I Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50

35 But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body will they come?" 36 How foolish! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. 37 When you sow, you do not plant the body that will be, but just a seed, perhaps of wheat or of something else. 38 But God gives it a body as he has determined, and to each kind of seed he gives its own body.


42 So will it be with the resurrection of the dead. The body that is sown is perishable, it is raised imperishable; 43 it is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory; it is sown in weakness, it is raised in power; 44 it is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body.



I don't know if it's uniquely American, but I would be interested in knowing how many conversations between friends and acquaintances begin with the question, "How are you doing?" The response then includes some reference to how busy we are. It seems that our society's conversational script requires us to include some indication that we are very busy, industrious and hard-working people.

When I was younger, there was the prediction that by the year 2000, the average worker would be putting in maybe 30 hours a week, vacation time would be 6 weeks on average, and leisure time activities would be a major part of everyone's lifestyle. We've never gotten there. Instead, what I hear today is that people are working longer hours, for less pay, with fewer benefits, and are busier than ever. Even when we're on vacation, we fill our time with lots of activity and busy-ness.

Here's an interesting story about our "pursuit of happiness." An 18th century rabbi was watching people rushing to and fro across the town square, and wondered why they were all running so frenetically. He stopped one person and asked, "Why are you running?" The man said, "I am running to make a living." The rabbi paused a moment and then asked him, "How come you're so sure that the living is in front of you and you have to run to catch it? Maybe it's behind you, and you need to stop and let it catch up to you."

When do we stop and let our blessings catch up with us? That is called the Sabbath. Sabbath is when we celebrate the things that are important. Sometimes we just need to pause and let blessings "catch up" with us.

No doubt, many of us will be very, very busy in 2025. Sunday is no longer honored by our society as a day of "Sabbath" rest. It's very hard to slow down long enough to let the amazing blessings that we all enjoy catch up with us and our busy schedule, allowing us to stop and give thanks for the lives we share. But that is what we do on Saturday evening/Sunday morning and through on-line worship. Much effort goes into creating a worship life at Calvary that allows you to stop pursuing life and stop, and let God's amazing grace catch us.

Circle of Welcome Update

The Circle of Welcome (CoW) that has been formed between Calvary and River of Hope in Hutchinson met on February 15 for the first time with the refugee family that we are supporting. The mother and her children are from Somalia and had been living in a refugee camp in Kenya prior to coming to the U.S. Her husband is still in Kenya. The family has six children between the ages of 1 and 9 and the mom is due next month with her seventh child. They have been having difficulty finding housing and so have currently been staying with other family members that also live in Willmar.

Unfortunately, we found out that 75% of the employees with MN LSS refugee services were laid off from their jobs beginning February 19 due to the freeze of federal funding. This means that the CoW contacts we were working with at LSS are no longer employed and there are no federal funds available for the family as had been planned. We do have some assistance through a Willmar LSS employee. In spite of these changes, all of the members of the CoW team felt strongly that we need to continue to provide support for this family.

Calvary's CoW volunteers are LaNell Koenig, David Sehloff, and Cathy and Joel Halbritter. Please pray for this family and if you have any ideas of available housing or are interested in supporting this family, please let one of us know. The family needs a 3-bedroom apartment or house for around \$1,300-\$1,500/month.

River of Hope did the initial fundraising that was needed to become a CoW and had a congregational member match that funding. Calvary was then asked to join the CoW so that we would have local volunteers that live in Willmar, as refugees through LSS are placed in either the Twin Cities, St. Cloud, or Willmar. At this time, that same member from River of Hope in Hutchinson is matching any additional donations up to \$4000. LENT 2025

Broken and Beloved – Stories of God's Steadfast Love "The Lord is near to the broken-hearted and saves the crushed in spirit." Psalm 34:18

Throughout our lives, we often face the reality that two seemingly different or opposite things can be true at the same time. The sun can be shining, and the temperature can be freezing. Times can be hard, and we can be filled with optimism. A project may never be finished, and it can be done. We may feel like we are both making a lot of progress, and we are standing still, or maybe even going backwards. Different realities, both true.

The same can be said for our very selves. We are never just one thing, and oftentimes, the very essence of who we are can seem like opposites. Martin Luther said that we are simultaneously saint and sinner. Two different things, opposites, both true at the same time.

Lent is an especially good time to reflect upon such things, to consider and wonder about what it means that within our very selves, we are more than one thing at any given time. This Lent, we are invited to reflect upon what this "simultaneous-ness" means for your life by dwelling in the theme "*Broken and Beloved – Stories of God's Steadfast Love.*"

Under this theme, we will consider biblical characters who embody various experiences of brokenness and beloved-ness. We will wonder about how these characters speak to our own experiences. We will be invited to consider how brokenness and beloved-ness are a part of our own life experiences, and we will be reminded again and again that amid all the different things that can be true at the same time, one thing is a constant – the steadfast love of God.
