

Things sure are different – yes? This is me personally, but after a little more than a year of walking into the building to serve as your pastor, we have had to face one thing after another. Just as we were getting into a groove together, the pandemic took place and (as you know) everything changed.

Now that it appears we are in the post-pandemic world, how do we operate? It is clear that, in many cases, we cannot go back to the time before the pandemic. We must move forward. What? But, at the same time, that is what the church does and has always done in the past. We face one challenge trusting that our God through the Holy Spirit is leading us.

That does not mean we will always like or appreciate what is happening. We will not like the way things are being done, but the question we will need to ask is this, "What is God doing here?"

I ran into an old newspaper clipping of a letter that was sent to Billy Graham in which he responded to the writer who was commenting on something being done differently than this person was accustomed to having done. I will be honest, if I were to change the names and not tell you where I got this article from, you could think it came from an article that appeared in a recent edition of the Citrus Chronicle. Look at this:

Dear Rev. Graham: Maybe I'm just old-fashioned, but from time to time our church's music director introduces new songs into the service, and I don't care for them. I like the old hymns and wish he'd just stick to them. Should I complain to our pastor?

- Response from Rev. Graham: I know this has been a controversial issue in many churches, and I don't pretend to have all the answers, especially since I'm not particularly musical! But we have a singing faith, and God has given us the gift of music to praise him. The Psalmist declared, "With singing lips my mouth will praise you" (Psalm 63:5).
- Instead of complaining to your pastor (or anyone else), I urge you to ask God to help you be grateful for all music that points us to God, new or old. No, you may not like some of it, but others do, and God can use it in their lives to encourage them and bring them closer to Christ. Remember: The old hymns you like were once new, and someone probably didn't like them, either!
- Sometimes, I'm afraid, a hymn can become so familiar to us that we sing it without even thinking about the words. But this is wrong, because then our singing becomes empty and meaningless. Don't let this happen to you, but meditate on the words of the songs you sing, and even turn them into a prayer.
- Your music director has probably been wise to introduce new songs slowly; completely changing everything all at once can be disruptive. Pray for him and encourage him, letting him know that you're grateful for his gifts. Yes, let him know you appreciate the old hymns, but support him also as he seeks to reach a new generation through music.

This month, we go to one service which will take place at 10:00 AM. We will return to the 8:30 and 11:00 schedule we normally use in a couple of months (I think). Ooops! There is another change. We also have quite a few new faces around here. They bring hopes and dreams for the future with them as well. Why not say "hello" and "welcome". Perhaps you could invite them to join us for coffee hour as well?

Now that we are walking into the future – and as followers of Jesus – we walk into the future following Jesus. Let's look, listen, and try to understand where it is that the Holy Spirit is leading us.

Applying Bible Principles

As we have seen over the past several months, total stewardship includes time, talents and treasure. All of these are on loan to us from God who desires us to use these resources for the sake of the Gospel here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.

Most churches need more people to get involved in the work of the ministry. Our church is no exception. But what should be the method by which we seek to alert people to the opportunities for Christian service? What should be the method by which we seek to recruit and enlist folks in this endeavor?

There are several possibilities:

- We could publicize the needs in the Sunday bulletin or newsletter.
- We could send a special mailing to members and friends of our congregation.
- We could ask the pastor to personally call on potential workers.
- We could create a video presentation by which we could visually describe the opportunities for service.
- We could contact a national consulting firm that specializes in recruiting people within a local church.
- We could post signs throughout the building.
- We could hang a large banner on the outside of the building.

There may be merit in these methods, and we do several of these. But the primary way we are to recruit workers is found in Matthew 9:38 and Luke 10:2:

We are to ask God to send forth workers for the harvest field.

On the surface, that seems so simple and straight-forward. We are to pray and ask God to provide the workers needed in the harvest field. But frequently, when there is a need for workers, we forget to pray about that need or we do so only as a last resort. It's as though we say to Almighty God, "Oh, Lord, we've tried everything else, so now in desperation, we are asking You to provide the people needed for this ministry."

James 4:2 gets right to the point when it states, "You do not have, because you do not ask [God]." We fail to get our needs met because we do not ask God to meet them. This is true in every area of life, including the provision of workers in a church like ours.

Why don't we pray about this and other needs? Could it be that we really do not believe that God will keep the commitments promised to us in the Scriptures? Could it be that we have concluded that God's promises are for another time, another place and another group of people? Could it be that we somehow think we are sufficient for the task without God's enabling grace?

Will you be one this morning who resolves, by God's grace, to first and foremost ask God to provide the people needed to carry on the work and ministry here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church? And will you make yourself available to be part of God's answer to that prayer? Will you answer His call to service?



Social Committee





We will meet next on June 28th from 10 AM to 2:00 PM. Bring your lunch and a beverage. We meet every month on the 4th Wednesday of the month. JOIN US.

Last month, we finished 10 eyeglass cases from men's ties and sorted ties into 3 bins, one of which are all polyester that can be made into lap robes for nursing homes. This will be a good Fall project.

This month we will start making teddy bears for next year's Baby Shower. We have two types. We will make washcloth teddy bears (no sewing involved). We can also cut, sew, and stuff cloth teddy bears.

We can also assemble pillowcase dress kits from precut elastic and bias tape using our supply of pillowcases. We have participated in this project for 15 plus years.

We mailed off 3 boxes to "Little Dresses for Africa Project" in Rockland, Michigan where they are then shipped to Africa or where needed most. The boxes contained 45 dresses and 10 washable fabric sanitary pads so young girls remain in school when commercial items are unavailable. We will continue to make these dresses. We have pillowcases, elastic, and precut wide double fold bias to make kits for those who like to sew at home. We thank Judy Wood, Sharon Toe, and friend for making these.

We gave out several prayer shawls or lap robes in the last few months to members who have lost a loved one or someone who was hospitalized. We appreciate our home crochet or knitters for keeping us supplied. We have directions for knitting or crocheting these and lap robes. If you know of someone who could use a prayer shawl or lap robe or for directions to make one, call Maggie.


On May 3rd, we had 5 quilters and 2 sewers and we finished 5 quilts. Colleen S made 2 full tops.
