Thank you for taking on this important task! Here are some instructions on how to plant milkweed seeds. If you have any questions, or simply want to get in touch you can use the following email address:

Milkweed seeds need to be planted in the fall and stay cold throughout the winter in order to bloom in springtime.

- 1. Bring seeds out to the planting area.
- Clear away any mulch or rocks which could potentially block plan growth.
- 3. Water the area thoroughly and let it saturate the soil.
- 4. Loosen the soil. Stick your index finger in the dirt up to the first knuckle.
- 5. Repeat this process for each seed you are planting.
- 6. Place a seed in each hole.
- 7. Cover the seeds with the already moist soil. You can place a few inches of straw or leaf mulch over the area to keep the soil from drying out.
- 8. Mark the seeds with plant labels.
- 9. Enjoy!



A Life of Collecting


Millena and Tim Coffey have turned their Lumberville home into a showcase for art and antiques from around the globe.



Then Millena and Tim Coffey bought their home in Lumberville in 1995, they named it Buckshire to honor Bucks County and the shires of Great Britain, one of their favorite spots for antiquing. But perhaps they should have called it Buckshire Museum, since their chateau-style home and two outbuildings are packed with antique collections from around the globe, including their former homes in Europe and the Middle East.

In the living room, about three dozen red-and-black plaid wooden objects known as Tartanware are neatly arranged on a table. Dating to early nineteenth-century Scotland, they are mostly small boxes with the distinctive Stewart clan plaid. One box opens to reveal a two-inch leather-bound Bible, complete with tiny text.





Sophie Glovier

concern over disappearing
farmlands and the resulting

When Sophie Glovier sees a need, she quietly

steps in to fill it. A chance comment from a friend saying she did not know

how to navigate the public

impact on water supply, which led to a career in local conservation. Sophie served four years as chair of the Princeton Environmental Commission, where she was integral in the passing of a resolution calling for the release of a new statewide water-supply plan, the first in 20 years.

Sophie currently serves as assistant director of policy at The Watershed Institute, whose mission is to keep water clean, safe, and healthy through education about more intense green infrastructure and smart environmental policy. A recent project involves creating native-plant-filled floating sponges to combat harmful algal blooms appearing in local lakes. When asked what we all can do to help with water conservation, Sophie offers two easy suggestions: one, simple lawn aeration, which can mitigate what has become an almost impervious surface; and two, plant natives—their deep roots are critical to containing stormwater runoff.

Although she is a graduate of Princeton University and received an MBA from Columbia University and a post-masters Certificate in Sustainability from The New School, Sophie cites her work on the GCA's National Affairs & Legislation and Conservation committees as the best education she ever received.

Vivian Todd

A knowledgeable advocate for the eradication of invasive species, Vivian Todd never thought her passion would lead her to the local port in Beaumont, Texas, and the issue of ballast water. The Port of Beaumont is the fifth-busiest port in the nation by tonnage and brags eight berths with three more going up. Ships carrying everything from bulk grain to military cargo gain access from the Gulf of Mexico and the Intracoastal Waterway. These freighters also bring with them invasive species from all over the world captured in the ballast water tanks. While


studying land-based invasives, Vivian soon learned the larger threat to our US waters is aquatics, with costs in damages stretching into the billions annually.




