

PASTOR'S PAGE

Let's talk Lent. This year, by the Grace of God, finally, we can meet without any major health precautions as we have had in the past! This year's theme for our Lenten worship on Wednesday evenings will be "Amazing Grace". That title was not meant to be ironic. This year's theme is based on the beloved song that celebrates its 250th anniversary this year. In our Ash Wednesday service, which included the Imposition of Ashes and Communion, we focused on the amazing grace of God that King David experienced when he confessed his sins and was forgiven. We will also witness God's Amazing Grace that was shown to Isaiah, the Prodigal Son, a Blind Man that Jesus encountered, the Samaritan Woman Jesus met at the well, and last, but not least the Apostle Paul. We experience that same amazing grace of God in confession and forgiveness this Lent as we look toward the cross of Christ that made our freedom from sin possible.

Lent includes everyone's favorite topic – **Change**. There are three sure things in life – we will all die someday, the Grace of God is sure, and Change will happen. Change is a constant in our lives. Some changes mark gradual transitions, such as when daytime shifts toward twilight or winter turns to spring. Others happen in the blink of an eye, separating time into "before" and "after". We choose to undergo some changes after carefully considering our options, while others are forced upon us.

In the weeks, days, and hours before Jesus's crucifixion, the disciples also experience change: a change of venue as the gates of Jerusalem approach, a change of plans as their long-awaited Messiah was arrested and tried; a change of circumstance as the crowds shouted "Crucify!".

The Gospel readings for the Sundays in Lent for 2023 are filled with stories where Jesus creates the possibility of change and new life. God changes our plans and replaces them with a love broader and deeper than anything we could imagine – and that is part of God's Amazing Grace.

Join us on Wednesday evenings (March 1, 8, 15, 22, and 29) for soup supper at 5:30 PM immediately followed by worship at 6:15 PM, along with Sunday morning worship at 8:30 AM and 11:00 AM. Together we will experience change and God's Amazing Grace through those changes.

Lent is the Christian season of spiritual preparation before Easter. In Western churches, it begins on Ash Wednesday. During Lent, many Christians observe a period of <u>fasting</u>, <u>repentance</u>, moderation, self-denial, and spiritual discipline. The purpose of the Lenten season is to set aside time for reflection on <u>Jesus Christ</u>—to consider his suffering and his sacrifice, his life, <u>death</u>, burial, and resurrection.

During the six weeks of self-examination and reflection, Christians who observe Lent typically make a commitment to fast, or to give up something. Some Christians also take on a Lenten discipline, like reading the Bible and spending more time in prayer to draw nearer to God.

Some observers of Lent do not eat meat on Fridays, often opting for fish instead. The goal of these spiritual disciplines is to strengthen the faith of the observer and develop a closer <u>relationship with God</u>.

The 40-day period of Lent is based on two episodes of spiritual testing in the Bible: the 40 years of wilderness wanderings by the Israelites after the exodus from Egypt (Numbers 33:38 and Deuteronomy 1:3) and the Temptation of Jesus after he spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11; Mark 1:12-13; Luke 4:1-13).

In the Bible, the number 40 holds special significance in the measurement of time, and many other important events revolve around it. During the flood, it rained for 40 days and 40 nights (Genesis 7:4, 12, 17; 8:6). Moses fasted on the mountain for 40 days and nights before God gave the Ten Commandments (Exodus 24:18; 34:28; Deuteronomy 9). The spies spent 40 days in the land of Canaan (Numbers 13:25; 14:34). The prophet Elijah traveled for 40 days and nights to reach the mountain of God in Sinai (1 Kings 19:8).

In Western Christianity, <u>Ash Wednesday</u> marks the first day, or the start of the season of Lent, which begins <u>40 days</u> prior to <u>Easter</u> (Technically 46, as Sundays are not included in the count). Officially named "Day of Ashes," the <u>exact date changes every year</u> because Easter and its surrounding holidays are movable feasts.

Why Are Pancakes Eaten on Shrove Tuesday Before Lent?

Many churches that observe Lent, celebrate <u>Shrove Tuesday</u>. Traditionally, pancakes are eaten on Shrove Tuesday (the day before Ash Wednesday) to use up rich foods like eggs and dairy in anticipation of the 40-day fasting season of Lent. Shrove Tuesday is also called <u>Fat Tuesday</u> or <u>Mardi Gras</u>, which is French for Fat Tuesday.

Stewardship is living out our commitment to Christ.

Applying Bible Principles

"...ask and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you" (Luke 11:9).

God has a wonderful "system" by which we as His children are to get our needs met. It's a very simple system, but somehow, we fail to utilize it as we should. Here's the plan: God says we are to ask Him. Is that simple or what? We are to call unto Him, to cry out our needs before Him, to bring our petitions before His throne. But somehow, we must think this plan is too complex, because for most of us, asking God is the last thing we do when we have needs.

Oh, we'll tell our friends. We'll discuss our needs with any and all who have the patience and courtesy to listen. We'll frequently complain about our problems, even to the extent of sometimes holding God responsible for His seeming failure to provide for us. But ask God? Usually we'll do that only as a last resort.

The result is a sad state of affairs among Christians. "You do not have, because you do not ask. You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, in order to spend what you get on your pleasures" (James 4:2-3). So our needs go unmet because either we do not ask or we ask with wrong motives.

J. Irvin Overholtzer was a pastor who was greatly used by God as the founder of Child Evangelism Fellowship. His philosophy of providing for the financial needs of this worldwide organization was this: "Ask God . . . and tell His people." Yes, we need to share our needs with others. We ought to make others aware of opportunities for them to get involved and to be used by God to meet those needs. But the *first* step in the entire process is this: "Ask God."


And when we do, we can claim His promise stated so clearly in Jeremiah 33:3 ... "Call to Me and I will answer you, and will tell you great and hidden things that you have not known."

Do you have needs in your life today? Why not "ask God"? Why not come boldly to His throne? Why not take Him at His Word and "call" to Him? That's God's plan for His children: " ... ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you" (Luke 11:9). Or as Eliza Hickock wrote a century ago, "I know not by what methods rare, but this I know: God answers prayer!"




Housekeeping:






World's Greatest Baby Shower set for April 13th

St John Paul II Catholic School, Lecanto @ 2 - 4 pm and 5 - 7 pm

For nearly 30 years, the annual World's Greatest Baby Shower has been the best learning opportunity for expectant and new parents in Citrus County. This year, over 20 exhibitors, including nonprofit organizations that focus on the health and safety of children as well as health professionals, will be on hand with information to help parents get the best head start in raising their children.

In addition to educational exhibits and information, activities at this two-session event will include games and door prizes, with between 10 and 15 grand prize packages parents can choose from. As in years past, everyone who visits all the exhibit tables and writes down the answers to all the educational questions, will be eligible for prizes at the end of each session. The FREE event is open to all expectant parents, parents of children younger than 12 months old and anyone who is a caregiver for the baby.

Now for many of those 30 years, our Good Shepherd quilters have been making baby blankets to support this special event. And this year will be no different. But recently, at one of our Wednesday gatherings, we were trying to brainstorm ways we could help even more. We came up with the idea and got approval to run a "DIAPER DRIVE" during the month of March. Did you know that new parents need almost 3,000 diapers during their babies first year? It's been many, many years since any of us had to go out and purchase diapers. On a recent trip to the store, this is what we found...



- So many different manufacturers, offering many sizes and styles!
- Some say soft and gentle!
- Some have wet indicators!
- Some say scented or unscented!
- Some say breathable and allergy free!
- Some say that they are biodegradable and good for the environment!
- And don't forget about stretchability, proper fit, and special needs for overnight coverage!
- IS YOUR HEAD SPINNING YET? Ours certainly were!

And then of course there's the cost. At Walmart for example, a basic diaper package (25-40 count total depending on the size) can cost anywhere from \$4.99 to \$9.99. For those 3,000 diapers needed in that first year, new parents will be shelling out over \$1,000 – YIKES! So, to help kick off our campaign, we have applied for a THRIVENT ACTION TEAM and just got approved – YEA!





In January and February, we started a new project for the Citrus County Baby Shower using fleece material. We made 9 fleece 'suns' with ribbons as 'rays' for a baby toy.

We also made red felt heart with lace pocket for our shut-ins for Valentines. We are so pleased that our Eucharistic Ministers, Deacons, and Pastor were able to deliver these as they visited our shut-ins.

This month we also will continue making clothes pin nativity sets which are used in the welcome package for first time visitors to Good Shepherd. This is a hot glue project. We have several glue guns in our supply closet or bring your own.

Judy Wood picked up pillowcase dress kits to sew. We will also be assembling more kits. We have pillowcases, precut elastic, and double bias for these kits. We have been making these dresses for many years. Sylvia brought in Dec/Jan 2023 Guidepost with an excellent article telling how Rachel in Rockwood, MI started this national project in 2008. Each year we at Good Shepherd have mailed off several boxes of finished dresses to her! She and her volunteers have then shipped over 10 million dresses to Africa and around the world where needed including the U.S. So this project is even more rewarding for our Craft and Share group! We have patterns for anyone who would like to sew dresses at home. We also have precut pads to sew washable sanitary napkins for the girls in Africa that we can include in boxes to Rachel's group.

We gave out several prayers shawls in the last few months to members who have lost a loved one or were hospitalized. We appreciate our home crochet or knitters for keeping us supplied. We have directions for knit or crocheting these and for lap robes. If you know of someone who could use a prayer shawl or lap robe or would like directions to make one, have them contact me.






