s I write these thoughts, we are getting ready to celebrate Easter.

Material submitted for inclusion in our monthly newsletter is due midmonth so..... I looked ahead on the calendar to the month of May and I noticed that the day of Pentecost will be Sunday, May 28. Oye! Time is going by so quickly!

Along with Spring transitioning into Summer, the month of May is the time of year (in the Church) when the fifty days of Easter are waning and the Festival of Pentecost is waxing brightly. At this time of year in the season of Easter, we are made aware of the Holy Spirit's presence among us. The scriptures for Pentecost repeatedly refer to the Holy Spirit. From Jesus's promise at the Last Supper to send the "Spirit of Truth," through to his post-resurrection appearance among his friends gathered in the house on the "first day of the week", the Holy Spirit's presence is apparent in the scripture readings, the worship, the singing, and the other activities of this congregation as we come together as the Body of Christ in this age.

Many Christians capture the moment of the Feast of Pentecost in a birthday celebration of the Church by wearing red and recalling the story of the first Pentecost found in the book of Acts of the Apostles when the Holy Spirit visited the early followers of Jesus in a very powerful and remarkable way. Since that day, it has become a festival of celebration for believers everywhere. Regardless of one's approach to this very important principal feast day, Pentecost is a day to remember and celebrate the power of God. This is a special Sunday to rejoice in the power of the Holy Spirit, which inflamed and empowered our ancestors who continued to gather after Jesus's ascension. The Holy Spirit empowered them for the great deed of spreading the Good News to all who God so loves and wishes to embrace and include.

Yet the flame of Pentecost need not fizzle after the feast. The season itself is a season of growth and preparation. The season exchanges the fire's red for green which represents growth but does not extinguish the Spirit's glow. Translated through the Spirit, the season with its agricultural roots is cognizant of the need for growth and essential work of the people. The soil has been tilled, the seed planted. Now is the time to water, to nourish and to tend. May you and the rest of this splendid little corner of God's kingdom share the blessing of a fruitful growing season.

The 40 days of Lent. What a humbling experience. We start out with Ash Wednesday, where we are made to realize that we are "dust", part of creation. Made from dirt. But God has breathed Life into us, created in His image.

Unfortunately, we failed to maintain his image. For all have sinned and have fallen short of the glory of God. But because of God's love for us, we can celebrate through Lent with confidence the thought, that God always loves us. What Amazing Grace. The hymn, "Our Chains are Gone", we sang over and over. What a powerful hymn. And at the end of Lent, that hymn comes alive with the resurrection of Jesus on Easter morning. We can truly sing; "Our chains are gone, We've been set free. My God, my savior has ransomed me. And like a flood, his mercy reigns, Unending love amazing grace..."

What now in May? In the afterglow of Easter, we have Pentecost. It's May 28th. We have God's spirit poured over us as it did with Peter and his first sermon. Peter is fulfilling the Great Commission and teaching us what to do. There is a song that we might consider here from our Lutheran hymnal. "Come, Join the Dance of the Trinity". Jesus told us to go and make disciples; teaching them, baptizing them. Peter started doing that when the spirit poured out on him. So, we have the Father sending His son, the Son sending the Holy Spirit. We with the Holy Spirit are to go and make disciples. That trinitarian sending is part of the church mission. And the hymn, "Come, Join the Dance of the Trinity" is the song of this spreading the good news. Verse 3; of the Trinitarian song is "Come speak aloud of Trinity as wind and tongues of flame set people free at Pentecost to tell the Savior's name. We know the yoke of sin and death our necks have worn it smooth. Go tell the world of weight and woe that we are free to move."

And ye shall know the truth

He is Risen! Our chains are gone! With the help of the Holy Spirit we go in peace to serve the Lord. (And have fun doing it)

Stewardship is living out our commitment to Christ.

Applying Bible Principles

The writer of the book of Hebrews made this short but powerful statement about the Lord Jesus, "Consider Him." That admonition is nowhere more needful than in the matter of giving and receiving.

Consider Him, the Lord of glory, Who gave His life so that we might gain eternal life. Consider Him, Who was rich, yet became poor for our sakes, that we through His poverty might be rich. Consider Him, Who gives us richly all things to enjoy. Consider Him, Who was quoted by Dr. Luke in Acts 20:35, as he urged us to remember the words our Lord Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Although many Christians would at first glance agree with that premise on an intellectual basis, by their lifestyles they demonstrate that their lives are diametrically opposed to this biblical principle. They might even go so far as to state their agreement with what the Lord Jesus said, but not so far as to change their selfish "me first" attitude. They might give mental assent or even verbal assent to His teaching, but in reality, their lives are consumed by a passion for "receiving" instead of "giving." It is as though they pass through life's portals with this striking question emblazoned across their foreheads: "What's in it for me?"

In contrast to that attitude, Wayne Watts, a Christian businessman, wrote, "As we give, we grow spiritually ... learning to honor and reverence God and to always put Him first. Although Spirit-led giving has a vital part in helping the church and Christian organizations carry out their mission, we must remember that its primary purpose is not to help God pay His bills, but to help us to grow more like Christ ... Giving has always been God's way of teaching His people to be like Him."

God, who owns everything, gives material possessions freely and willingly to us, His children, for a number of reasons, but one of the primary reasons is for us to be able to give them back to Him. Each time we give to the Lord's work out of a heart that responds to His love and grace, we give away a little of our selfishness and gain a bit more of Christ's sacrificial spirit, as demonstrated by the Lord Jesus when He left heaven's glory to die for us on Calvary. Since our role in life is to follow God, and to obey Him, we should demonstrate on a daily basis that, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

As John MacArthur, an American Protestant pastor and author, expressed it so well, "The major money issue in Scripture is not how you feel about it, or even how you spend it. The primary concern of Scripture is how you give it."

"How we use our money demonstrates the reality of our love for God," wrote Charles Ryrie, an American Bible scholar and Christian theologian. "In some ways, it proves our love more conclusively than depth of knowledge, length of prayers or prominence of service. These things can be feigned, but the use of our possessions shows us up for what we actually are."

As you give of your resources (money, time, and talents) to the Lord's work, "Consider Jesus." Consider Him by remembering and obeying His words: "It is more blessed to give than to receive."


Adopt a Highway Program

Please pray about the service that you do.



Publix depends on churches like ours to pick up the unsold bakery items and deliver them to agencies that provide for families in need. Currently, we need **volunteers** who will SIGN UP FOR JULY, AUGUST, and SEPTEMBER.

For one month, volunteers need to pick up donated bakery goods from Citrus Hills Publix on Saturday night (or very early Sunday morning), drop off the donations Saturday night at church, and pick them up for distribution on the following Monday morning. On odd-numbered months (1st, 3rd, 5th, etc.) of the year, the donations go to Family Resource Center of Citrus (north of Hernando on 200). On even-numbered months, donations go to CUB (Citrus United Basket on Parkside Ave. just off of US 41 north of Whispering Pines Park). Both places will help unload the donations.







SPINNER SPINNER

For Pentecost, make a thaumatrope, a spinning toy that creates an optical illusion of motion.

What you need:

- White paper
- Cup
- Scissors
- Pencil and markers
- Plastic drinking straw
- Glue

What you do:

- Using the cup's circular shape, trace two identical circles on the paper. Carefully cut them out.
- In pencil, draw a person's head on one circle. Then place the blank circle on top and use the image beneath to guide you in drawing a flame above the head.
- Color the two images with markers.
- Apply glue to the backs of the circles and sandwich the top of the straw between them so it looks like a lollipop. Let dry.
- Roll the straw quickly between your hands to view a mini motion picture.
