Material List:

#10 or #11 Seed Beads

1612 Primary Color Seed Beads

(25 Grams or .873 oz. this is 1700 #10 seed beads)

- 226 Complimentary Color Seed Beads (3.69 Grams or .130 oz. this is 250 #10 seed beads)
- 4 mm Bicone or Bead of choice
- 14 6 mm Teardrop or Bead of choice for Dangle
- 13 Ft. of Fireline 6 or 8 lb (No Dandyline)
- 1 2 ½ inch Christmas Ornament
- 1 #12 Needle (Big Eye 2.25")

<u>Variations:</u> 1)You can use top drip beads as dangles.

- 2) You can use 2 different color seed beads as complimentary colors so the three at the bottom are different from above or variegate the three on the bottom.
- 3) Do something different and use small charms or variegate your 6 mm beads using 2 different colors that compliment each other and alternate them.

This pattern is very forgiving and easy to make it your own. Have Fun!

GRAPE SALAD

Salad Mixture

1 lb. Green Seedless Grapes
1 lb. Red Seedless Grapes
2-3 Sweet Red Delicious Apples
½ cup Dried Cranberries
½ cup Chopped Pecans

Dressing Mixture

8 ounces sour cream 8 ounces cream cheese, softened ½ cup Brown Sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, to taste

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) Wash grapes and apples. In a bowl add grapes cut in half and dice apples leaving the skin on.
- 2) Add ½ cup chopped pecans and ½ cup dried cranberries.
- 3) Set aside.
- 4) Mix in a separate bowl the sour cream, cream cheese, brown sugar and vanilla by hand until blended.
- 5) Stir grape mixture into the dressing, and pour in large serving bowl.

Note: The recipe is very forgiving. You may add more fruit and pecans as you would like. She does add a little more cream cheese than just the 8 ounces. Like 1/4 more of another 8 oz. block.

Peridot

August Birthstone / 15th Anniversary

Peridot is the gem variety of the mineral Olivine. Its chemical composition includes iron and magnesium, and iron is the cause of its attractive yellowish green colors. Volcanic rocks called basalts are rich in these two elements where the gem is often occurs.

The range of color for Peridot is narrow, from a brown-green color to yellowish green to pure green. The most common Peridot seen in jewelry is yellowish green.

Peridot found by gem miners as irregular nodules (rounded rocks with Peridot crystals inside) in some lava flows in the United States, China, and Vietnam. Rarely, as large crystals lining veins or pockets in certain types of solidified molten rock. Sources for the latter include Finland, Pakistan, Myanmar, and the island of Zabargad.

Believed by geologists both types of deposits relate to the spreading of the sea floor that occurs when the earth's crust splits, and rocks from its mantle are pushed up to the surface. Sometimes—as in Myanmar— these rocks can be altered, deformed, and incorporated into mountain ranges by later earth movements.

Being contained in meteorites that have fallen to earth, Peridot can have an extraterrestrial source. In 2005, they found Peridot in comet dust brought back from the Stardust robotic space probe. Ancient History: The Egyptians called Peridot the "gem of the sun". Mainly because Peridot has always been associated with light. Some believed that it protected its owner from "terrors of the night," especially when it was set in gold. Others strung the gems on donkey hair and tied them around their left arms to ward off evil spirits.

The word Peridot comes from the Arabic "faridat," which means "gem." Peridot is delivered to the surface by volcanoes because it forms deep inside the earth. Some also came to earth in meteorites, but this extraterrestrial Peridot is extremely rare, and not likely to be seen in a retail jewelry store.

On an island in the Red Seas called Topazios (now known as St. John's Island or Zabargad) early records indicate that the ancient Egyptians mined a beautiful green gem. According to legend, the island was infested with snakes, making mining unpleasant until an enterprising pharaoh drove them into the sea.

People confused this stone from the earliest times, now known to be Peridot—with other gems. It was one of many labeled as "topaz."

Believed by some historians that Cleopatra's famous emerald collection might actually have been Peridot. People in medieval times continued to confuse Peridot with emerald. For centuries, people believed the fabulous 200-ct. gems adorning the shrine of the Three Holy Kings in Germany's Cologne Cathedral were emeralds. They are, in fact, Peridots.

MAKING FILIGREE WIRE

Making wire for filigree is quite simple. Take a double strand of 24-26 gauge silver wire, twist it tightly, and then flatten it a bit. While the basics are straightforward, here's a few tips that will quickly make you an expert with filigree.





Filigree looks best when the wire has a very tight twist. The way I do this is to start with dead soft wire and twist it until it breaks. It always seems to break on one end or the other.

I like to use a screw gun, although a Foredom also works well. You'll need a small hook in the spindle, either a cup hook from the hardware store or a nail that has been bent into the shape.

Be sure to keep a little tension on the wires as you twist. Then to get a real tight twist, I anneal the wire and twist it a second time until it breaks.

The final step in prepping the filigree wire is to flatten it slightly with a planishing hammer or rolling mill. The amount of flattening is a personal preference. I like to reduce the diameter about 25%. The wire will be quite stiff at this point, so it's best to anneal it again before starting to make the filigree shapes.
