Board of Directors *Message from the Board*

In 2024 the Friends of Hullett (FOH) are putting efforts into the **health** of our forest ecosystems with studies, invasive species control and native tree plantings with a focus on species diversity. We have entered into a new **5 year Agricultural Agreement** with Flynn Farms for 2025 to 2029 after a public tender process. These funds are the core of the operational budget for FOH, allowing us to have staff and vehicles to take care of the property.

2024 marks the 26th anniversary of the Friends of Hullett as an incorporated registered charity within Canada, caring for this unique property. We hope to see you at the AGM on May 26 (page 5).

HPWA is a **"Multi-Use"** property and respecting each other's activities safely is important. FOH has published <u>hunting</u> and <u>hiking</u> "tip sheets" to help you research, understand and enjoy your visits!

I would like to thank the volunteer Board of Directors, staff and most importantly, the membership and volunteers for their efforts and donations. Special thanks goes out to Mike Cardinal for 25 plus years of dedicated service on the FOH Board of Directors. Mike is an original founding Board member since FOH incorporation.

Looking ahead to the summer, Scott and Ben are building a team of students and volunteers to work at the HPWA. We have 1 funded Canada Summer Job position for 2024. The last few years we have had 3 positions however the Federal Government has cut back for 2024.

Water Access Restictions

Water access **(for any purpose)** is **not permitted** in the HPWA from **May 15 to July 31** in **Zone A** and **May 15 to July 15** in **Zone B** annually to minimize the disturbance to nesting waterfowl. This includes retriever training activities, wading, canoeing, and kayaking.

Turtle Nest Protection

Our nest protector boxes are in the process of being installed throughout the marsh over nests to help increase the survival rate of their eggs. Nest protectors help defenseless eggs of our two known native species in the marsh, **Common Snapping Turtles** and **Midland**



Painted Turtles. It is important to protect these turtles and their eggs because it takes turtles about 10 years to reach sexual maturity!

We will keep everyone updated on this project as it progresses through our social media.

Brake for Turtles

As temperatures are on the rise, so is activity of snakes and turtles throughout Hullett Marsh. Hullett is home to a variety of different species of turtles, snakes, and amphibians. A majority of these species are listed as Species at Risk in Ontario.

- Cutting and marking walk-in trails to hunting stakes
- Repair and cut shooting lanes at accessible hunting stands
- Canoe channels to ensure proper signage and navigability

monitoring bird boxes, and helping maintain the marsh.

so much fun!

Working at the marsh also inspired me to get my PAL and hunting licence last summer. This spring, my boyfriend and I went turkey hunting for the first time and got a Jake with a crossbow!

This summer, I am very excited to lead more hikes, run the turtle nest protection program,

monitor bird boxes, coordinate volunteer work, lead a bus tour for Huronview residents, continue to help upkeep the march, and participate in Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority's Envirothon as a guest judge.


Nesting Programs

There are various nesting programs that the Friends of Hullett oversees. Unfortunately, due to such a mild winter and unfavourable ice conditions, FOH staff were unable to collect data from many mallard tubes and duck boxes this year. However, we would like to take this opportunity to talk about this amazing program. Monitoring species nesting and offspring success rates is essential to understanding the overall health of not only the species being examined but of the entire marsh.

Duck Boxes

FOH has been collecting duck box data from 2004-2023


inclusively. Over the years, boxes have fallen down and the size of the program has shrunk from 165 boxes in 2004 to 118 boxes in 2022. As boxes have fallen down, staff have



made decisions based on previously collected data to determine whether they should be replaced or not. The data FOH has collected over the years shows an average usage rate of 66% since 2018.

It should be noted that these usage rates only reflect the

number of confirmed usages, whereas the real number would be somewhat higher as there are many cases where usage is unknown. This number includes both wood duck




and hooded merganser usage. There are also instances where there is usage from both species.

Mallard Tubes

Much like duck box data, FOH has been collecting mallard tube data from 2004-2023 inclusively. The size of the mallard tube program has also shrunk over the years. Starting out with 53 mallard tubes throughout the marsh in 2004 and 33 mallard tubes in 2023. One of the main reasons for this decrease is because some of the original tubes were placed too close together and nesting mallards prefer to be far away from other mallards.

The average usage rate of mallard tubes since 2018 is

38%. The average rate of successful hatches between 2018 and 2022 is 26%, with 2020 having the highest success rate of 43%. However, the true success rate is

likely higher than that because in many instances, the hatching outcome is unknown.

Our nesting programs are made possible through the



continued support from our volunteers who contribute significant portions of their time towards the success of these programs. We hope to have better ice conditions next year and will see you all again in the 2024 season.
