September's Back to Basics by Pastor James Order of Worship

Dear COTC,

In this first back to the basics article, we will be exploring our order of worship. This article will explore why we worship in a specific order and give a brief summary of the different elements. This does not mean there is only one way to worship. We are only working to understand our worship. Our worship can be understood as having three parts: introduction, heart and call.

Introduction

Our worship's introduction starts with gathering music. This is to invite people into worship. We then have a welcome where we greet people, let them know they are welcome to worship with us, and start worship with a smile. Next, the prelude helps us to center for worship and connect with God through worship. After the prelude, we have a call to worship. The call to worship, is exactly that, a call to worship. It is more than an invitation or welcome. It is a call to worship God. We often have the call to worship as a Psalm, but this year we will also explore some call to worships which are sung. Next is our opening hymn. We have three hymns as part of our worship. All three hymns allow us to connect to the Lord through music and can be the primary place of congregational participation. Our opening hymn transitions us from the introduction part of worship to the heart of worship. This transition often moves us from a general worship of the Lord, to start focusing our worship on the scripture and lesson for that day's worship.

Heart

As we transition into the heart of worship, we speak a prayer in unison. This prayer reflects the scripture and lesson we are focused on in worship. It is normally a confession or a prayer of thanks to the Lord. Our first scripture reading starts to reveal God's message to us and calls us to center on a teaching from God. We then have a time of prayer. This time is the time we communicate with our congregation, speaking new or updated prayers so that our brothers and sisters in Christ may pray for and with us. The moment of silence is to allow us a time to speak the prayer we don't want to say out loud and to hear God's response to us. God's response is sometimes a whisper and sometimes a shout. We close this prayer with the Lord's prayer as Christ taught us. Our second hymn helps prepare us for the sermon and moves us deeper into God's teaching. The second scripture reading continues God's lesson. While they don't always make sense at first, the first and second scripture readings should work together to give us the lesson God has revealed. We then enter the sermon. The sermon is the part of worship where the pastor works to explain the scripture and connect scripture to the world today with a lesson that you can use. The goal of any sermon is that the takeaway message can be summarized in one to three sentences. Following the sermon, once a month we partake in communion where we renew our covenant with God. During communion we are recommitting ourselves to God and God's call. After the sermon, or communion, we then move to the offering. The offering is where we tithe money and commit some of our time and energy to God. Having received God's message, we move to give back and support the missions and ministries. The doxology allows us to give thanks to God that we can tithe. The prayer over the offering allows us to give thanks and bless the offering as it goes to support God's call and the mission we have been called to.

Call

We then move from the heart of worship to our call, the third part of worship. It is a call to keep wrestling with the lesson for the coming week. It is a call to take this lesson from the church building on Sundays, out to the world that needs it. It is a call to live out our faith in the world. The closing hymn reminds us of the lesson and helps guide our path as we close worship for this day. The benediction is a final reminder of the lesson and a blessing as we transition from worship to living it out in the world. The postlude then provides a time for us to center ourselves before we enter the world, working to follow God over the next week.
