





Pastor's Page

As I am writing this, we are about to enter into the season of Lent. In Lent we are called to consider the question, "Is it all about me?" It is easy to say "no". But, do our words and/or actions say something else? In this season of the church year the Biblical texts that we will read and hear in worship on Sunday morning are meant to shed light on how far diverted our quest for righteousness can become when we rely on our own works. Scripture begs us to look for God's righteousness, no matter how difficult it may be for us to perceive, and to leave behind our own empty gestures and intentions. There is opportunity in Lent to let our prayers be confessional in that we can name before God the ways in which we have turned to our own will and desires. However, our intercessions remain the means by which we call out to God for holy work to be done in the world and not just in ourselves. Therefore, we might not only confess our shortcomings but also ask God to turn us again into the flow of righteousness and to make our words and actions reflect God's redeeming work.



The season of Lent culminates in the liturgy of the Passion. In the Passion readings we hear the things that God has desired for us all along: the faithful obedience of the suffering servant, an honest naming of the pain and distress that the psalmist has endured, a poetic description of Jesus' self-emptying on the cross, and an ultimate discovery of our life, not by our own fulfilling of God's commandments, but in the death of God's Anointed One. Such immersion in our life in Jesus Christ may give shape to our prayers throughout the entire season of Lent.

- How might we beg God to stir up faithful obedience in us as God did in Abraham?
- How can we encourage such honest dialogue about the pain of the world as Jesus had with the woman at the well, and as there was between Moses and the refugees of the exodus?
- How might we ask God to turn us again into the flow of righteousness, from trusting in our own works to trusting in God's work that allows us to empty ourselves for the sake of our human siblings and all of creation?
- How could we focus on looking for God's life in the world in the most unexpected of people and places, finding it even where death's shadow looms largest, like the graves of Lazarus and Jesus?

For it is at the grave where we are unmistakably bound to the God we know in and through Jesus Christ who is prepared to lead us into the new life for which we pray.

Jesus leading causes us to do things we are not used to doing and/or in an order in which we are not used to doing them. To aid us on this journey that we are about take together through the 40 days of Lent, we will meet on Wednesday evenings for Supper, and then for Worship for renewal and encouragement. But, I am going to warn you now that at dinner we will be asked to sit in configurations that we are not accustomed to

sitting. After Supper we will gather in the sanctuary. Our theme on Wednesday evening during worship will be "Eyes on Jesus". This will in all likelihood not be a configuration that you are used to using for worship.

And, while we are in worship, we will consider the thought that when the people that encountered Jesus looked at Jesus, what did they see? *Eyes on Jesus* ask us to look at Jesus through various Biblical characters' viewpoints, learning how they saw Jesus. Did they misunderstand Him? Did they recognize Him as the Son of God? Will you be challenged (yourself) to consider what you see when you look at Jesus? Interesting thought isn't it? Looking forward to the Lenten journey with you.

Applying Biblical Principles

There are some wonderful principles in the Old Testament that apply to present-day Christians. One of these is found in Deuteronomy 8:10-18 which says:

“You shall eat your fill and bless the LORD your God for the good land that he has given you.

¹¹Take care that you do not forget the LORD your God, by failing to keep his commandments, his ordinances, and his statutes, which I am commanding you today. ¹²When you have eaten your fill and have built fine houses and live in them, ¹³and when your herds and flocks have multiplied, and your silver and gold is multiplied, and all that you have is multiplied, ¹⁴then do not exalt yourself, forgetting the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, ¹⁵who led you through the great and terrible wilderness, an arid wasteland with poisonous snakes and scorpions. He made water flow for you from flint rock, ¹⁶and fed you in the wilderness with manna that your ancestors did not know, to humble you and to test you, and in the end to do you good. ¹⁷Do not say to yourself, “My power and the might of my own hand have gotten me this wealth.” ¹⁸But remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth, so that he may confirm his covenant that he swore to your ancestors, as he is doing today.”

In truth, all that we have comes from God. Whether it be money, gold, silver, houses, land, bank accounts, stocks, bonds, etc. It all belongs to God in the first place, and our God entrusts it to us. We know that according to David’s prayer in 1 Chronicles 29, riches, honor, power, and wealth all come from God.

That’s why there is no such thing as a self-made person. Oh, we have to do our part. God’s plan is not that we just sit around praying and reading the Bible all day long so that what we need to survive will miraculously drop into our hands. We are each called to a vocation (whether it be as a teacher, a doctor, a nurse, a business person, a sales associate, a store cashier, or a greeter at the local store, etc.) in which we honor God and serve the people of God using that vocation. We’re not just to pray for our

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“daily bread,” but we’re also to get up each day and work for it! That’s why the Apostle Paul stated clearly, “Anyone unwilling to work should not eat” (2 Thes. 3:10). Money and wealth which we receive is distributed by God according to God’s divine will and knowledge. God entrusts to each of us a portion which is used for the building up of ourselves and the kingdom of God.

What should be our reaction to our financial state? Some might pray with a question in mind which is similar to the words of the character, Oliver Twist who asked, “Sir, may I have some more?” As if they were praying, “Dear Lord, you must have made a mistake concerning me and my finances. Please give me more money.” Others might try to circumvent God’s design for their lives by trying to win the lottery or to obtain large sums of money through some other means. In faithfulness, followers of Jesus realize God’s infinite wisdom far surpasses their limited perspective. They will accept with a thankful spirit what God has entrusted to them and seek to honor God by their living and by their giving.

Fully embarrassed, the usher asked, "Do you know who I am?"




Just as CPR helps you assist an individual having a heart attack – even if you have no clinical training – Mental Health First Aid helps you assist someone experiencing a mental health related crisis. In the Mental Health First Aid course, you will learn risk factors and warning signs for mental health and addiction concerns, strategies for how to help someone in both crisis and non-crisis situations, and where to turn for help. Mental Health First Aid teaches about recovery and resiliency – the belief that individuals experiencing these challenges can and do get better and use their strength to stay well.

Dr. Jenenne R. Valentino-Bottaro and Dr. Nancy Wood will teach us how to apply the Mental Health First Aid action plan in a variety of situations including when someone is experiencing panic attacks, suicidal behaviors, acute psychosis or reaction to trauma. The opportunity to practice through role play, scenarios, and activities makes it easier to apply these skills in a real-life situation.

There will be a minimum of 15 participants and maximum of 30 participants registered. In addition to the certification as a Mental Health First Aider, you can receive 8 Continuing Education Units (CEU's).



Joyful noise



Use your voice and this hand-crafted percussion instrument to make joyful noises to the Lord.

What you need:

- Dry beans (about one Tbsp)
- Plastic Easter egg
- 2 plastic spoons
- Masking tape
- Markers and stickers

What you do:

1. Place the beans inside the egg and snap it closed.
2. Set the egg in a spoon and cover it with the second spoon so the spoons are holding the egg.
3. Tape the spoons to the egg. Also wrap tape around the spoons from top to bottom to make a shaker handle.
4. Decorate your shaker and use it as you sing praises to God.
5. Experiment with sounds by filling other eggs with coins, rice, and so on.
