



PASTOR'S PAGE





The fall season always seems to be one of the busiest times of year in the church. For example, in October, we have several events happening – and this is not a complete list. On Tuesday, October 3rd, our Cub Scouts will be serving their annual Spaghetti Dinner. On Saturday, October 7th, we will have a blessing of pets from 10:00 AM to 11:00 AM. That is just the first week! We also have Trunk-or-Treat scheduled to take place on Sunday, October 29th from 4:00 PM to 6:00 PM. I am sure there are other plans and projects for this month that I have either forgotten or do not yet know about, but the above is a start!

There is also a special "holiday" that Lutherans celebrate in October. This is Reformation Day.

Reformation Day is often a time congregations use to celebrate their Lutheran heritage. When I was a child "Reformation" could best be described as "Lutheran Pride Day". I attended a Lutheran Elementary School and we would have birthday cake at lunch on Reformation Day and we would sing "Happy Birthday" to the Lutheran Church just as if we were singing the song to an individual.

We remembered that on October 31, 1517, a young Augustinian Friar by the name of Martin Luther, marched up to the church door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany and posted the famous 95 Theses. He was, in effect, challenging the Church of his day to a debate. In Martin Luther's time, there was something called a "disputation", the purpose of which was for two sides to be able to argue a point of theological doctrine without any risk of being charged with heresy. This format enabled the church to use their theologians to figure things out before declaring them publicly. The original title of Martin Luther's Ninety-Five Theses was "Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences". These arguments normally would have been discussed behind closed doors. But the result was different. These 95 points of discussion started a firestorm that changed history.

I could give you a long history lesson but that is not the purpose of this message. What we need to remember is that the Reformation calls us, as a church in our time, to re-evaluate our past and look to grow into our future.

Our Lutheran heritage is only a small part of Reformation Day. But what is that heritage, exactly? What are the aspects of Luther's contributions (as well as those of his colleagues like Philipp Melanchthon) to theology and the church that are worth holding on to? We, in the 21st century, tend to think of the Reformation in terms of an event that took place 506 years ago and a one and done thing, but it is an on-going process. The original reformers suggested that the church should be "Semper Reformanda" or "Always Reforming". Luther (and the other reformers) had to challenge laws, rules, and traditions in the church of their day. What about us? I do not mean picking fights and making sure that each of us gets our personal preferences.

Here are some questions to consider. How do we as a church community deal with rules and procedures today? Which rules do we keep, which do we break, when, and why? What are the aspects of Luther's contributions (as well as those of his colleagues like Philip Melanchthon) to theology and the church that are worth holding on to? Where is there room for us to be critical? How do we remain faithful in the midst of all that? Actually, that is what Luther and the other reformers were challenging the Church to consider.

Perhaps the best way to look at this is to recognize that rooted in the past and growing into the future, the church must always be reformed in order to live out the love of Jesus in an ever-changing world. We celebrate the good news of God's grace, that Jesus sets us free every day to do this life-transforming work, trusting in the freedom given to us in Baptism.

It's a journey we are all on whether we like change or not. The Holy Spirit invites us to join in the journey of Reformation and Transformation as we grow into our future as we continue to emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic that challenged us in so many ways the last couple of years. Where are we going? Let's put our trust in the Holy Spirit and see where the Holy Spirit is leading. Are you ready to continue the journey?





Applying Bible Principles

During the month of October, Good Shepherd Lutheran Church will be running our annual Stewardship Campaign. Our theme for this year is **Bearing Fruit for Jesus! His Grace and Power at Work within You**. This three-week program will be introduced on October 1st and will begin on Sunday, October 8th. Commitment Sunday, also called "Harvest Sunday" this year, will be October 22nd.

Fruit trees are one of the many wonders of God's creation. To see the beauty of the tree and its fruit, to enjoy its taste, and to realize that it all came from a tiny seed is almost beyond our comprehension. An apple seed is planted in the ground, and, with water and sun as nourishment, miraculously a seedling surfaces that develops into a fruit tree. After a period of time, the apple tree fulfills its mission by bearing apples.

We, as Christians, are like that apple tree. We, too, have been fed and nourished by God so we can bear fruit. "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit—fruit that will last" (John 15:16). Jesus tells us "I am the Vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in Me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from Me you can do nothing" (John 15:5). The life and power of any plant is found in its vine. The vine uses the branches to produce its fruit. The branch is simply a growth of the vine, produced by it and appointed to bear fruit. The branch exists only because the vine makes it possible.

Fruit characterizes the life of the Christian steward. It is interesting to note that, in this passage above, Jesus did not say, "You SHOULD bear fruit." He stated that when we abide in Him, it follows naturally that we WILL bear fruit.

Christ has given us the task of ministering to the needs of others and spreading the Gospel. As we stay connected to Him through His Word and Sacraments, we discover God's perfect will for us, and we are empowered to please Him by bearing fruit (Colossians 1:9-10). God has created us to bear fruit (Ephesians 2:10), but only through Christ is it possible for us to do so.

Paul explained to the Galatians what that fruit is: "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness, and self-control." "Since we live by the Spirit," Paul exhorted, "let us keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other" (Galatians 5:25-26).

As children of God, we have this fruit because His Spirit lives in us. We do not bear fruit as a result of our own efforts, but we do cease to bear fruit when we give in to our sinful natures, becoming, in Paul's words, "conceited, provoking and envying each other."

Just as fruit needs light for its growth and maturation, so do Christians need to have their lives illumined by Christ. They then are able to produce spiritual fruit and shed that light on the world around them. Ephesians 5:11 cautions us to, "Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness" but to "Live as children of light (for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth) and find out what pleases the Lord" (Ephesians 5:8-9).

We discover God's will through His word and through prayer. As Paul prayed for the Colossians, we, too, can ask God "to fill [us] with the knowledge of His will through all spiritual wisdom and understanding . . . in order that [we] may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please Him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work . . ." (Colossians 1:9-10).

God has plans and uses for our lives. When we abide in Christ, we will be fruitful. We will discover and follow His plan, and we will use the gifts He has given us in ministry to the people of the world.

Go and bear fruit!



All Saints' Sunday


Sunday, November 5, 2023


A sprinkle of pepper and a dab of soap illustrate a big concept from God's Word.

- 3. Dab the toothpick into a drop of soap. Then touch its tip to the center of the water and observe.

- 5. Explain the science behind this experiment: The soap disturbs the water's surface tension. The soap molecules don't want to interact with the water. This repels the water molecules from the soap, causing the floating pepper to also move to the sides.
