


Jazz for our Children





MV implements transformative projects and programs at the 6 MOH centers including solar-powered lighting and irrigated vegetable gardens, libraries, classrooms, and educational programs including tailoring, Early English and the Teen Life Internship Program.

22,000 LBS !

5,000 books & Bibles
12 sewing machines
45 small tables
7 large tables
120 children chairs
20 library shelves
Pumps, controls
Piano keyboard, etc, etc.

While MV sends a small work team to Malawi every year, a very much larger group works throughout the year at home with well over 40 volunteers. Each year thousands of lightly used and donated children's books and Bibles are collected, cataloged, labeled, boxed, and plastic wrapped for ocean shipment. Treadle sewing machines are collected, refinished and mechanically refurbished. Lacking electricity, these manual machines are treasured to train young people for lifetime careers as tailors. MV members expertly sew girl's skirts and boy's shorts from brightly colored fabric for children who never dreamed of having a nice outfit. Members fabricate aluminum solar frames; paint homemade light fixtures; upgrade laptops for our classes; restore Bibles and books; design colorful cards and notes to insert into the pockets of the skirts and shorts; create learning aids for our classrooms and libraries, and much more.

And then all this has to get to Malawi!



This April, 22,000-pounds of cargo were shipped in a 20 foot container to MOH. Coordinating every element of international shipment, and then planning the packing of each and every item, when container shipping cost is determined by volume and not weight, is an enormous undertaking! This year's was the largest of our 13 previous annual shipments.





Warehoused throughout the year in a facility provided by the Fellowship Deaconry, Basking Ridge, NJ, a team of 30 gathered in late March to tirelessly load everything for the 8,000 mile journey to Malawi. This year's shipment included 5,000 books, 12 sewing machines, classroom tables, library tables, library shelves, classroom chairs, blackboards, hundreds of skirts and shorts, solar equipment, pumps, pipes, fittings, electrical controls, 8 laptop computers, and even 120 soccer balls!

Departing Port Newark, New Jersey April 4, the scheduled route through the Suez Canal, pirates notwithstanding, was suddenly upended at Gibraltar, the mouth of the Mediterranean, due to heightened terrorist activity threatening the Red Sea off of Yemen. Rerouted along a very much longer, but imminently safer, path following the coastline around Africa, after two Indian Ocean ship changes our shipment landed in Beira, Mozambique on June 14.



Traveling the final 600 miles overland to Lilongwe, our shipment thankfully cleared the Malawi Revenue Authority expeditiously, and arrived at MOH's front gate on July 3.

Yes, tracking these shipments daily via satellite and providing updates to the MV team, the ever changing challenges of our annual shipments, despite weeks of diligent planning and years of experience, keeps us all-too-frequently awake at night!

But for purposes unsurpassed!



Without international shipments such as these we could not conduct many of the programs we do in Malawi!

We thank God for the safe arrival of the shipment and the tireless efforts of the MV volunteers, as the greatly needed equipment and supplies will be used to continue and expand enduring transformation, opportunity, and hope for the children in Malawi.



A program that is having great success is our treadle sewing initiative. With little if any electrical power in the villages, manual sewing machines are of great value in training youth for a lifelong skill, and a potential trade.





Tailoring classes have been set up at MOH's Khwamba, Matapila, Selengo, and Chimwang'ombe centers, teaching young people sewing skills. We hope to expand classes to the remaining centers of Mponela and Katondo this year.





A parallel benefit: the students sew school uniforms for children who cannot afford to buy them, who would otherwise be denied education by the uniform requirements of public schools







At home we collect treadle machines, either donated or purchasd. We have standardized upon Singer Model 66's as the most well constructed and reliable brand and model.

These machines, manufactured in the U.S. and Europe over 100 years ago. Properly restored are greatly superior to the Chinese-made copies available in Af-



rica. Our team refinishes the often damaged wood casing, and rebuilds the mechanical works.





We restored and shipped 12 Singers this year, adding to the 12 we shipped to MOH in previous years.

We hope to have tailoring programs at all 6 of the MOH centers, with 6 machines in each class. So we still have a way to go. Without our international shipments such a program could not be possible.





After decades of use, and sitting idle even longer, the many inner workings are almost always clogged with cloth dust and hardened oil and grease. We disassemble, ultrasonically clean, lubricate, making them work as new!
