

Pastor's Page

We are now coming to the end of the Easter season and we are about to enter into the season of Pentecost. However, there is one special festival day, Ascension Day that is sandwiched in that takes place 40 days after Easter and 10 days before Pentecost. Acts 1:6-11 recalls the events of that day when the disciples witnessed Jesus ascension into Heaven.

The story goes like this:

So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." ⁹When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going, and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."



That last verse is the one that catches my attention. After Jesus has ascended, the disciples are standing there looking up. Can you picture them standing there? The way the story is told, it seems as if they are just standing there and saying, "Wow!" when suddenly two men in white robes (assumed to be angels) appear and they ask the disciples why they are standing there looking up. What are they expecting to see? Just maybe that is a command disguised as a question. The angels are telling them, you know what you were prepared to do by Jesus. What are you waiting for – get going!

The disciples and a few others are the early church. Remember, I have told you all what the word "church" means. The word literally means, "the ones who are called out." They have been "called out" by Jesus to hear the good news and they are now "called out" to continue to share the message of Jesus after Jesus' departure so others – may be "called out". And, as we know, the rest is history. We (you and I) are now part of the Church. "The ones who are called out." But, what does that mean for us?

Here's the thing. Many times, we are like the disciples in the story of Ascension Day. We hear the story. We know the story. But, does it really sink in as to what we should be doing? Have you ever heard the lines that say, "When God wants to get your attention, God will toss a pebble into your life. If that does not work, God will throw a rock."? I, recently, read an article that also added a line at the end that says, "As a last resort, God will heave a brick!" Maybe the angels words to the disciples was a rock that God was sending their way to get their attention.

Has God tossed a pebble, a rock or a brick into your life? God has tossed a number of those items into my life from time-to-time in order to get my attention. The first one I can remember is when Linda and I were told Michael was not going to be the normal little pink baby we (as a society) have normally come to expect and our lives changed. Our plans for a family changed that day, but I also later came to better understand something about living with disabilities! The next event that I can recall was when I was struggling with a call to the ministry. I had a career, a home, and a family and now I was struggling with a career change, selling a home, giving up an income, and moving in order to become a fulltime student. I learned about being faithful and trusting in the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The next event that I recall was in conjunction with an illness. The illness happened to my cousin's daughter, Abby. My cousin, Brian, and his wife, Janine, were missionaries in Tanzania when Abby was born. When she was about 6 months old, Abby contracted malaria. She is doing well now, but every once in a while you can see the effects of the disease. Through that experience, I learned that children in many places in Africa (and the third world) die every day to perfectly preventable illnesses. They do not have access to the vaccines needed to save lives. There are many other events that I could recall, but it would take too much space and time to list. So, I will end with the latest "brick" that was thrown into Linda's and my life. It really got my attention. This event (as most of you already know) was my son Michael's massive stroke a couple of weeks ago. Michael's life will never be the same again. Linda's and my life will never be the same again. What is God up to in all this? What do I do? What does Linda do? What will Michael do? As part of the "ones called out" what will we do? How shall we live? Through this, and the other incidents in my life, it has come to the point where I simply ask, "Okay God, where are we going with this one?"

Okay all you "ones who are called out," have you had any bricks thrown into your life lately? Like the disciples, we should look up and follow where we are led.

Applying Biblical Principles

It is no stretch of the imagination to think that if Jesus were alive now on earth, He would make staying in touch with His heavenly Father a priority. He would find time for prayer.

This was His practice during His time on earth. Before choosing the twelve, Jesus spent the night in prayer. He met alone with God regularly early in the morning right up to the time of His crucifixion. In fact, Jesus lived out the truth of Psalm 5:3, "O Lord, in the morning You hear my voice; in the morning I plead my case to You, and watch."

Other Bible characters did the same thing. Moses, Paul, Daniel, Elijah and David spent significant amounts of time in prayer and in seeking the mind and will of God. Moses spent significant time in the

desert of Midian before his confrontation with Pharaoh. Paul spent a significant amount of time in the desert listening to God before moving forward in his apostolic work. In spite of being a busy government official, Daniel found time to pray three times a day. And David, the man Scripture describes as one who was “after God’s own heart,” wrote again and again about seeking God in a quiet place. Listen to his words from Psalm 63:

O God, you are my God, I seek you, my soul thirsts for you; my flesh faints for you, as in a dry and weary land where there is no water. So I have looked upon you in the sanctuary, beholding your power and glory. Because your steadfast love is better than life, my lips will praise you.

Martin Luther once said, “I have so much to do today that I shall spend the first three hours in prayer.” How could he do that? Was it because Dr. Luther had nothing better to do? Not at all. It was because he had determined that both the business and busy-ness of the day would not hinder his devotion to and relationship with Almighty God. Like us, how Luther used his time was a matter of priority.

If Martin Luther, Moses, Paul, Daniel, David and Jesus all spent time alone with God, what does that say to us? As we evaluate how we use our time, we must remember to put into practice this simple truth: One of the best things we can do with our time is to spend time alone each day with God.

A new old way to pray

An ancient Jewish form of prayer, still in use today, involves sprinkling one's day with short prayers of gratitude to God. The prayer typically begins: "Blessed are you, O Lord our God, king of the universe, who ..." and concludes with a phrase that fits the specific situation. Such a prayer works well in good circumstances and bad. For example:

- "Blessed are you, O Lord our God, king of the universe, who has provided clean water for my shower this morning."
- "Blessed are you, O Lord ... who brings friends to support me in my grief."
- "Blessed are you, O Lord ... who has blessed me with a keen mind; please help me focus while I take this test."
- "Blessed are you, O Lord ... who holds my children in unconditional love."

Try using this form of prayer liberally as a way to "pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17) and to weave your faith throughout your day.

Craft 'N Share

Even though we haven't met since February due to restrictions resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, we have kept busy at home.

In April, three of us made 60 face masks for SOS volunteers and an additional 10 were left in the church office for members, as needed. Four of us are now working on Pastor Dennis' request for face masks for congregation use when worship, tentatively scheduled for May 31, resumes.

We've also made cloth totes for new members and will cut and sew more when we're able to meet together again at church.

Several members sewed bears, and stuffed them for Seven Rivers Hospital emergency room. When we are able to resume our regular monthly meetings we will continue cutting, stuffing and sewing teddy bears for the hospital, as they have indicated a need for them in their emergency room, to comfort children needing their services. Remember to bring your fabric cutting shears when we do begin meeting at the church again.

Several crafters have kept busy making pillowcase dresses. In early May we mailed off a box of 11 to the headquarters in Rockwood, Michigan for the Little Dresses for Africa project. More have since been finished and will be mailed later in the year. This is another project that will continue.

We're also planning to continue projects using men's ties. We want to say "thank you" to several

members who have donated men's ties. Because of your generosity we now have several patterns to try using the beautiful ties!

We plan to make cloth backpack-style school bags for W/ELCA's LWR school supplies project which will be starting soon. This year they will be collecting supplies in July for LWR school kits. There is a list of needed items on the W/ELCA bulletin board in fellowship hall for local schools as well.

Here are some older projects that we are also planning to continue: adult clothing protectors, lap robes and shawls, and baby and child caps.

Please remember to always include a note with your name on any items you're donating and mark it "Craft 'N Share." You may leave them in the left closet (shared with the quilters) in the fellowship hall. We appreciate your help and gifts.

Thanks to numerous pillowcase donations we have been able to assemble several kits ready to sew into pillowcase dresses (and also supplies to assemble more kits with elastic and bias, ready to sew). We have patterns available for home sewers for pillowcase dresses and patterns for baby hats to knit or crochet.

Please note, if you need a lap robe to deliver to someone who is ill, in rehab, hospital or grieving, pick one up. The bins for SHAWLS and LAP ROBES are on the left side of the right hand closet in the rear of the fellowship hall, making it easier for you to access them. Please sign the clip board with your name and to whom you are delivering the item.

What you do:



1. Carefully thread a yard of floss through the needle.


