### **Ingredients**

1 cup Semi-Sweet Chocolate Chips
1 cup Butterscotch or Peanut Butter Chips
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
14 oz. sweetened condensed milk
(NOT evaporated milk)
1 1/3 cups flaked coconut – Toasted in oven
1 cup chopped nuts—Pecans or Walnuts

#### **Directions:**

- \*Preheat oven to 350°F (325°F for glass dish).
- \*In 13" x 9" baking pan, spray with pam or grease.
- \*Melt butter & mix graham cracker crumbs. Press into the pan.
- \*Place nuts such as pecans or walnuts on top to graham cracker crumbs.
- \*Sprinkle Chocolate chips, Butterscotch Chips and Coconut Flakes.
- \*Press down some. Then pour sweetened condensed milk evenly over top.

Bake 25 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool. Chill if desired. Cut into 24-36 bars. Store covered at room temperature.

You probably already know of the diamond's toughness. In fact, it's the hardest gemstone and is made of just one element: carbon.

Its structure makes it 58 times harder than anything in nature and can only be cut with another diamond. While it's become nearly synonymous with wedding engagements, it's also the perfect stone for individuals who want something that's just as appropriate for everyday wear as it is for special occasions.

Diamonds come in several colors, including yellow, red, pink, blue, and green, and range in intensity from faint to vivid. Generally speaking, the more saturated the color, the higher the value.

In fact, diamonds sparkling with intense color are rare and may be priced higher than a colorless diamond of equal size. Because fancy-color diamonds are very desirable, color is sometimes introduced in a laboratory. These are correctly called *color-treated diamonds*.

Its unique physical properties means it has the best possible luster of any gemstone when cut and polished well. So if you're in the market for "sparkle," the diamond is the gemstone for you.

<u>History and Lore:</u> The world's first diamond color-grading system dates back to sixth-century India. The system was based on the country's ancient class structure. Members of different status levels, or castes, were permitted to own and wear only diamonds of a specific color. Thus, diamonds served as a badge of rank.

The priests and rulers, the Brahmins, were allowed to own diamonds that were "whitest of the conch, of the lotus, or of the rock crystal" (white to colorless). The landowners and warriors were assigned diamonds that were "the brown color of the eye of the hare." The merchant class was allowed to own only diamonds that were the "pretty nuance of a petal of a kadl [flower]" (yellow). And members of the lower classes were assigned diamonds with "the sheen of a burnished sword" (gray or black). Kings, however, were free to possess diamonds of any color.

The colors exhibited by nat-

ural fancy color diamonds are usually not very intense. Diamond color-grading systems have evolved a lot since that time. Today, there are well-established methods for judging diamond color based on much more than a comparison to conch shells, rabbits' eyes, and flower petals.

And the only restrictions to owning different colors are based on availability and affordability.

<u>Fancy Colored Diamonds...</u> Fancy color diamonds come in almost any color you can imagine. Red, green, purple, and orange are generally the most rare, followed by pink and blue. Yellows and browns are the most common fancy colors, but they're generally less valuable than the rarer colors. Only one in 10,000 has a fancy color.

Diamonds in the normal color range are colorless through light yellow and are described using the industry's D-to-Z color-grading scale. Fancy color diamonds, on the other hand, are yellow and brown diamonds that exhibit color beyond the Z range, or diamonds that exhibit any other color face-up. These rare specimens come in every color of the spectrum, including, most importantly, blue, green, pink, and red.

Gem diamonds in the D-to-Z range usually decrease in value as the color becomes more obvious. Just the opposite happens with fancy color diamonds: Their value generally increases with the strength and purity of the color. Large, vivid fancy color diamonds are extremely rare and very valuable. However, many fancy diamond colors are muted rather than pure and strong.

Blacks, grays, and fancy whites are considered fancies, too. Some have been fashioned into gems. The 67.50-carat Black Orloff diamond, named after the Russian Princess Nadia Vyegin-Orloff, is the most well-known example.

Spectacular prices in high-profile auctions are another factor in the increased awareness of fancy color diamonds. Not all fancy color diamonds command such high prices, however. Many people consider yellow and brown fancies less desirable than near-colorless stones of equal weight and clarity. And deeper yellows and browns are generally less valuable than other fancy colors.

The most well-known historical and current sources of fancy color diamonds are India, South Africa, and Australia. Other diamond mine locations, including Brazil, Venezuela, Guyana, and Indonesia, also produce fancy color diamonds.

### BEZEL CLOSER

A bezel closer is a steel punch that makes quick work out of pushing the metal down over a round stone and burnishing it. The working end is a concave cavity that fits over your bezel or prong setting and is pushed and twisted to capture the stone. Sets can be purchased but are expensive and contain many sizes you will probably never use. If all you need is one or two sizes, here's how you can make them yourself.



Find a good quality, round steel rod a little larger in diameter than your bezel cup or prong setting. Cut a 5 inch length. File both ends flat. Locate the center of one end, center punch a divot, and drill a small pilot hole about 5 mm deep. Remember to use a little oil as lubricant when cutting steel.

Select a ball bur a bit smaller than the steel rod but slightly larger than the bezel. Enlarge the pilot hole to a full hemispherical cavity. Test for proper fit with your bezel. Bezel should first contact the cavity about a third of the way in. When the size is correct, polish the cavity using Zam on a length of chopstick in your flexshaft. If the tool is not polished, it will leave scratches on your bezel or prongs.

When using the tool, the first step is to capture the stone correctly. I usually work by hand and push the punch straight down over the bezel or prongs. This causes the metal to start bending over the stone. Next I inspect with a lens to be sure the stone is staying level. This is repeated until the stone is seated on its bearing and can't move anymore.

Next you want to force the metal down onto the stone uniformly all the way around. While this can be done by hand, I often gently tap the punch with a hammer. Finally, burnish the bezel by twisting the punch around.
