

his month I wish I could say, "Well, the beat goes on" but, I don't know how we can say that. The Coronavirus Pandemic is still wreaking havoc among us in this area and our building is closed to the public for the foreseeable future.

When will this mess end? When can we get back to normal? When God? How much longer? I know many of you are tired of "sheltering in place" and are tired of staring at the same four walls day in, day out and are asking that question in one form or another. I, myself, have been asking some of the same questions; especially when I could not travel to Pennsylvania for my uncle's funeral last month because of Coronavirus and when I cannot physically visit Michael inside the rehab. And, in my day-to-day life, I would love to be able to go to a restaurant again and sit down for a good meal and not have to worry about "social distancing".



If the Church is the gathered people of God called, gathered together, and sent for the sake of the world, how do we be "church" when we cannot gather together? I have been praying very hard for some wisdom and guidance for what to do in the unknown and unforeseeable future – short term and long term. There is no owner's manual for this one. In the midst of the social changes we have experienced in the last couple of months and the long-term social challenges we have been facing in the church for the last decade, I have been asking a question. With all the dramatic social changes, demographic changes we have experienced in the church and in the world, in our community, and in our neighborhoods, what is the Church? Do we continue to be what we have defined as "church" in the past? Do we need to find a new way to define "church"? Are we, as a congregation, being the community of believers that the Holy Spirit has put in this place? How do we bring the Gospel (Good News) to the community in a way that matters in the lives of the people of this community?

Perhaps, we need to understand the word "Church" in a new way. Maybe this is one of those times where we have to figure it out as we go. We can think all day, but that will not change anything. I think the Holy Spirit is calling for action not reflection. Pick up the phone, write emails, write letters if you have too. Reconnect! We cannot meet in person, but we can meet online. We can reconnect on the telephone. What about the wider community? If you are feeling lonely and left out, how do you think others who have no family in the area and have few friends are feeling right now? How do we help them to feel wanted and/or loved? The schools will be opening their doors again this month. How do you think parents are feeling as they send their children off to school to be in large groups of children most of the day? I bet many of them could use some comfort with the decision to send them back to the classroom.

Maybe we could be a little introspective as well. Have you ever asked what is God up to in our neighborhood

and how do we need to change in order to engage the people who are outside of our normal circles and make them part of the community? Maybe we need to change how we see things or how we respond and react to things?

There is still one thing that does not and will not change because of COVID-19! I find it encouraging that the love of God we know in and through Jesus does not change. It is like the Apostle, Paul said. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written: "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Did you catch that line, "in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us."? And, so we go on!

e believe in God. But...Do we have faith in God?

Have you said to anyone lately that you are glad that you are not growing up in today's world? --Remembering the good ol' days -we wonder, "How did things ever get this way"?

Have you expressed your concern for the lives of your grandchildren and great-grandchildren thinking, "What kind of a world will they grow up in?"



When I was a teenager, living in Maryland, I remember the riots in Baltimore and Cambridge. I remember the National Guard troops on the Choptank River bridge separating the protesting factions. I was working in a hamburger stand when the "Freedom Riders" got off the bus to see if we would serve them. I remember the riots in Chicago in 1967. The media called it a riot but the Black community saw it as a rebellion prompted by poor housing, racial profiling and police brutality.

Recently while watching the protests sparked by the

murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis, I was sadly reminded of how little we, as a whole society, have progressed.

I told Pastor Dennis that I wanted to write about "White Privilege" our newsletter. He agreed.

White Privilege description:

It is a disease, which the American Psychological Society described in 2016 as a social disease that is often unwillingly and unwittingly hosted by members of the dominate culture, which damages both the host and target individuals, as well as their families and communities. I would also add that it is a deadly disease because it goes largely unnoticed by anyone who is white. We are deaf, or worse, unwilling to hear the experiences that people of color speak about such as racial profiling, police brutality and discrimination in all areas of life.

White privilege has shaped Christianity for way too many, allowing for the justification for slavery, the creation of the KKK, and severe conservative thinking found in the John Birch Society. Racism is a disease that threatens our well-being. It grows when the cries of the underprivileged are not heard because of the color of their skin. Preventing the spread of this disease begins when we come together and celebrate our EQUALITY as children of God.

Jesus came to us, at the very least, to release those held captive by racist thinking, to give sight to those blinded by prejudice and help the oppressed go free. (Luke 4)

St. Paul suggests that we can overcome our divisions when we regard others as better than ourselves, not looking out for ourselves but for the interests of others (Phil2:3-4).

We believe in God. But...

Do we have faith in God?

Jesus tells us how to behave. That is, love God with all your being and love your neighbor as yourself. Do we have faith and trust Jesus to be our teacher?

Jesus shows us how to behave. The story of the Samaritan woman at the well and the story of Jesus healing the blind men are good lessons. Do we have faith and trust Jesus to be our example?

Jesus came to restore all of creation. God so loved the world that He gave His only Son that who so ever believes in Him shall not perish but will have eternal life. In Jesus, there is no race, no prejudice, no hatred, no discrimination and no privilege.

Can we have faith in Him, becoming His hands and heart, making this a better world?

Applying Biblical Principles

don't have enough time" is a litany that is heard frequently in many churches. Sometimes, it's heard here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. People make statements like this when asked to get involved in a greater way in this ministry:

- I don't have time to usher.
- I don't have time to do a bread run.
- I don't have time to sing in the choir.
- I don't have time to work in the kitchen.
- I don't have time to visit absentees or shut-ins.

How can this be? We have as much time as those in the past ever had. In fact, we have exactly the same amount of time: 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year (with one additional day in leap year!).

What does it really mean when people say, "I don't have enough time"? Rev. Steve Schlund, a pastor in Nebraska, answers that question:

Actually what people mean when they say they don't have enough time to worship and serve the Lord is that the time which is available to them has been used up. . . . There are just too many other things that we are involved in. When we are not working, we are committed to athletics, our children's or grandchildren's athletics, our leisure

activities, community activities, and so on. Our calendars get crammed fuller and fuller until they are about to burst. It's no wonder that people... choose not to serve the Lord during the week...

We can comfort ourselves and maybe even make God feel sorry for us if we plead, "I don't have enough time." But is that a reason or an excuse? While it is true that some situations demand an inordinate amount of hours of working by one parent or even both parents in order to provide for the needs of the family, often times we are working extra jobs and extra hours to support our "toys" those luxuries which, while making our lives enjoyable, are not necessary to support our lives. The problem often then is not that we have to work more to support our life style, but that we choose a life style that demands we work more.

In other words, we find time for the things we deem to be important in our lives. If shopping is important to us, regardless of how busy we are, we'll find time for shopping. If state basketball championship games are important to us, we'll find time to be there. If gardening is a priority, we'll find time for it. If symphony concerts are high on our list of essential activities, we'll be there, rain or shine, regardless of the time required.


On the other hand, if Bible study, prayer and Christian service to the Lord are priorities, we will find the time necessary to fulfill those priorities. We will seek first God's kingdom with the full confidence that the things we really need in life will be provided.

Warren Wiersbe (a prolific writer of Christian literature and theological works) wrote:

Sports fans may be weary, but if they hear of an athletic event taking place, they come alive and want to attend. Hungry people are alive to the mention of food, and avid shoppers come alive at the announcement of a sale. So Christians are alive to all

pertaining to Jesus Christ, for Christ is their very life.

As you think about your busy life and all that it entails, what's really important to you? To paraphrase Wiersbe, "What makes you come alive?" Even more importantly, will you "come alive" by renewing your commitment to serve the Lord here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church?



Patient attention, valuable discoveries

or many people, the coronavirus pandemic has been a test of patience — or worse. Medically vulnerable people face an anxious time of hypervigilance. Furloughed workers wait on hold or in lines for assistance. Special events have been canceled or rescheduled.

Those not impacted directly deal with assorted frustrations and inconveniences. Many people are learning the benefit of slowing down, being present (even virtually) to others and practicing patient attention.

Interestingly, scientist Isaac Newton did some of his best work when the plague forced Cambridge University to close. At home, the inquisitive student invented calculus and developed groundbreaking theories of gravity and optics. Later Newton called 1666 his *annus mirabilis* ("year of wonders") and reportedly said, "If I have made any valuable discoveries, it [owes] more to patient attention than to any other talent."

What have you discovered during the Covid-19 crisis? What appreciations have you developed for aspects of life you may have previously taken for granted? What has social distancing taught you about the value of neighbors, church, community volunteering?

During the pandemic, what have you learned about persistence and God's presence? What empathy do you now feel for writers of words such as "I wait for the LORD, my whole being waits, and in his word I put my hope" (Psalm 130:5, NIV)?

What you need:


- Masking tape
