

Welcome to the summer season! That being said, it has been my experience over the last 25 years that there is a tendency within the church to think that everything in the Church slows down in the summer. After all, we just went from two worship services to only one worship service for the summer. And, yes, I know that many people use the summer months to travel and in-person attendance at church worship services may be lower than during other times of the year.

Yet, our readings that we will be hearing in worship are to the contrary. In appears in the readings that Jesus is doing just the opposite. He is "ramping things up" in the way he makes his identity as the Word Incarnate known and making discipleship a key part of his mission.

Well, then, think on this: As God in Jesus acts in and among us, how do we become and remain disciples? Yes, I mean you. Jesus is calling disciples to share the good news of the coming reign of God. The world we live in is similar to what Jesus's original disciples faced due to the fact that the "good news" may not have been considered "good" for all who heard. Jesus teaches us much about discipleship by how he responds to questions about who he spends time with, who Jesus calls, who Jesus claims, and who Jesus sends. This sending – in the first century and in the 21st century - is ongoing. And, today, just like in the first century world, discipleship necessitates a continual and arduous sending, accompanied by success, failure, and the need to innovate. The successes mixed with failures and continual need for innovation is the result of who others want Jesus to be versus who Jesus actually is. Jesus causes us to bear in mind our traditions, the people with whom we associate, and what it means to be grace-filled.

Here are some questions to ask yourself. How does Jesus break religious molds? Whom does Jesus choose as part of his circle of followers? Is it contrary to who we think Jesus should choose?

Here is some more food for thought. What does what we say, think, and do within our congregation reveal about us as individuals and as a congregation? Does it matter who is in and who is out? How is this community represented and cared for in this congregation? Who is unknown and/or excluded? Are we aware of/concerned about/ thinking about how this congregation is serving both our members and the community in which we live?

Even as we enjoy some good old-fashioned R&R, we are called to labor in service to those who are hungry, who are homeless, and who cry for justice and mercy. The Prophet Micah asks the question, "What does the Lord require of you?" Remember the answer to Micah's question (Micah 6:8), which directs us to live in our Baptism as we practice walking humbly, seeking justice, and loving kindness.

Applying Bible Principles

The Apostle Paul wrote to Timothy, his son in the faith, "As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God. . . . They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future..." (*1Timothy 6:17-19*)

The first response some of us would have to this passage might be something like this: "Well, that certainly excludes me, for I am definitely not what could be described as rich." Alternatively, when asked "How rich are you?", some of us may respond with a recitation of our material possessions. We list bank accounts, stocks, bonds, houses, vehicles, and other so-called assets as tangible evidence of our wealth or lack there-of.

But is that how rich we are? Not really. "Rich" is a relative term. What seems meager to one person might be considered great wealth by another. What is viewed as very little by someone in this country might be viewed as very significant by those in other lands.

Please remember that all that we have comes from God's hand as a direct result of His blessing. We own nothing. We are just managers and stewards of what rightfully belongs to Him.

Adrian Rogers said this, "If you want to know how rich you are, add up everything you have that money can't buy, and then add what you've sent on to Heaven. That's how rich you really are." When we give back to the Lord with the right heart attitude, we "lay up treasures in heaven." There are two ways to accomplish this.

One is to give to the work of the Lord. As we do that, particularly through giving our tithes and offerings here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, we make deposits in what one writer described as the "Bank of Heaven".

Another way is by giving to others, just as Paul instructed Timothy. In fact, one of the primary reasons God provides bountifully for us is so we can give to others. In light of this, we should apply Paul's counsel to our lives. As we follow his instruction, giving in the name of the Lord Jesus to meet the needs of others, we "lay up treasure" for the coming age.

A life-changing principle taught by our Lord is this: As we minister to others in His name, even to those who might be considered by some to be the "least" of His brethren, we minister to Him (*Matthew 25:40*). And as we minister to Him, God in turn continues to pour out His blessings upon us. That's the truth described by Solomon in Proverbs 11:25, "A generous person will be enriched, and one who gives water will get water."

We know that the foundation for happiness is a proper relationship with the Lord. But to fully experience that happiness, we must build on that foundation in practical ways. One of the best ways to do that is to give to others. That's why the first of the "Ten Rules for Happier Living" is this: "Give something away with no strings attached."

Unfortunately, all of us are infected to some degree by the curse of selfishness. God's Word admonishes us to keep a healthy balance. We are to look out not only for our own interests, but also for the interests of others.

We can do that first and foremost by giving unselfishly in the Lord's name to His work and to people in need, wherever they are. Every time we give to the Lord's work here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church and every time we give to meet the needs of others, we give away a little of our selfishness and our me-first attitude. And as we do, we can be confident of God's promise that we are storing up "treasure in heaven", treasure that will someday reap eternal benefits.

Dennis DeHaan, Editor of "Our Daily Bread" from 1971 to 1995, wrote,

If we would fear and love the Lord, And strive to keep His holy Word, Our neighbor's good would always be Of great concern to you and me.

Another writer expressed it this way, "Investing in the lives of others and growing in our relationship with God are spiritual treasures. They are not subject to destruction or thievery. They are fully protected. Their value never diminishes." (*author unknown*)

And as our Lord Jesus Christ expressed it so pointedly,

"...whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of Mine, you did for Me." (*Matthew 25:40*)

What you need:

- Peanut butter or vegetable shortening
- Plastic knife
- Empty toilet paper tube
- Bird seed
- A plate
- String

What you do:

- 1. Spread peanut butter or vegetable shortening on the tube, covering the entire outside surface.
- 2. Pour bird seed on a plate and roll the tube in the seeds.
- 3. Thread string through the tube and tie it to make a loop.
- 4. Hang the bird feeder outside. When seeds are eaten, coat the roll again.
