

## PASTOR'S PAGE

Welcome to the Dog Days of Summer! Remember that expression? For those of us who came from a more northerly climate... warm weather and abundant growth make for an ideal time to experience the great outdoors. School breaks and relaxed schedules offer opportunities to visit family and friends and to host guests at home. Some travel farther afield, seeking adventures abroad. The scripture readings we will be using offer a rich variety of themes related to these experiences.

Hospitality and hosting are major themes that have been and will be the scripture readings this summer. Jesus sends the disciples out to preach the gospel, instructing them to be guests in the homes of others. In our first reading for this last week (as I write this), Abram and Sarai host strangers who prove to be angels; that theme will be repeated in Hebrews later in the season. For those of you who were with us last week, Martha works to host Jesus and his disciples, complaining that her sister Mary doesn't do her share. These texts (and others) invite us to explore the power dynamics inherent in offering and receiving hospitality. What can it mean that God chooses to act in the role of guest and calls on believers to do the same? Do we, as members of the Church, anticipate the visits of angels in disguise? How do we ensure that everyone, guest and host alike, has access to "the better part" (Luke 10:42)?

Those who travel abroad or visit from afar may be interested in how the readings we have heard, and will hear, this summer define insiders and outsiders. Numerous gospel readings this season feature healing miracles: the Gerasene demoniac and the bent-over woman are two of them. When Jesus tries to restore healed people to their communities, his work is often resisted. Nevertheless, in Galatians and Colossians Paul proclaims that there is neither Jew nor Greek, circumcised nor uncircumcised, slave nor free, male nor female. Abraham even bargains for the

salvation of the communities of Sodom and Gomorrah, whose primary sin (contrary to popular belief) is not one of sexual deviance but a lack of hospitality. The seminal question, "Who is my neighbor?" was/is answered by the parable of the Good Samaritan in a surprising way

Maybe we should consider where we as Christian people succeed in embracing Jesus's broad definition of neighbor and where it is that we still fall short. Thinking about people of different abilities, social locations, ethnic origins, sexual orientations, and gender identities, we, the church community, can and should wonder about what it means to be "one in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:28). What work that we do here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in fellowship and neighborhood involvement, builds up barriers or tears them down? When breakdowns in community occur, are there pathways to forgiveness and restoration? Acknowledging the realities of our sinful world, what challenges might we not be able to overcome this side of heaven?

Finally, as farms and gardens produce their bounty, as field and forest verdantly grow, we can (and are invited to) embrace Paul's vision, "New creation is everything!" (Gal. 6:15). Reflecting nature's abundance, you, the believer, (yes, you too) can use the summer to grow and change. Our new life in Jesus produces fruit in abundance all year long!

## Deacon's Corner




Greetings Good Shepherd Family,

## Applying Biblical Principles

In his book, *The Pursuit of Holiness*, Jerry Bridges writes,

*A farmer plows his field, sows the seed, and fertilizes and cultivates — all the while knowing that in the final analysis, he is utterly dependent on forces outside of himself. He knows he cannot cause the seed to germinate, nor can he produce the rain and sunshine for growing and harvesting the crop. For a successful harvest, he is dependent on these things from God.*

*Yet the farmer knows that unless he diligently pursues his responsibilities to plow, plant, fertilize and cultivate, he cannot expect a harvest at the end of the season. In a sense, he is in a partnership with God, and he will reap its benefits only when he has fulfilled his own responsibilities.*

*Farming is a joint venture between God and the farmer. The farmer cannot do what God must do, and God will not do what the farmer should do.*

What is true of farming is also true of the Christian life. To use Bridges's terminology, Christianity is a "joint venture" between God and Christians. We cannot do what God must do, and God will not do what we should do.

For example, does God have the power to vacuum the carpets here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church? Absolutely. As the old chorus puts it, "God can do anything but fail." When we use the adjective "omnipotent" to describe God, we are saying that God is all-powerful. God can do anything. So, yes, God has the power (as well as the ability) to vacuum the carpets in our church.

But will God do so? Not really. And the reason is clear: That is one of the jobs God has assigned to us. As part of our "joint venture" with God, cleaning the carpets is on our side of the ledger. God could have done it all, but instead, God allows us to have a part in the work of the kingdom.

Make no mistake about it: Sometimes it can be a drag to serve the Lord in this ministry. At other times, we can feel as though we are burned out. At still other times, we feel as though we are ready to quit. And sometimes, we can feel as though no one else is doing anything.

Yet, in the final analysis, it is an awesome privilege to be “fellow workers” alongside the God of the universe. When you stop and think about it, as we use the time, talents, and treasures God has provided in the ministry here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, we are most blessed.

S.D. Gordon wrote,

*We have nothing to do with how much ability we’ve got, or how little, but with what we do with what we have. The man with great talent is apt to be puffed up, and the man with great talent often belittles those with little ... God gives it, much or little. Our part is to be faithful, doing our level best with every bit and scrap. And we will be if Jesus controls.*

It’s what 1 Corinthians 3:9 describes so clearly: “...we are God’s servants, working together.” So whether we are cleaning carpets, caring for children in the nursery, assisting visitors in the parking lot, singing in the choir, or preaching sermons, we are working side by side with Almighty God. God gives us the time, talents, and treasures necessary for the tasks, and then God grants us a glorious privilege of serving in the ministry here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.

**God’s part? Done. Your part? Only you know the answer to that question.**

Before we know it, September will be here. It's the month we celebrate the anniversary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America by being God's hands in our community. This year, our Pineland Conference is encouraging our congregations to put our hands to work for the people of Ukraine.

Although Russia is not winning the war it started against Ukraine, it is doing as much damage as possible. Random missiles strike anywhere—apartment buildings, schools, businesses, etc. Our conference is inviting our congregations to donate items just for Ukrainians.

Items needed:

- \* 1 light-weight bath towel, no bigger than 52 x 27 inches, (dark color recommended)
- \* 2 bath-sized bars of soap, any brand in original packaging
- \* 1 adult-sized toothbrush in original packaging (an individual toothbrush from a multi-pack can be sealed in a business envelope, no plastic bag or wrap)
- \* 1 sturdy comb, packaging removed
- \* 1 metal nail clippers, packaging removed

**For this project only, include a warm blanket no bigger than a twin-bed size.**

Please bring **just the items**. The kits will be assembled later. Items are due by Sunday, September 11. This is a separate project from our usual collection of personal care items in January. Thank you in advance.

On July 9<sup>th</sup>, we were blessed to have Carmon Forbus speak to us about her ministry, God's Shed of Love, which helps homeless and disadvantaged people in Citrus County. Carmon began this ministry 12 years ago by making “personal care kits” filled with socks, a wash cloth, soap, shampoo, a toothbrush and toothpaste, a comb, and a razor. She also made “first aid kits” with bandage strips, antibiotic ointment, hand sanitizer, hand wipes, a candle, and matches. She later added “purses of love” filled with feminine hygiene products to give to women. Our August assembly project will similarly benefit homeless people.

**On Saturday, August 13<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 PM, we will be holding an Afternoon Tea Party in the Fellowship Hall at Good Shepherd, and will be assembling “Love in a Glovebox” kits which will benefit the homeless. Volunteers to assist with the tea are needed. Please contact Shelly Fortin.**

## Health Ministry




