

Recipe for Mexican Street Corn Salad

A box of cooked elbow noodles (standard 16-oz box) About 8-12 ears of corn cut off the cob, roasted or steamed About 2 fresh red bell peppers, diced

20 ounces of Rojo's Mexican Street corn dip

OR MIX

8 OZ of plain yogurt
8 oz of cojita cheese/cheddar cheese mix
4 OZ of sour cream or mayonnaise
1/3 chopped onion
1 seeded, diced green chili pepper
Add Salt, vinegar, cilantro, chili powder, pepper to taste
Blend to make dressing of your own. You can mess with the dressing ingredients to your own taste.

Mix the corn and peppers with the dressing – use either the pre-made dip or make your own by blending the ingredients directly above Add a little water if needed for smooth consistency). Fold the dressing slowly into the noodles mixing evenly to coat.

Squeeze a couple of limes over the top for additional zesty flavor.

Other vegetables can be added—diced roma tomatoes, carrots, whatever...

You all probably had this delicious Mexican Street Corn Salad at the meeting. I asked Sharon Coe to send it along so we could all enjoy it whenever we want...





Trip to Columcille

On August 24, a group of us visited Columcille and joined Tom Egan's tour. During the tour he told many Celtic myths. Columcille was started by a dream that came to Bill Cohea Jr., and it was he that began the journey on the slope of Blue Mountain. Fred Lindkvist, his partner and co-conspirator for over three decades became the beating heart of Bill's dream. Together, these two wonderful gentlemen founded Columcille Megalith Park, nurtured its nascent community, and created the rich landscape which has touched so many who have stepped through the infinity gate into the "Land of Myth and Mystery." Columcille Megalith Park, located on twenty-one acres of land in the Appalachian Mountains of eastern Pennsylvania, including the trails and stonework. The purpose was to preserve and maintain the land's natural resources, to provide sanctuary and educational resources to the public, and to celebrate seasonal observances in the Celtic and other spiritual and cultural traditions. You do not have to take the tour, you can just wonder on your own and read the website.
