

Pastor's Page

Greetings in the name of our risen Lord, Jesus! It is now February and we are about to enter into the church season of Lent. Can you believe it? It is almost Lent already!

As a simple reminder, Lent is a 40-day time period (not counting Sundays) from Ash Wednesday to Holy Week. Ash Wednesday is February 17 and Holy Week will take place the last couple days of March and the first couple days of April. This year we may be forced, because of the pandemic, to have drive-up ashes and drive-up Communion for Ash Wednesday. Whether we do drive-up or the traditional worship service, it is not the **how** that is important to remember. It is the **why** that is what is important.

Lent is a season when we are challenged to examine our loyalties and allegiances. Most of us are challenged from the outset, quickly realizing that we must say “no” to something just in order to say “yes” to self-examination. Because such self-examination nudges us toward uncomfortable realignments, Lent has earned a reputation as a somber season. The good news is that we anchor our struggles in readings that assure us of the profound joy that accompanies our “fasting from” the world’s empty promises in order to “feast on” the trustworthy promises of our faithful, loving, and merciful God.



To put it another way, Lent is about what you treasure. Where is your treasure? This is one of those questions requiring self-examination, a searching of the heart. We encounter this straightforward theme on Ash Wednesday, but as we move through Lent, the gospel readings offer us variations on the theme. We encounter revealing stories of Jesus as God’s treasured one and the world, especially the sinner, as loved beyond measure.

If as Christians, we treasure our relationship with God, the God we know in and through Jesus, there is more than one way to find and experience that treasure. Jesus gives one way to find that treasure in the Gospel of Matthew. The prophet Joel gives a completely different approach. Close the door to your room and pray in secret. Blow a trumpet and invite all, even the aged and nursing children, to an assembly. Right away in Lent, hearing scripture from the prophet Joel and Matthew’s gospel, it seems as though signals have gotten crossed, the messages mixed up. Do we line up in a sanctuary or at another public area to receive an ashen cross on our forehead, a very public sign of our mortality and our faith? Or do we purchase a new Lenten devotional booklet and carve out times for solitude, prayer, and meditation. The choice is yours.

We will work together this year to find that treasure. Lent, traditionally a season of baptismal preparation and renewal, has a public dimension. It is not that we do not need the private devotion; we do. Yet honoring this relationship leads to public witness, both in the liturgy (the public work of the people) and beyond.

The readings for the Sundays in Lent call us to an outward piety: welcoming sinners and eating with them. The church is the treasured gathering given away as bread in the wilderness. In Jesus' parable of the Prodigal Son, this giving away is told in the story of a father waiting for his son to return. Biblical scholar Luke Timothy Johnson says of this story, "It is the father whose mercy and openness to both children (the son who stayed and the son who left) stands as the emblem for Jesus' prophetic mission from God to restore the people with an open invitation to all." Our private devotion to God flows forth in public love to one another.

Share the Love – "Go in Peace, Serve the Lord. And, have fun doing it!" That is where I find the treasure. How about you?

When I reported your response to the Thankoffering in the January newsletter, not all of the donations had been counted. I am so grateful that the members of Good Shepherd responded to this year's Thankoffering by donating \$1,292.50. Half of this will be sent to our national organization to fund scholarships for women entering the ministry, and half will be donated locally to CASA. We thank all of you who gave so generously.

On January 21, Cindy Gaertner presented a check for \$1070.00 and school supplies donated by the members of Good Shepherd to the Citrus County Education Association to help to meet the needs of students and teachers during this difficult time. This gift is the result of your generous response to our school supply drive during 2020.



Quilts have been packed to be delivered to our Lutheran World Relief collection site in Tampa on February 3. All Lutheran World Relief kits which have been assembled and dropped off in the closet in the fellowship hall before February 1 will also be packed and prepared for delivery along with the quilts. Baby quilts are being distributed locally to our hospitals and to agencies which serve babies and young children.

Empowered by Grace, We Invest for Time and Eternity



Recently we learned how God uses money as a tool in our lives, as a means of instruction in our spiritual growth process. God also uses money as a test.

The Lord Jesus described the parameters of one test in this way in Luke 16: ¹⁰“Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. ¹¹So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches? ¹²And if you have not been trustworthy with someone else's property, who will give you property of your own?”

God has entrusted us with what rightfully belongs to Him. As we have seen repeatedly, all that we have is actually His. We are just managers and stewards. If we have not been trustworthy in how we have handled money and possessions — mere things — then God asks an important question: How in the world will we be able to handle what is really important — the spiritual riches that He wants to give us? And the rhetorical answer is this: We will not be able to.

Because of how we handle money and possessions, we may miss out on God's greatest blessing: spiritual truths and the riches that come from a deep, intimate relationship with Him. How we handle money, then, is an accurate indicator of the condition of our spiritual lives.

Before He tests us regarding money, God lets us know what the tests will be like. In fact, the Bible has many such instructional passages, so much so that our tests might be described as “open book.” All we have to do is to search His Word to see what the tests

will be like. One such passage is in Deuteronomy 8 just before the children of Israel are to possess the Promised Land.

God tells them that He is bringing them into a good land of plentiful water, a land of wheat and barley, vines and fig trees, oil and honey. It will lack nothing. Sort of sounds like our country in some ways, doesn't it?

And then He issues this solemn warning that applies to us as well: “. . . when you eat and are satisfied, when you build fine houses and settle down . . . and your silver and gold increase and all you have is multiplied, then your heart will become proud and you will forget the Lord your God. . . . You may say to yourself, ‘My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me.’ But remember the Lord your God, for it is He who gives you the ability to produce wealth.”

God is using money as a test in our lives. As Paul explained in 1 Corinthians, boasting, selfishness, and pride are the results of having wrong priorities about our money. Today, these attitudes can stunt our spiritual growth and cause us to become stumbling blocks to other Christians who are seeking victory in their own lives.

As we consider the opportunity to support the ministries here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, God is putting us to the test. As Gordon Moyes stated, “Responsible giving or stewardship is not man's way of raising money, but God's way of raising people. . . . The church's budget is not a list of its expenses, but a record of its vision. It is not a list of bills to be met, but a program of ministry to be achieved.”

As we prayerfully consider what God would have us give, and as we obey what God asks of us, we can trust Him to provide the resources. This is a test of where we are spiritually much more than where we are financially. It's a test of us; both as individuals and as a church. The question is whether we really believe that God has the power and ability to bless our obedience “far more than all we can ask or imagine” (Eph. 3:20).

He does!

Ask yourself how you are doing concerning God's test regarding money in your life. If God's provision in your life in the days ahead depends on *how* you

obey His leading *now* concerning your giving, what will the future be like for you?

As you consider your use of money, including your giving to the Lord's work here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, what kind of grade will you receive on God's test?

Heavenly appearance

Our omnipresent God shows up in some unexpected places. People have “miraculously” seen Jesus’ face on everything from junk food to a rusty water tank. We don’t know what Jesus looked like, of course, but Scripture indicates his appearance was rather ordinary: “He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him” (Isaiah 53:2, NIV).

On one occasion, however, Jesus’ face was majestically transformed. At his Transfiguration, observed by many churches on the Sunday before Lent, Jesus’ “face shone like the sun, and his clothes became white as light” (Matthew 17:2, ESV). Some disciples witnessed Jesus’ glory — which will be ours, thanks to his death and resurrection. As 1 John 3:2 (NIV) promises: “When Christ appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is.”
