

What is it that we do as a Church? When we do come to the church building, do we just sing songs, hear a couple of readings from the Bible, say a couple of prayers, and then go home? That takes about an hour and 15 minutes on Sunday morning. What about the rest of the day on Sunday let alone the other six days of the week? I know some folks come to the building on Sunday, stay to have coffee and pastries, meet friends, and catch up for the week. Some others come early in order to sing with the choir. I know there are a few who make plans for lunch after worship on Sunday morning. That begs the question; does anything we do or say make a difference for the rest of the week? Does it make a difference in anyone else's life other than our own?

What we do, what we say, who we trust says quite a bit about us as followers of Jesus. Consider the parable of the Life Saving Station. This is an old story, but the point is still as good today as it was the day it was first told.

On a dangerous seacoast where shipwrecks often occur, there once was a crude little life-saving station. The building was just a hut, there was only one boat, but the few devoted members kept a constant watch over the sea and with no thought for themselves, they went out day or night tirelessly searching for the lost.

Many lives were saved by this wonderful little station, so that it became famous. Some of those who were saved and various others in the surrounding areas, wanted to become associated with the station and give of their time, money, and effort for the support of its work. New boats were purchased and new crews were trained. The little life-saving station grew.Some of the new members of the life-saving station were unhappy that the building was so crude and so poorly equipped. They felt that a more comfortable place should be provided as the first refuge of those saved from the sea.

So, they replaced the emergency cots with beds and put better furniture in an enlarged building. Now, the life-saving station became a popular gathering place for its members, they re-decorated it beautifully, and furnished it as a sort of club.

Less of the members were now interested in going to sea on life-saving missions, so they hired lifeboat crews to do this work.

The mission of lifesaving was still given lip -service, but most were too busy or lacked the necessary commitment to take part in the life-saving activities personally.

About this time, a large ship was wrecked off the coast and the hired crews brought in boat loads of cold, wet, and half-drowned people.

They were dirty and sick, some of them had black skin, some spoke a strange language, and the beautiful new club was considerably messed up. So the property committee immediately had a shower house built outside the club where victims of shipwreck could be cleaned up before coming inside.

At the next meeting, there was a split in the club membership. Most of the members wanted to stop the club's lifesaving activities as being unpleasant and a hindrance to the normal life pattern of the club.

However, some members insisted that lifesaving was their primary purpose and pointed out that they were still called a life-saving station. They were finally voted down and told that if they wanted to save the life of all the various kinds of people who were shipwrecked in those waters, they could begin their own life-saving station down the coast. They did.

As the years went by, the new station experienced the same changes that had occurred in the old. They evolved into a club and yet another life-saving station was founded.

If you visit the seacoast today, you will find a number of exclusive clubs along that shore. Shipwrecks are still frequent in those waters, only now most of the people drown.

In the world in which we live, it is very easy to get lost and confused about what it means to be a follower of Jesus. Trusting completely in Jesus and being guided by the Holy Spirit means it is about seeing to it that people, whose lives are a "wreck", find rescue and relief. Now that we are in the beginning of the program year, we have quite a few ministries that need help and volunteer positions that need to be filled. Good Shepherd needs an assortment of all kinds of volunteers to make things happen for this church to be a life-saving station along our coastline. Will you join me in the boats?

Our good friend Saint Paul has some instructions for Saint Timothy, which might be helpful to us as the election season ramps up.


1 Timothy 2:1-5

Stewardship is living out our commitment to Christ.

Applying Bible Principles

The vast majority of people like to excel at something. Most of us like to do what we do in a manner that is truly first-class. Whether we are involved in one of the trades, or whether we are working in a profession, or doing volunteer work, we like to excel in what we do.

In the Christian life, most of us like to demonstrate our love for the Lord in ways that will reflect properly on Him and that will bring honor to Him. As His servants, we take great care that our Christian service is of such quality that what we do for His sake is first-class. Thus, whether we sing a solo in a worship service at church, prepare a meal for someone who is a shut-in, or teach a Bible class, we strive to do what we do for God in the very best way possible.

The Apostle Paul indicates we are also to excel in the grace of giving. "Now as you excel in everything ... in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you ... so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking" (2 Cor. 8:7). In other words, just as we might seek to excel in other ways which demonstrate our Christian faith in action, we are also to excel in the grace of giving.

In the context of the verse we just read, Paul commends the Macedonian Christians for giving as much as they were able and more. When we follow their example, we experience "grace giving" in action, not only giving as we are able, but also, giving beyond our ability. Another term for this type of giving is "consecrated giving". Consecrated giving never results from arm-twisting, browbeating, or squeezing. Consecrated giving, the kind that honors God, comes from a motivation that only the Holy Spirit can provide. When we give in this way, we demonstrate the fruit of the Christian life by the power of the Holy Spirit within us. As we step out by faith (one of the signs of a Spirit-controlled life), we are able to give in ways which might seem improbable or impossible at first. The Spirit of God thereby motivates us and compels us to excel in the grace of giving!

Early in the 19th century, Frederick William III, King of Prussia, found himself in great financial difficulty. He was carrying on expensive wars and

endeavoring to make a great nation of the Prussian people. But he did not have enough money to accomplish his plans.

After much thought, he decided to ask the women of Prussia to donate their gold jewelry to be melted down and made into money for their country. He resolved, however, that for each gold ornament, he would give in exchange an iron decoration as a token of his gratitude. Each decoration would bear the inscription, "I gave gold for iron, 1813."

The response was overwhelming. And what was even more important was that these women prized their gifts from the king more highly than their former possessions. The reason, of course, is clear. The decorations were proof that they had sacrificed for their king. It became unfashionable for women to wear jewelry, and the Order of the Iron Cross was established. Members of this order wore no jewelry except for a cross of iron.

Commenting on this lesson from history, Stephen Olford wrote this: "The church today needs an army of people who are so committed to the King of Kings that sacrifice becomes a way of life. Such an army would do exploits for God; such an army would hasten the coming and reign of the King ... Recruits for this army should be known as members of the Order of the Cross of Christ because they have experienced the grace of giving."

As Paul wrote so pointedly to the Christians at Corinth, we are to excel in the grace of giving. Are you excelling in the grace of giving? If not, why not take God at his Word ... by faith ... and begin today?





What you need:


- 12 small, smooth rocks
- An empty, clean egg carton
- Paintbrush
- Acrylic paint (gold or silver)
- Black permanent marker

What you do:

- 1. Clean the rocks and egg carton. Place newspaper on a table to protect it from paint.
- 2. Paint all sides of the rocks and carton. Let dry. Add a second coat, if desired.
- 3. When rocks are dry, number each rock (1-12) with marker. Place rocks in the carton.
- 4. Play hide-and-seek with a friend. Take turns hiding the rocks in a room, sandbox or backyard. Give clues, if needed, and count the rocks as they're returned.
- Use your imagination to incorporate a treasure hunt into study time or family devotions.
