

Pastor's Point

Friends---

Here we are in the center of Easter and at the front of a Florida Spring. Some of us are probably noting how flower buds and greening yards are like resurrection. In fact, we're probably creating a theology of Spring. Speaking of which, does Spring have a theology?

It must. Somewhere amid afternoon thunderstorms and high pollen counts, Spring must have a theology. Somewhere along the Indian River Lagoon, as water hyacinths exert control, and vacationers from afar begin to dream of trips to Florida beaches and the Land of the Mouse, Spring's theology is born.

Maybe you equate Spring's theology with Easter – the newly greened grass is the same as the newly risen Jesus. That is not true, not by a country mile. The rising of Jesus is grander, more magnificent, and more mysterious than Dollar weed attacking your yard. The resurrection of Jesus cannot be confined to Spring.

It moves in Summer's storms. It dances on Fall's leaves. It happens in Winter, when I-95 teams with southbound travelers whose license plates read Ontario, Quebec, Vermont, and so many more.

No, Easter is present in every season. Spring's theology points to Easter, but it is not Easter. Spring is different. Spring's theology is about cycles and life rhythms. Where Easter resurrects once, for all, Spring plays the circle of birth, death, rebirth. Where Easter marks the call of unconditional love, everlasting and unshakable, Spring plays at romantic love . . . its roller coaster of joy, let-downs, and unrequited passions.

As Easter speaks of life everlasting, Spring plays at sending rain at 9am, sun at 10am, breezes at 11am, then rain again by high noon! It is Spring's Florida way. Easter is joy, complete and entire. Spring is rain and shine, joy and let-down, plans and interruptions all swirled together.

Easter is a sure bet . . . Spring, not so much.

Because Easter is a sure bet, we can open the door to Spring and head outside to play, knowing that at the heart of Spring, pounds Easter, our sure foundation. And any up or down, sun or rain, even life or death, is held within the resurrection of Jesus and is, therefore, beautiful. And a theology of Spring, for all its predictable unpredictability, is just that ... beauty.

Enjoy it.

On Sunday, April 23rd at 10am we had the distinct pleasure of Pastor Lori Fuller, founding pastor of Palms Deaf Church (PDC) in Palm Coast, Florida, officiate at our Worship Service assisted by her two interpreters.

PDC was established in 2021 by Pastor Lori Fuller who has been deaf since birth. Lori received a Master of Divinity from Luther Seminary in June of 2021 and was ordained on February 27th, 2022. She is working with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), Florida Bahamas Synod, and St. Mark by the Sea Lutheran Church in Palm Coast, Florida. PDC works to change the statistics of where 95-98% of Deaf people are unchurched, and there are almost one million Deaf people in Florida. PDC will help meet this need by offering a hybrid ministry.

Thank you Pastor Lori for leading us in worship and thank you for your ministry of reaching out to the deaf.

Please remember DAILY BREAD depends on volunteers. Volunteers are needed for dining hall, outreach center and warehouse – help needed 7 days a week.

Daily Bread provided 49,757 free meals and 12,748 showers to 1,091 people last year. The nonprofit helped 147 people find housing in 2021 — but Daily Bread Executive Director Jeff Njus said that sum tumbled to 51 last year because of higher housing costs in Brevard County.


"BREAD OF LIFE" BACKPACK PROGRAM

Armed Forces Day "**May 20, 2023**" is an opportunity for us to recognize all of our veterans who have faithfully served our country.

A special thank you goes out to our very own "WWII Veteran," Luther Radway.



Luther Radway left his home in Jamaica in 1944 to live with relatives in New York City. Six (6) weeks after his arrival, he was conscripted for military service in World War II. He trained at Fort Lewis, Washington for fifteen weeks, and then at Fort Jackson in South Carolina for an additional six weeks. He was then sent to join the forces in the European Theatre of Operations (ETO). Luther was assigned to the Third Army, as a Combat Engineer, located in Bremen, Germany. His outfit was sent to the combat zone in Elman, Germany to build an airstrip. Fortunately, the war was over within three months following his assignment.

His "high point" was having been honorably discharged with a letter of appreciation and thanks from President Truman, and the recipient of the Ruptured Duck (Honorable Discharge Lapel Pin) awarded to honorably discharged WWII veterans.

His "low point" was having served in a segregated army.

Black Americans have been the victims of racial oppression, but have always supported the nation, especially during wartime. When World War II erupted, over 2.5 million black men registered for the draft and one million served as draftees or volunteers in all of the branches of the Armed Forces during conflict. Most black men who served were in the Army and were relegated to segregated combat support groups.

Thank you Luther, for your patriotic service.

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Did You Know?

Did you know...

Easter lilies, a church symbol which usually causes a lot of stress in congregations, on account of heady scents, high prices, and hard-to-get-out yellow pollen, were not always associated with Feast of the Resurrection (Easter Sunday)? Did you know the popular plants are not even remotely native to any place around Jerusalem? Easter lilies are native to Japan and came to the U.S. along with ornamental cherry trees and odious, noxious kudzu.

Per CNN correspondent, Jill Brooke, "Following World War I, a soldier named Louis Houghton brought a suitcase of lily bulbs from Japan back to the U.S., specifically to his home state of Oregon. Houghton gave the lily bulbs to his horticultural friends, and soon enough, the area along the California-Oregon border, which happened to have prime growing conditions for the flowers, became known as the 'Easter Lily Capital of the World.'

After Pearl Harbor, Japanese shipments were no longer welcome which created more demand for Easter lilies from Oregon and especially California growers. And just like Detroit became known for cars, soon Smith River, California, home to less than 900 residents, produced 95% of the world's Easter lily bulbs."

So, why are 20th century Japanese flowers associated with one particular, 1st century Jew who is raised from the dead? Because 7th century theologian, the Venerable Bede, associated the lily with the Virgin Mary, giving rise to even more lily legends. Per Allan Swenson, in *Flowers of the Bible and How to Grow Them*, (Citadel Press, 2002), "According to a pious legend, after the Death and Resurrection of Our Lord, some of these beautiful flowers were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus went to pray the night before His Crucifixion. Legend has it that these flowers sprung up where drops of Christ's blood fell as he prayed. Thus, they are called the 'white robed apostles of hope.""

"Digging Deeper"

For those who are looking to do a 'deep dive' into what it means to be '**Walking Wet**.' A short course of 10 1-hr sessions facilitated by Linda Collins. Sessions will begin Thursday, April 20th, 10am. These sessions are especially useful if you are new to JOY. These will help you connect and build friendships. There are six slots available. A signup sheet will be in the narthex on April 1st. See Linda Collins or Pr. Bryant if you have questions.

Beginning Thursday, April 20th at 10am, here at JOY, we have a chance to "Dig Deeper" into what it means to be "**Walking Wet**." Co-facilitators, Linda Collins and Rene' Harper will guide us on a journey of 10-hour long sessions that explore what it means to be a Jesus Follower: from the moment we are splashed in the font, and then move from the font into living our life in grace.

This is not a lecture-styled study. The format for these sessions is small group discussion centered on the Gospels. There is space for six people. We are capped at 6 people because too many people in the study makes it hard to stay within the hour-long period and inhibits the formation of intimacy required for sharing to occur. PROPERTY COMMITTEE

I. A regular meeting of the Property Committee was called to order at 9:10 AM

II. The following members were present, Gary Sherman, Harold Lengel, James Collins, Jackie Baudek, and Erik Mäenpää. Also present, Linda Collins

III. Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

IV. Old Business.

a) GFI outlets to be installed on the outside of the building. Gary Krause is working on taking care of this.

b) Repair the outside outlet on the east side of the building, at the base of the parking lot light pole by the small wood foot bridge, Gary Krause is working on this.

c) Rest room countertops, James Collins has ordered the material he will start the project in two to three weeks as current schedule permits.

V. New Business.

a) Install a handrail by the entrance door of the entrance to the large shed. James Collins suggested some ideas for the handrail and after a brief discussion it was decided to ask James to come back with some pricing and further information.

b) Paint the exterior doors of the church and the sheds. Short discussion followed on the condition of the doors and concern that some of the doors may need to be replaced. It was decided to look at each door to see if we need to replace the door or simply paint the doors.

c) Playground equipment. We have had to repair the playground equipment in the past few weeks several times. A brief discussion followed with recommendation to have age/height limits posted in the playground. Harold Lengel is taking the rock-climbing board home to replace the broken wood.

d) Hot water heater in the pastor's office and the ladies' restroom. It was decided to recommend to the Church Council to have small water heater units installed in both areas.

e) Dehumidifier in the ladies' side of the large shed. The ladies had requested that we install a dehumidifier in the ladies' side of the large shed. The committee will determine the size of the unit needed and the best location for the installation. The Committee will report back to the ladies as to the cost before installation. (Funding provided by the WELCA)

f) Cleaning out and reorganizing the two property garages. The Committee will start to work on the garages as regular maintenance and grounds keeping will permit.

g) Storage closet Wollom-Jackson room. There is a need to have a closet for the storage of items currently in the Sanctuary and other rooms to be stored in the Wollom-Jackson room. The Committee will determine the size and configuration of the closet to be built based on items to be stored.

h) Harold Lengel recommended to have the Calvary crew power wash the new metal shed on Saturday April 1, 2023. Jackie asked to have the bed between the large shed opening to be cleaned and the old plants removed also at the same time.

I) James Collins recommended to have the round light fixtures under the portico replaced as they are getting dull and dim. The cost would be about \$100.00.

j) James Collins also recommended to have GFI outlets installed in the kitchen. We will ask Gary Krause to install the outlets.

k) Jackie Baudek and Linda Collins requested to have a doorbell installed by the from door of the main entrance. This led to further discussion on the need to install basic security cameras both inside and outside the building. It was decided to look into this and see if the Committee could take care of the purchase and installation.

I) Harold Lengel indicated that the chain link fence at the East side and South side of the property needed some replacement poles to be installed. We will determine the number of poles to be installed and recommend the repairs be made.

m) James Collins indicated that the air duct covers would need to be cleaned and painted. He would be taking care of this.

VI. Adjournment. The meeting was adjourned at 10:15 AM
