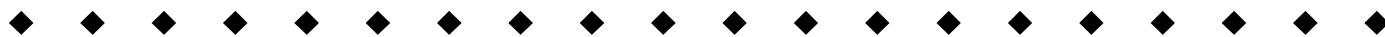

THE POPCORN MINERAL...!!



Perlite, the unique, so-called popcorn mineral, is one of the most surprising actors of the mineral kingdom.

Being a highly hydrated variety of lava, it explodes with almost explosive force when brought quickly under high temperatures between 1600 and 1700 degrees. It is found in a number of localities in our western mountains, but some of the best deposits are located near Lovelock, Nevada and Grants, New Mexico. A carload of crushed, when expanded, produces about 20 carloads of plaster-making aggregate, and a cubic foot of the expanded pellets may weigh as little as two pounds.

TO A CUTTERS COMPETITION

The Houston Gem and Mineral Society is offering a cutters competition, Open to all cutters. It will be a judged competition based on Role Judging Guidelines. First Prize will be \$200; Second Prize is \$100. The entries are due no later than September 15th

The materials to be cut are Chrysoprase, Imperial Jasper (red or green) and (Labradorite or Spectrolite) The cuts will consist of: A pair cut to match The H.G.M.S. lapidary sections Template #4, the asymmetrical tear-drop shape marked 15 MM in dimension

(the two should be cut mirror image from each other). A single stone to match the cushioned (pillowed) triangle 20 MM on Template #4. A single stone cut to match the Marquise cut on Template #1 marked 30 MM. The complete entry will consist of 4 stones cut in 3 shapes as listed above.

Checks should be made out to H.G.M.S lapidary Section. The entries and awards will be shown at the H.G.M.S. show of 2012 and displayed through the show starting Nov 9th through the 11th. They will be returned within three weeks after the show.

THE FOLLOWING POINT FORMULA WILL BE USED FOR EVALUATING ALL SUBMITTED STONES.

CHOICE OF MATERIAL:

Quality of stone, proper orientation placement of pattern.....15 Points

SANDING AND GRINDING:

No flat spots, scratches, sufficient sanding, etc.....25 Points

POLISH:

High luster, water glass finish.....30 Points

SYMMETRY:

Dome, outline, curvature.....15 Points

Back Bevel even and approximately 45 degree.....5 Points

Bezel edge if present even.....5 Points

SIZE:

Accuracy of template size.....5 points

A back bevel is required on all submitted stones. A bezel edge is allowed and not required but must be even and consistently cut if present. The stones must fit the template used without being too large or too loose when finished polished. Judging will be done with the aid of a 10x Jewelers Loupe.

TUMBLER TIP by Don Shurtz

Although my tumbled rocks look ok after the polish stage. I was not pleased with the results I was getting with the clean and burnish stage. I had been using Ivory Snow Flakes in the final runs, so as an experiment, I added a dollop of car wax. The rocks came out cleaner, and had a really bright finish. I have tried this on several batches, and it has helped every time. For the record, I used about two teaspoons of Turtle Car Wax (cream, not liquid) in my 5-pound tumbler.
