

Happy New Year ESA! My wish for all of us is a year of blessings. A year where we can return to travel and spending time together. A year of health for all of our ESA sisters and brothers. May we have these blessings in 2021.

I did not receive any proposed by law changes from the membership. The bylaw committee has proposed the following change to be presented at the International Convention in July:

Section 2. ~~Ballot Vote and Nominations from the Floor~~ **Voting**

~~Officers~~ **Candidates** shall be elected **according to a preferential electronic voting system approved by the Executive Board** by ~~ballot~~ vote at the annual meeting. **A ballot containing the names of the nominees shall be distributed via email before the date of the annual election.** Nominations may be made from the floor for all offices with the exception of President. "Notice of Intent to Nominate" **for all offices with the exception of President** from the floor shall be submitted in writing to the First Vice President, 60 days prior to ~~International Convention.~~ **the annual election.** Candidates so nominated must conform to provisions of Article V. ~~and shall have three minutes to have their qualifications presented.~~ Nominations for each office shall not exceed five. Voting shall begin after the close of the First General Assembly.

In 2020, the Executive Board was faced with some difficult decisions when we could not gather for our convention in Texas. This bylaw change will bring us into the technology age. We will still be voting with delegates. State presidents or the designated representative will have access to all of the candidate information and be able to share that information **"before the date of the annual election"**. This change is much needed so please share this proposal with your state and regional members.

I look forward to seeing some of you at Leadership on February 26th. Granted, I will be seeing you via ZOOM but it's better than nothing. I urge you to sign up for this opportunity. The cost is minimal since it is virtual. You will get the chance to learn new things about our organization and yourself, meet new people and share information and experiences. COVID has shown us that the unexpected can happen. I urge you to not get Covid lazy and get involved. Seize the Day!



Hope for Hero's projects are well underway in many of our ESA States, and I'm excited to share some of the photos that I have received. As many of you were aware, November was Hope for Hero's Month in ESA, and many of our members did participate in their local Wreaths Across America programs. I'm not sure how many of you were actually able to attend the graveside services of placing the wreaths at the cemetery, but I've included photos that I did receive via e-mail and Facebook. Thank you for encouraging the donations and helping to purchase wreaths to honor those veterans buried in our National Cemeteries. And yet Hope for Hero's is even bigger than just the month of November. Our country has so many men and women that have made the choice to protect all of us by joining the military, all branches. This is one of the most honorable decisions for someone to make and they all deserve our thanks and appreciation every day, beyond the month of November. In Honor of all armed forces, ESA has built a very robust program under the Hope for Hero's banner, and it's been in place now for 20 years. The ESA Website has been updated, so please check out the Coupon Clipping program, Sending Care Packages, Sending Reading Materials, and connecting through Cards and Letter writing programs. Those are some of the easiest programs we have for members who may be homebound and not able to get out in public places. ESA has programs that support families of the fallen and those with injuries (**Folds of Honor**), we have programs that help the veterans that have fallen on hard times and find themselves homeless and jobless (**Welcome Home for Vets**), and many more projects in each and every state that we have members.

Our current Hope for Hero's program has been filled to the brim with new ideas this year. We encourage everyone to please take a look at the ESA International Website under Hope for Hero's and see the new information that is added monthly. We have made it easier than ever to get connected to one of the three organizations this year that is being encouraged by our International President LeAnn Wray. And we have included highlights from all states that have done some wonderful projects in their own communities that you may want to try. There are opportunities to find an enlisted military member to send letters and cards to on the HFH Pages, there are opportunities to Sponsor a Vet in the Welcome Home program if it doesn't exist in your community, and you can sponsor or work at a golf tournament in the Fold of Honor program. <https://epsilonalpha.org/HopeForHeroes>

There has been a lot of discussion on the Coupon Clipping programs and how the way to count them for your Philanthropic Points. Please use the full face value of the coupon as a donated goods amount and count your hours and miles for picking up the coupons and going to the post office to be consistent across ESA. If your state has voted on a different method for counting hours and donations then you need to follow that protocol.

Thank you all for your recognition and place of honor that you have for the ESA Hope for Hero's Program and for all of our enlisted, active, and retired Veterans in the month of November and for all months of the year!

In October we had a presentation by Kendra Sabol of Arizona regarding a book project that they were doing. This information should now be on the ESA Hope for Hero's page on the website. Here is a couple of photos that support that project.

From Kendra Sabol: I have attached a picture of a box of books, hard back and soft back that I am getting ready to send. Plus two letters that are put in each box depending on active military or veterans. I am getting ready to send this box to Fort Wainwright, Alaska. Here is the request: "need books for a huge company of soldiers and families in Alaska> Setting up a free library at our hanger for soldiers to bring books home to their families. Any help is greatly appreciated as we cope with COVID -19. All genres are welcome."

I also wanted to mention another HOPE (I call it HOPE) for Heroes project I am doing. I submit an article on the Medal of Honor recipients in the State of Arizona. I have done a simple google research and I have a brief paragraph on each person and I write it up for the article. The logo for this is the actual Medal of Honor. I also added the history of the Medal of Honor for the readers initial introduction. With each newsletter article I use the logo, one interesting fact (very very interesting – part of the google search) and write up several lines about our recipients. I just submitted another article so this makes three and I have names to do several more articles in our monthly State Council Newsletter.

Omega Nu #5382 made baked goods for the American Legion in Mattoon Illinois. Attached is a picture of the Commander of the Legion, Oren Lockhart, and ON member Jo Grafton who chaired the project. We have provided desserts for the Legion and the VFW for 10 years now. After the veteran's day parade the vets go to the Legion for a free lunch. The VFW did not have a lunch this year due to COVID.



BOMBA SOCKS - WASHINGTON STATE PROJECT

It is the 'Bomba Socks'. As they advertise about Bomba Socks – that for every pair of socks that they sell – they donate a pair. I became aware of it 2 yrs ago and receive 2 shipments (1 per year) of 1,000 pair of socks.

All you do is go to: giving@bombasocks.com and request an order application. They ship out the socks mid spring at 1,000 pair. You can request different styles, such as child's, mixed or men's. Because we were doing it for the veterans, I ordered men's. I received 500 pr of mid-calf and 500 pair of ankle socks – all black. Last year I kept 250 pair for our local vets and gave the Am Legion 750 pair. This year I gave 500 pair to the Union Gospel mission and the other 500 pair to a local TV station that does a big 'Treats for Troops' event.

It is such an easy thing to do – all you have to do is fill out the application by email, return it and they will then confirm your application and send you an email as to delivery date.

You may want to pass this suggestion along after researching it and perhaps even putting it on the Hope for Heroes website on the ESA website. The only thing you really have to agree to is that you will not sell the socks. They are valued at \$10/pair. so.....you can claim that \$10/pr as your chapter donation.

Greetings from Arizona!




Indiana members have been very busy finding new and creative ways to continue to give.

Ohio (cont)


