world; no, instead we process out into the world to begin the work to which the Gospel has called us. The work is not over in the worship of Elohim (the Almighty one), on the contrary, the work has just begun as we move toward service in the world.

Well, there is still yet more reason why we come to church week in and week out. We come not only to pray and to serve our community in outreach, but we also come to meet and make new friends. We gather to care for one another, whether it be through our pastoral care ministries or simply through a friendly social gathering. We come to church because as much as our culture says we need no one but ourselves alone, we know, deep down, that is simply not true. We need community and the practice of gathering with others. It is the risen and ascended Christ who gathers us together and teaches us to break bread with one another. It is the grace of God which draws us together, again and again, and schools us in the practice of love for God and neighbor.

This fall, as you begin again, may you discover why it is that you come to church, and may you discover in the sacramental life of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, the blessing and peace of God.

Keeping you informed is a Vestry goal. We have many balls in the air. Here are a few key snippets.

- Fr. Brian and the Vestry are planning new ministries, including: a "Meals Care Ministry" that will orchestrate getting meals to parishioners that need them during challenging times; a new educational series starting with "Ways to Pray;" a blessing of the animals service tweaked and advertised to make it more effective at attracting non-parishioners to our door/grounds.
- Our recent Platinum Recognition Lunch, the Bishop's Ice Cream Social, and the Baby Shower were critiqued, and all were considered highly successful.
- Details were developed for the Fall stewardship campaign's inhome gatherings. These events are being blended with our planning for how to grow St. Stephen's and its ministries. Doing so is important because having a positive vision as a target and attracting the funding and personal commitments we need to achieve our goals go hand-in-hand.
- The Vestry received a detailed update from Treasurer Phil Pierce on our finances through July and projections for the rest of the year. Budget implications and priorities were discussed as they relate to 2023 operations and plans for future growth. The Vestry provided guidance on priorities which will be reevaluated after we see how successful our stewardship campaign is and what our giving is during the rest of 2022.
- Training in CPR and use of our defibrillator has been arranged and a signup sheet is available.
- Heard reports on and helped coordinate and find additional resources for our many missions and activities.



FROM THE KITCHEN OF AMI O'NEILL

In August, St. Stephen's gave a Platinum Luncheon for our senior members. The menu was planned and prepared by our very talented parish administrator Ami O'Neill and her amazing daughters. The menu of the day was Simple Green Salad, Chicken Picatta, Seasoned Green Beans, Mini Penne with homemade Marinara, Air Buns, and Individual Tiramisu (Ami's dad's recipe as he was taught as a boy in Italy by his grandma). It was such a wonderful and delicious event! Here are two of the recipes for you to try at home.

CHICKEN PICATTA ala DANTE

- Thin cut chicken dredged in seasoned flour (flour, salt, pepper, paprika and parsley flakes)
- Choppies (Green Onion, Parsley, Garlic: green onion sliced thin, parsley chopped fine, garlic minced)
- Chardonnay (usually a tiny bottle if cooking for 2
- 2 Tbsp Butter and Lemon juice (1 lemon)

Heat oil in pan, when hot add the seasoned floured chicken. Brown on both sides and cook until almost done. Sprinkle with the Choppies. Cook for about 3 minutes, flip the chicken over. Pour Chardonnay over the chicken, cook a few minutes to evaporate alcohol. Squeeze half a lemon over the ingredients in the pan. Add 2 TBL of butter to finish off and thicken sauce. You could also add sliced mushrooms to the dish if you wish when you put in the choppies.

AIR BUNS

In 1/2 cup lukewarm water put 1 tsp white sugar and 1 envelope of yeast. Let rise in warm place for 10 minutes.

In a large bowl put 1/2 c margarine, 1 tsp salt, 2 Tbsp vinegar, 3 1/2 cups lukewarm water

Add the risen yeast and 8 to 10 cups of flour, just enough so dough will not stick to hands. Grease a bowl, add dough and cover with lid or cloth.

Let rise in a warm place for 2 hours.

Knead down, Let rise another hour, Knead down again.

Form into buns the size of a crabapple.

Grease cookie sheet, set buns on cookie sheet (not too close as they rise to a good size).

Spray plastic wrap with Pam and cover buns for final rise, 3 hours.

Bake at 400 degrees until golden brown. Makes 5 dozen.

INTERESTING STOPS ALONG THE WAY BY JILL STEIN


This is a brand new column for The Witness where interesting travels can be featured by many of our wanderers of the United States and abroad. If you find a particular spot interesting, so would others. Take a few pictures and tell us why it is a must see place. Editor

David and I traveled to Paris and the Normandy Region of France this summer. We saw many of the typical tourist sites that many travelers to France see. I shall expand on one site in particular because it truly captured our eyes and souls with its gorgeous colors and design; the chapel called Sainte Chapelle which means Holy Chapel.

Sainte Chapelle is a royal chapel in the Gothic style, within the old palace residence of the Kings of France until the 14th century. The chapel is a hidden gem inside this old palace, and is not a typical tourist attraction because it is inside this old residence, and not nearly as big as Norte Dame. Our daughter told us about this hidden treasure and it was indeed worth the subway ride to step back into time and see this treasure of light and color.

Construction began sometime after 1238 and the chapel was completed in 1248. Sainte Chapelle is considered among the highest achievements of that period's Gothic style. The royal chapel stands squarely upon a lower chapel, which served as a parish church. It was commissioned by King Louis IX of France to house his collection of Passion relics, including Christ's Crown of Thorns – one of the most important relics in medieval Christendom. This was later held in the nearby Notre-Dame Cathedral until the 2019 fire, which it survived. The two levels of the new chapel, equal in size, had entirely different purposes. The upper level, where the sacred relics were kept, was reserved exclusively for the royal family and their guests. The lower level was used by the courtiers, servants, and soldiers of the palace.

Although damaged during the French Revolution and restored in the 19th century, it has one of the most extensive 13th-century stained glass collections anywhere in the world. The fifteen stained glass windows in the nave and apse of the upper chapel are breath-taking. The colors and light fill the chapel with a feeling of awe. May we be inspired to look for hidden gems and rays of light in our travels and in our ordinary daily lives.



OUTREACH UPDATE BY JOAN MORGAN

On July 17th, the parish enjoyed an ice cream social provided by Bishop Bonnie, and donated LOTS of baby stuff to Lighthouse and CCRT in Pontiac. We donated 21 packages of diapers, 13 packages of formula, 13 packages of wipes, 12 blankets, 2 sundresses, 2 pajamas, and a basket of baby care products, socks and wash cloths. - Dave went through Fr. Carl Sayers' confirmation class and was confirmed by Bishop Emrich at St. Stephen's.
- Dave's daughter Ashley was an acolyte and helped him usher and count the collection when she was in her late teens.
- Dave's sister is Diane Kenefic who also has been carrying on John and Daisy's legacy at St. Stephen's.
- Dave's parents and brothers Dan and Dean are interred in the Memorial Garden.
- Dave's early work life was helping to run his family's bowling lanes.
- Dave was a concrete mixer truck driver for 29 years until he retired.

Dave is unquestionably very determined and resilient. As a young adult, a traffic accident left him with a crushed leg among many other injuries. He was hospitalized for 80 days enduring traction and a half-body cast. After a long rehab, he reappeared at St. Stephen's and used crutches to walk down the aisle for communion. Returning from the altar, the congregation gave him a rousing ovation.

Dave endured 2 more tragic accidents which he prefers not to talk about, but through them he showed the same determination and resilience.

In addition to all he is doing at St. Stephen's, Dave is the primary caregiver for his wife Jan who is dealing with long-term health issues.

ST. STEPHEN'S YOUTH MISSION TRIP 2022 BY JACKIE INGERSOLL

Pictures are worth 1,000 words, but here is what they cannot capture. THIS WAS A LIFECHANGING EXPERIENCE FOR ALL OF US, and all our expectations were exceeded.

- Christian values were strengthened by experiencing the joy of serving those in great need, then seeing love and appreciation in their eyes.
- Enhanced was our appreciation for how relatively blessed and advantaged we are.
- Many minds were expanded by being in a tropical climate where Spanish is the primary language, and for some it was their first plane ride.
- Kids and adults all bonded via their shared demanding work and unique experiences.
- Kids were strongly appreciative of this latest evidence of the love and support of the St. Stephen's parish for them.

The first three days were spent at a rustic camp right on the Caribbean. We were guided in our service by Danny, disaster relief coordinator for the Episcopal Diocese of Puerto Rico. The four houses we worked on were damaged either by hurricanes or an earthquake. Construction work had been completed, so we were the finishing crew that scraped, painted, and cleared debris; all in high heat and humidity. Everyone worked enthusiastically without complaint. We all felt so good helping these seniors who were on low fixed incomes.

After work we swam in the Caribbean, ate dinner, and shared reflections on the day. Fr. Brian then led us in either Compline or the Eucharist.

The kids totally embraced serving others and wished they could do even more for them. In fact, they did. Once back, those with jobs opened their wallets and kicked in cash, then asked the congregation to do so too. Kids without jobs helped return bottles and cans to contribute. In total, we were able to send \$1,000 to support the Puerto Rican Diocese's relief efforts, which included \$250 from St. Philip's ECW.

We have people in need in our area whom we might have served instead but helping people who have gone through what our new Puerto Rican friends went through was on a totally different scale. The amount of massive damage, as well as a year without electricity or water, left many speechless. *Continued on pg. 17*


