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
Horse Access

Hullett Marsh is a beautiful place to enjoy a long walk with your equine friend. As fall and winter are approaching, restrictions are in place to protect the integrity of our marsh and dyke systems. From October 1st to April 30th, horse access is prohibited in Zone A, however Zone B is open to riders year round. Please abide by the rules and regulations to help maintain the HPWA and reduce wear on the trails and dyke systems as well as prevent injury to either yourself or your horse.

User Guide

Emily Dearing worked very hard this summer to produce the Hullett Marsh User Guide for 2024-2025.

Summer Students

Thanks to funding received from Canada Summer Jobs, Hullett Marsh was able to hire one summer student this year. Returning for her second summer at the marsh, Emily Dearing took on the role of **Coordinator/Maintenance** Event Supervisor. Without the usual funding for three summer students, the FOH Board of Directors approved funding to hire one more summer student for 8 weeks. This allowed for more jobs to be completed this summer as well as continue to develop young conservationists. Ty Hoggart, a high school student from CHSS, was hired on as Maintenance Worker for the summer. Having the extra help, we were able to focus on many priority jobs and tasks while connecting with the community in a variety of ways.



Emily's work for this summer included managing the production of our 2024/2025 User Guide, running our turtle nest protection program, leading guided bus tours around the marsh, retrieving mallard tubes, maintaining parking lots and water structures, beaver dam removal, and supervising maintenance tasks.

Ty worked hard every single day on upkeep of the marsh. He completed weed whacking, clearing water structures, dyke maintenance and timber removal, painting and much more. He brought lots of bright ideas to the team this summer.

Without this funding and the help of these youth,

the marsh would not be what it today. is Having them here allowed for much more work to be done, and their hard work can be seen across the marsh.

FOH has been busy this summer putting your membership dollars to work! Youth Waterfowl Clinic

Friends of Hullett will once again be hosting our annual Youth Waterfowl Clinic on September 21st. The 2024 clinic will have 10 youth participants. Youth will be provided with the opportunity to engage in nesting activities, canoe and water safety, gun safety, learn about waterfowl, and even participate in clay shooting.



Youth will learn about waterfowl identification, ethics, decoy placement, concealment, calling, and cleaning.



On September 21 youth participants will learn about the Hullett Marsh's Waterfowl nesting structure program. Displays of Mallard Tubes and Duck Boxes will be shown and explained.

SLED Funding

The FOH would like to thank Huron County for providing \$5,000 from their Supporting Local Economic Development (SLED) fund. With this funding, FOH will be co-hosting forestry tours at the HPWA with the Ontario Woodlot Association (OWA). OWA will be bringing in forestry experts to lead three forestry tours, each with different themes. The purpose of these tours is to re-engage and enhance skills and knowledge of other forestry professionals. FOH is excited to have this new partnership and take recommended actions to improve and enhance the HPWA forest ecosystems.







Reporting Violations

If you see someone committing a violation on Hullett Marsh property, please be sure to contact the appropriate authorities. Friends of Hullett staff do not do any type of enforcement so it is important to either contact OPP or a Conservation Officer depending on the type of situation. Phone numbers for our local Conservation Officers can be found on page 4 of the 2024-2025 User Guide.

PLEASE REPORT NATURAL RESOURCE VIOLATIONS BY CALLING 1-877-847-7667

You can assist a Conservation Officer by calling our natural resources call line with the following information.

- Nature of the violation (hunting, fishing, species at risk, unlawful harvesting, etc...)
- Vehicle information such as; licence plate, color, make & model of vehicle
- Location of the offence such as civic address or simply where you are in the Hullett
- Specifics about the event that you saw including date, time, persons involved if name known if not descriptions of people

Turtle Nest Protection

This marks the 6th year of our turtle nest protection program. **Staff successfully placed 20 turtle nest**

protection boxes this year! These protection boxes help increase the survival rate of their eggs. It is very important to protect turtle nests from



predation because turtles do not reach sexual maturity until they are about 12-15 years old.

Most of the nests staff found this year were **Common Snapping Turtle** nests.

Volunteering



With a small staff and a 5,400-acre property to take care of, **volunteer efforts** are the backbone of various tasks that manage and maintain Hullett Marsh's infrastructure, programs, and habitat.

This summer we were lucky enough to have the support of numerous volunteers with everything from mallard tube retrieval to painting trail markers. It doesn't matter if you're 13 or 80, there is always

something you can do to help.

Whether you can only spare an hour or if you can donate a whole day of your time, volunteers are welcome any day and any time!







If you hunt at Hullett, consider spending some time volunteering with us to benefit and enhance your hunting experience. You'll be able to scout out the area and see what is happening with waterfowl in the marsh before your hunt!

Phragmites Removal

Phragmites, also known as Common Reed, is an invasive wetland species that has become established in the marsh. First found here in the

early 2000's, this aggressive plant can spread rapidly throughout an area, outcompeting native species for water and nutrients.

Our Wildlife & GIS Technician, Ben Elliott, has been working with the Ausable Bavfield **Conservation Authority (ABCA)** to control Phragmites in the HPWA. With the financial support from Huron Clean Water Project and Ducks Unlimited Canada, FOH and ABCA staff located and sprayed several stands of Phragmites throughout the marsh, and have observed a notable improvement since mapping began in 2016 and spraying began in 2017.

FOH thanks the Huron Clean Water Project and Ducks Unlimited for their financial support, and the ABCA for their assistance in controlling Phragmites stands within the HPWA.
