

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

## JULY 2020 MEMBER SURVEY RESULTS

Hello everyone. The ETGMS Board of Directors (BOD) wants to thank everyone who took the time to complete the survey. We very much appreciate your feedback and are thrilled to see all the support you have for ETGMS! Your responses are definitely helping us set a directional course for our club during these challenging times.

We had 53 responses to the 135 email invitations sent. The short recap is:

- The vast majority still have an interest in participating in club events such as monthly and sub-group meetings, field trips, classes, events, and lab time.
- While there is an interest in all our events, we have a considerable number of responses that are not comfortable attending in small groups or classes at the clubhouse until the current number of positive cases has flattened out in Tyler/Smith County.
- In July, we scheduled a critter making workshop, but only four members attended. Three were Board members.
- The July field trip had a little better turn-out in 5, two of whom are on the Board.
- We are not surprised at the number that indicated that the vast majority of other clubs our members are involved in are not meeting or have switched to Zoom or another video conferencing tool for the undetermined future.

Your BOD will continue to monitor the number of active/new virus cases in our area and advise the membership of meeting/event schedules accordingly.

There were a few interested in Zoom meetings, but at this time the BOD has decided not to go down this path. The BOD is currently planning an October meeting with oral auction and open house.

We got high numbers interested in seeing videos from sub-groups and/or club members if we would not be meeting in person. We had several offers to make a video for the club members. If you are one of these folks, please contact Margaret for the video specifications.

The BOD is in the process of reaching out to those individuals who offered to help in specific areas – Facebook, Instagram, website, newsletter, and videos. If you have an interest in a specific area, please contact any BOD member.

# What's Going on with ETGMS.org

## Board of Directors Activities

March seems like such a long time ago. The Board of Directors (BOD) has missed seeing everyone as much as you have. Since we last met, the BOD has been busy keeping the business side of ETGMS moving forward via emails and meeting in person when necessary. One of the pressing items for the BOD has been creating a plan to manage the club finances in the event some or all our fund-raising events are significantly impacted or cancelled. Two of the Arts & Crafts Fairs we normally participate in later this year have already been cancelled for 2020. The BOD made

the decision not to go forward with the remodel of the clubhouse until such time as our club finances are more stable. We are optimistic we will be able to go ahead with our annual show.

Once the stay-at-home order was lifted and we were able to get some direction from local government on how to hold our club meetings, it became apparent that we needed to make more room in the clubhouse for meetings. The six-foot distancing rule was going to be challenging if we wanted to have more than 20 people. We identified several items that needed attention. Clubhouse organization topped the list, followed by the sale and/or storage of equipment and storage of items used for the annual show. To provide more storage we are in the process of acquiring and installing a 20-foot, one-time use, waterproof ocean container with security lock to house the 24" oil saw and bulky items used only once a year. Moving these items to the container will open up floor space in the meeting room to allow for the six-foot distancing rule.

We are also in the process of setting up several metal shelving units to better organize the items that will remain in the clubhouse. Lowe's gave us a good deal on metal shelving units, and we have purchased eight for different areas. It is the Board's intention to have the meeting room cleaned up and organized, per social distancing, by October 5 for our annual live auction. We would like to have an open house, as well.

I know some of you are probably wondering about our annual show in January. At this point, the Rose Garden Center is reserved for us, and we plan to go forward with the show. However, state and/or local governments could tell us "no" with little notice. But we hope to see you, our vendors, and the public, even with restrictions. Among the surveys, we had a great response from people wanting to support the club at the show, and we are really going to need your help!

In July, the BOD was very busy filling in the roles for newsletter publication, among other spots. In this issue, you will find an introduction to our new editor, Sarah Hawthorne. Other roles include Ed Grounds joining Fred Mahaffey as ETGMS Facebook administrator. Karen Nance joins Margaret Kilanski in administrating the Instagram account. Additional roles are still in the process of being filled. Stay tuned for updates.

Richard Armstrong requests that you fill out his survey about the Gemology sub-group. Margaret has written up a summary of the survey results relating to the club, in general. Most members do not want to gather until the positive COVID numbers in Tyler/Smith County have leveled out, and masks are not required.

Please keep in mind that in December we have our election of officers, Christmas party, and gift exchange. We do not want to cancel this. Let us end the year on a happy note and move towards a much better 2021.

Sarah inherited her love of rocks and rockhounding. Her great-grandfather was a huge rockhound and built his own rock saw. It is now in her possession. She has two truckloads of his collection, only a small portion of what he acquired. Her

mom loves to tell the story of Sarah, at age three, filling the car floorboard with rocks from a hotel and being disappointed when she had to put them back in the hotel's flower beds. Her other grandparents used to bring her rocks from their Colorado trips, before she was five. As a child she loved rocks and still does.

Sarah is quite athletic—enjoying gardening, hiking, mountain biking, kayaking, and the gym when she cannot be outside. I am sure her eyes are always down looking for interesting rocks. She has a side business of releasing doves at funerals, runs a Facebook garden group, and a Christian grief group.

Her career talent is inherited too, she started working in graphic design in her parents' sign shop in 1994. In 1998, Sarah started working with a T-shirt screen printer and did this for almost nine years. In 2007, she started working at Foretravel Motorcoach, designing their travel magazine, advertisements, and signs. She also managed the website and design graphics for their 45-foot motor coaches.

In 2004, Sarah married Jason, the love of her life and former Navy SEAL. In 2007, tragically, she lost Jason to pneumonia just eight weeks after the murders of his sister and nephew. She spent the next ten years in court getting the killer of her sister-in-law and nephew sent to prison. The case was on Dateline. On the bright side, shortly after Jason's passing, Sarah found out she was pregnant. Her daughter Sydney was due on Sarah's birthday but was a few days late. Sydney is ten now and more artistic than Sarah.

She and her mom worked the kids' dice game last year and she loved all the critter rocks. More recently, she has gotten into painting and Sarah is swimming in painted canvases. Sydney has painted many rocks for it. Maybe she will paint some for the kids' games.



Sarah has a lot of experience in creating, populating, and distributing electronic information and advertising documents. Part of her work job is putting together a 40+ magazine that is published four times a year. She uses professional grade publishing software and will need to create a new format for the Newsletter. # Passing of a Member

It is with sadness that I report the passing of Ed Beene, a long-time member of ETGMS. He and his wife Vivra Patricia (Pat) moved to Longview several years ago. Terry and Geva Roberts and Kinney and Vicky Polve are good friends. When I asked Pat if it would be alright to write an article on Ed's life, she sent me the following information. She said Ed would have liked the idea.

Ed met Pat in 1964 when he was with the United States Air Force (USAF). He handled all the supplies for the civilian schoolteachers. Pat was the only British teacher with the American Independent School System. They married in 1967. Before their move to California in 1968, they spent some time in London. At a craft booth on Carnaby Street, Pat spotted a jeweler making rings from piles of semi-precious gemstones. She chose a chunk of pyrite. Ed mentioned that they were leaving the next week for California. The guy tossed her chosen chunk back into the pile and said, "You don't want to get this here. Where you are going, you can walk out into the desert and find your own." This is how they got into rockhounding and lapidary work.

After settling into their home in El Centro, California, they joined the Imperial Valley Gem and Mineral Society. They learned all they could about recognizing, collecting, cutting, and polishing rocks. They were hooked!! Ed was president for three years, and Pat was secretary for about the same length of time. They added to the family with the birth of a daughter.

Five years later they moved to Mesa, Arizona, and joined the Gem and Mineral Society in Phoenix. They went on several field trips and learned a bit more about lapidary work. Ed retired from the

USAF in 1975.

They moved to his home just outside of Henderson, bringing along several thousand pounds of rough rocks from California and Arizona. They soon joined the East Texas Gem & Mineral Society and were members for a while but lacked the time to travel to quality gemstone sites. At some point, Ed went to work for Texas Kenworth Truck Company and was there for over 11 years. He went to work for Walmart in 1992 at the small Henderson store and retired in 2015 from its Supercenter.

Their Texas hobbies were bowling and fishing. They bought a boat and loved to spend weekends on Toledo Bend with their daughter. Pat persuaded him to get back into lapidary work after his final retirement. He purchased the necessary equipment and they rejoined ETGMS.

Unfortunately, Ed's health began to decline after back surgery in 2009. He could not stand and work at the capping machine for long. He would slice and shape, and Pat would try to polish. Kinney Polve would watch and guide them: "You need to take this and flatten the center there a little more--see you've still got scratches--they need to come out--take it back to the first wheel, very lightly...". It was all good guidance.

In March of 2017, Ed and Pat were all set to move to a retirement community in Longview. The day before the packers were to arrive, Ed suffered a stroke. He was transferred from the hospital to a rehab facility the day Pat moved their stuff to Longview. Pat said he tried so hard to improve, going through numerous physical therapy sessions and many bouts of pneumonia, but his body was not as strong as his will. He had a final bout

but did not recover. He died March 29, 2020, the day before their 53rd wedding anniversary. He leaves behind wife Pat, a daughter, two granddaughters, three great-grandsons, and one great-grandson due in November.

I cannot leave out Pat. In California, Pat collected smooth rocks from dry riverbeds while on field trips and painted roadrunners on them by request. While a member of ETGMS, she painted scenes on a few rock slabs to sell at the annual show. Unfortunately, we could not locate any pictures of her creativity.

She was learning to wire-wrap before Ed's stroke and intends to continue with it sometime in the future. She said buying cabs online will not be as much fun as going out and finding and polishing her own. Four years ago, Pat had a book published, entitled "Thirteen, a Baker's Dozen of Paranormal Punishments." She is presently working on a paranormal novel set in the north of England. She also designs and makes greeting cards. She wishes she had Kinney around to tutor her on selling them online.

I hope after reading this that you feel like you have gotten to know Ed and Pat. Terry says they were a delightful couple to talk to as Pat is always so joyful and full of information about England.



# BRAZOS RIVER FIELD TRIP



July 18, 2020

Rick Walker was thrilled to find what may be stingray teeth (pictured) in one of the two buckets he took home.

# Shop Time

The following photos show cabochons that I made from slabs cut from material collected on the Singleton Ranch, located south of Marfa, TX, by Teri Smith, rock hound leader. Figure 1 shows a cab with white flocculent material and some better defined black material that I think can be properly called plumes since they appear to be 3-dimensional. Figure 2 shows a cab with the same material as seen in Figure 1, but also has what appears to be at least two calcite crystals or their pseudomorphs composed of another soft material. Unfortunately, the crystals undercut while I was trying to grind and polish the cab.



I finished two new cabs (Figures 3 and 4) that I cut from some slabs I sawed from a large nodule I found in a bucket of rough collected on the Singleton Ranch and purchased from Teri Smith in Alpine, TX. Most of the slabs were not eye catching, but there was some banding in one spot on each of two slabs that I thought would make great cabs. The undulating bands (sometimes called veils) almost look like ethereal clouds opening up to show interior structures. Teri Smith told me that she has not seen this particular pattern in any Singleton Ranch material before. As an added bonus, I later discovered both of these cabs fluoresce a bright light-green color under shortwave UV light. This is what drives me to keep hunting for and cutting rough agate material to find out what new wonders you might see hidden within.



The Gemology Group of the ETGMS is open to any member who has an interest in gems, whether casual or professional. We love gems. We love talking about gems. We love working with gems, cutting, identifying, grading, and collecting.

The discipline of gemology has its beginning about 1908 when an English jeweler suggested to the National Association of Goldsmiths in England that they start a course for jewelers on the identification of gems. Although the principles of gem identification come from the science of mineralogy, gemology is not a science itself. There is a lot of science, you might say applied science, in gemology, but it is primarily a commercial discipline. It serves the gem and jewelry trade, from mining to retail sales, with the purpose of providing accurate identification and quality grading so that consumers know what they are buying.

Gemology draws upon several sciences including mineralogy, biology, physics, chemistry, and material science. Gems are minerals, rocks, organic materials, fossils, and man-made materials. Gemology is involved with the identification of gems, quality grading, determination of origin (natural or man-made), treatments, and other processes that man applies to gemstones. Gemology is also a market-based discipline that uses market and economic data for some of what gemologists do.

Our Gemology Group in the ETGMS has been just getting by for some time which makes me wonder how much interest there is in the club. The ETGMS is a GEM and Mineral Society. Gems are a primary focus of the club. However, most gems are also minerals so should be of interest to those in the Mineral Group. Some gems are fossils (amber, jet, and petrified wood for example) so should be of interest to those in the Fossil Group. Lapidaries cut and polish gems. In fact, until a mineral or rock is cut and polished, it is not a gem with the exception of some crystals that are so beautiful in their natural state that they are set in jewelry thus becoming a gem. Whatever your primary interest is as a member of the club, in all probability, you are involved with gems. The Gemology Group should be something of interest to all members of ETGMS.

This pandemic has been hard on all of us and when we can start meeting again, I want to make the Gemology Group something we can all be involved with and benefit from. Therefore, I have the following short survey that I would like all with an interest in gems to answer. As an incentive, for those who answer the survey I am holding a contest. You will have a chance to win a sample of gemstones if you can guess a number between 1 and 100 that is closest to a number I select.
