Pastor's Point

Pr. J. David Bryant

Dear Friends---

In Luke 10:25-28, the Evangelist tells us,

"25 Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. [i] 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' ²⁶ Jesus said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' ²⁷ He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself.' ²⁸ And Jesus said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.'"

Jesus turns the lawyer back to the law for a time: of personal reflection, to look at his priorities, to be honest about what one must do to "inherit eternal life." Jesus might as well have asked the guy to join us in Lent. Beginning next week, we enter Lent, our time: of personal reflection, to look at our priorities, to be honest about what one must do to "inherit eternal life."

Some are probably already feeling overwhelmed at the thought of traditional forms of penance: fasting, prayer, laying down vices, taking up positive practices, and almsgiving. Lent calls us to this uncomfortable, at times, overwhelming space in which we reflect on whether God is the God of our admiration only, rather than the God we follow who calls us to make real, sometimes even painful, lasting changes.

On Ash Wednesday, we will hear Jesus say to us in Matthew 6, "...whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites." We will also hear Jesus say to us, in Matthew 6, "...whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others."

Further, Jesus will say, "...whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others."

The hypocrite, receiving his/her reward from people, conceals his/her true feelings, his/her true thoughts, his/her true personality, living a hidden, secretive life...doing one thing when in full view, doing something else when hidden from view. The hypocrite leads a divided life for a hypocrite has a divided heart.

Jesus reminds his disciples how what matters to God is what one possesses in the depths of one's heart. God knows the depths of our hearts. We know those depths in part, yet God knows them in full. In Lent, God's Church invites us to enter the depths of our hearts, and to give weight to how God looks upon what we find in those murky bottoms. Perhaps, we will find God down there. Bear in mind how Jesus says to us in Matthew 6: "...where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

At the beginning of these forty Lenten days, remember Mary, Mother of our Lord, who at the wedding of Cana, instructed household servants, "Do whatever he (Jesus) tells you." (John 2:5). Whatever Jesus reveals to us this Lent, let us do it. Remember what Jesus says to the lawyer in Luke 10, "...do this, and you will live."

May it be so with us. JDB+

WELCA Eve Circle Bible Study Tuesday, March 15 @ 11:30 a.m. Bible Study "The Kingdom of God"

The kingdom of God: What does it mean for God to be in charge?

by the Rev. Mark Allan Powell

The phrase "kingdom of God" and similar expressions turn up repeatedly in sayings of Jesus, so understanding what that expression means helps us to make sense of numerous parables and popular Bible passages (including the Lord's Prayer). There may be some surprises: the phrase refers to an activity, not a location—and it has nothing to do with God being a "king," at least as far as that image suggests a (usually male) tyrant who gives orders and dominates the lives of his subjects.

Session #3: Eternal life in the Gospel of John – In the fourth Gospel Jesus uses the expression "eternal life" to talk about what he calls the "kingdom of God" in the other Gospels. The phrase does not just refer to life that is eternally long, but also (indeed, especially) to life that is eternally deep-life that is endless in value and meaning. We will look at some popular passages, including John 3:16 and the story of Jesus and the woman at the well to discover how our lives can be marked by love and purpose.

<u>Needed for DAILY BREAD Health/Hygiene Kits:</u> miscellaneous items needed, i.e., sample/motel size toiletries (shampoo, soap, conditioner, lotions), deodorant, toothpaste and toothbrushes, shaving cream, hair combs and brushes for women and men, razors, sanitary pads, wash cloths, chapstick or lip balm, bug spray and sunscreen.

Also needed, are laundry pods for laundry services and for clients.

Highlights of the February Church Council Meeting

The IT Committee will be meeting in the next several weeks to discuss updating our video equipment. Pastor. Bryant will apply for a grant to cover the cost of new equipment.

The Church Council realized that in 2022, we will have some new expenses. In order to save some costs, the Council voted to change the number of people sent to the annual Synod Assembly. At the Annual Congregational Meeting, an objection was raised that the Council could not make that change without changing the Constitution. To avoid the need to call a special meeting, the Council has reversed that recommendation. We now need two volunteers to attend this year's Synod Assembly. If anyone is interested, please contact me or Pastor Bryant Council was asked to approve having a Boy Scout Troop along with our Cub Scout Pack. The Orlando Diocese has decided to part ways with the Boy Scouts of America; therefore, the Boy Scout Troop at St. Joseph's Catholic Church on Babcock St. will be losing their Charter and need a new place to meet. The Troop leaders, who are part of Joy's Cub Scout Pack, are asking if Joy would sponsor the Troop. After discussion, the Church Council Is proud to have approved the Boy Scouts from St. Joseph's Catholic Church to begin meeting here at Joy on Monday evenings. It was the right thing to do. By having a new Boy Scout Troop at Joy, we are showing God's love for one another as said in 1st John 4:16 "So we have come to know and to believe the Love that God has for us. God is Love and whoever abides in Love abides in God and God abides in them."

Kim Tolley, our Church Treasurer, has started her 21st year as our Treasurer. Kim spends 20-25 hours per month working on our finances while doing her full-time job and helping with her grandchildren. Also, until our Financial Secretary is comfortable with her position, Kim spends an additional 5 hours a week doing the Vanco records, printing, creating envelopes, counter sheets, and deposit spreadsheets. She also spends about one additional hour a month on the Memorial Fund finances. Kim does this job as a volunteer and although it has come before council on multiple occasions over the years, has never received any kind of appreciation or any kind of compensation for this job. Kim not only pays our bills, but she also watches every penny that is spent, she does the payroll for our 4 employees, she creates our yearly budget. She applied for an SBA Loan during the beginning of the pandemic. The loan was approved. And, that allowed us to keep our employees on the payroll. She also spent additional numerous hours applying for IRS tax refunds which totaled over \$14,000.00. All of this was above and beyond her job duties as outlined in Joy's Constitution. The Church Council thought it was time to do something special in appreciation for her 20 years of service. Since, according to our Constitution, section C.12.05 C "The Congregation Council May enter into contracts of up to 5% for items not included in the budget". Therefore, the council unanimously voted to give Kim an appreciation stipend in the amount of \$5,000.00. The Council felt Kim was worthy of praise on her commendable work for Joy as said in Philippians 4:8 "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is pure, whatever is just and fair, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." And, as Pr. Bryant has often reminded us, to quote St. Paul. "For the scripture says, "You shall not muzzle an ox while it is treading out the grain," and, 'The laborer deserves to be paid." 1Timothy 5:18.

IF YOU: Were exposed to COVID-19 and are NOT up to date on COVID-19 vaccinations

Quarantine for at least 5 days

Stay home - Stay home and <u>quarantine</u> for at least 5 full days.

Wear a well-fitted mask if you must be around others in your home.

Get tested - Even if you don't develop symptoms, get tested at least 5 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.

After quarantine

Watch for symptoms - Watch for symptoms until 10 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.

If you develop symptoms - <u>Isolate</u> immediately and get tested. Continue to stay home until you know the results. Wear a well-fitted mask around others.

Take precautions until day 10

Wear a mask - Wear a well-fitted mask for 10 full days any time you are around others inside your home or in public. Do not go to places where you are unable to wear a mask.

Avoid being around people who are at high risk

IF YOU: Were exposed to COVID-19 and are up to date on COVID-19 vaccinations

No quarantine - You do not need to stay home **unless** you develop symptoms.

Get tested - Even if you don't develop symptoms, get tested at least 5 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.

Watch for symptoms - Watch for symptoms until 10 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.

If you develop symptoms - <u>Isolate</u> immediately and get tested. Continue to stay home until you know the results. Wear a well-fitted mask around others.

Take precautions until day 10

Wear a mask - Wear a well-fitted mask for 10 full days any time you are around others inside your home or in public. Do not go to places where you are unable to wear a mask.

Avoid being around people who are at high risk

IF YOU: were exposed to COVID-19 and had confirmed COVID-19 within the past 90 days (you tested positive using a viral test)

No quarantine - You do not need to stay home unless you develop symptoms.

Watch for symptoms - Watch for symptoms until 10 days after you last had close contact with someone with COVID-19.

If you develop symptoms - <u>Isolate</u> immediately and get tested. Continue to stay home until you know the results. Wear a well-fitted mask around others.

Take precautions until day 10

Wear a mask - Wear a well-fitted mask for 10 full days any time you are around others inside your home or in public. Do not go to places where you are unable to wear a mask.

Avoid being around people who are at high risk

Calculating Isolation: Day 0 is your first day of symptoms or a positive viral test. **Day 1 is the first full day after your symptoms developed or your test specimen was collected**. If you have COVID-19 or have symptoms, isolate for at least 5 days.

IF YOU: Tested positive for COVID-19 or have symptoms, regardless of vaccination status

Stay home for at least 5 days - Stay home for 5 days and <u>isolate</u> from others in your home.

Wear a well-fitted mask if you must be around others in your home.

Ending isolation if you had symptoms - End isolation after 5 full days if you are fever-free for 24 hours (without the use of fever-reducing medication) and your symptoms are improving.

Ending isolation if you did NOT have symptoms - <u>End isolation after at least 5 full days</u> after your positive test.

If you were severely ill with COVID-19 or are immunocompromised

You should isolate for at least 10 days. Consult your doctor before ending isolation.

Take precautions until day 10

Wear a mask - Wear a well-fitted mask for 10 full days any time you are around others inside your home or in public. Do not go to places where you are unable to wear a mask.

Avoid being around people who are at high risk

DEFINITIONS

Exposure: Contact with someone infected with SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, in a way that increases the likelihood of getting infected with the virus.

Close Contact: A close contact is someone who was less than 6 feet away from an infected person (laboratory-confirmed or a clinical diagnosis) for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period. For example, three individual 5-minute exposures for a total of 15 minutes. People who are exposed to someone with COVID-19 after they completed at least 5 days of isolation are not considered close contacts.

COVID-19 symptoms, isolate from other people and follow recommendations in the <u>Isolation</u> section below. If you tested positive for COVID-19 with a <u>viral test</u> within the previous 90 days and subsequently recovered and remain without COVID-19 symptoms, you do not need to quarantine or get tested after close contact. You should wear a <u>well-fitting mask</u> around others for 10 days from the date of your last close contact with someone with COVID-19 (the date of last close contact is considered day 0).

Who should quarantine?

If you come into close contact with someone with COVID-19, you should quarantine if you are not <u>up to</u> date on COVID-19 vaccines. This includes people who are not vaccinated.
