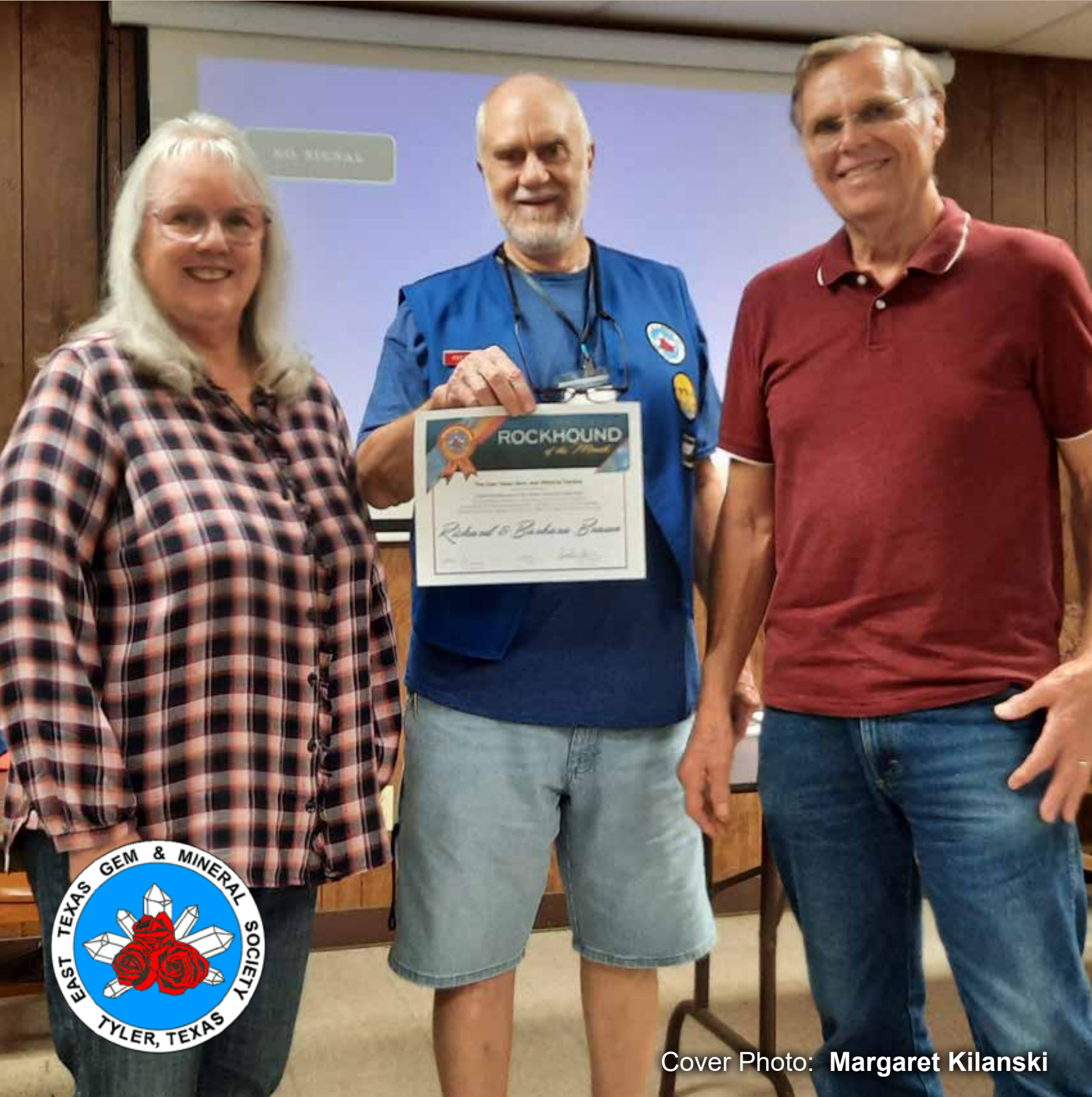

# Shop Time

While cleaning up the shop and rearranging everything, I found the slabs that produced the four cabs shown. I decided to make these cabs on Monday before the storms moved in and took the pictures on Wednesday. The sun was not out, but it was a bright day for the photos. I will not be able to make any more cabs or do any more work in the shop until I recover from surgery.

The first cab is a small Laguna agate that is about the size of a quarter and did not take long to make due to its small size. (Fig.

1) I believe the second cab is what is called a Parrot Wing due to all the colors. (Fig. 2) Part of the slab had some red in it, but I was not able to include the red in this cab. I had trouble getting a decent polish on it with ZAM, but got a little better polish using tin oxide. This makes me wonder if it really is Parrot Wing since that is a softer material that polishes well using ZAM.

The third photo shows a nice red and black plume agate, probably from the Walker Ranch south of Alpine, Texas. (Fig. 3) I noticed that several spots appeared on the surface when I finished the cab. Upon closer inspection, the spots were produced when the grinding process exposed some of the plume tips. Also, the exposed plume tips had a silvery shine to them when examined under a bright light. I suspect this is produced by iron oxide or manganese oxide which produces a black color in the plumes.

The last photo shows a beautiful agate that I do not remember seeing before. It has gorgeous colors and formations in it. (Fig. 4) I wish I had more of this material to work with, but the one slab that produced this cab is all that I could find. I talked to two of my friends that have a lot of experience with agates and they think it could be what they call pocket-rot wood. This is caused by the removal of small parts of the wood during fossilization and replacement with agate. There is another type of alteration of wood during fossilization in south Texas that is called shrink wood.

(Since Terry is unable to type for a while, I am turning emails he sent before the surgery into Shop Times, including this column. The Shop Time for June will be on Pocket-Rot Wood. – Julia)





# How to Make Gem Trees:

*Or what do with all those rocks!!!*

Many years ago, the Japanese art of Bonsai was created from the Chinese traditional art of Penjing. Bonsai uses small live trees and forms them into the shapes of real trees. Later, the same idea was applied to wire, rocks, and gemstones.

The gemstone trees are fun to make and collect. Sometimes they are used in Feng Shui decorating. Others attribute mystical or healing properties to different minerals and gem trees are a fun way to have these minerals on display.

Personally I just like the way they look and they are fun to make.

There are many ways to create a gem tree, and there are just as many tutorials on you-tube that go into great detail. I am going to just explain the basics; then you can let your imagination run wild.

I must confess that the first gem tree I made was from instructions I got from a neighboring rock club's Pebble Pups program. I figured if the kids could make a tree, so could I. Here we go!

- Pick out a palm size or smaller rock, and some rock chips or beads. Any craft wire will work. I use copper wire that is natural colored and copper wire that is tinned a silver color, or you can use any color you wish. I use a 24-26 gauge craft wire.

- Next, think about how many branches you want, I usually have 24 or so. Cut 24 equal size pieces of your wire, about 6-8 inches long. The length will determine how tall your tree will be. (Fig. 1)

- Take the pieces, hold tight, and start twisting about 1 inch from one end. At this point we are creating the roots and trunk of the tree. Keep twisting until you have about two inches of twisted wire. (Fig. 2)

- At this point it's time to start the branches. Separate a few strands of wire and twist together, leaving a small tip of each single wire exposed. Then continue twisting the branch and separate a couple more strands of wire and twist together. Continue this pattern until you "run out" of wire at the tree top. (Fig. 3) You will end up with a single wire that should be trimmed to about a 1" length. You will use this wire to attach your rocks.

- Separate the roots and bend them around your rock. Use a good amount of glue (527 craft glue works well) and secure the "tree" to the rock, I use fishing line to tie the wires to the base. Let dry completely. (Fig. 3)

- Lastly find the end of each branch, make a small circle at the end of the wire and glue a tiny rock, bead or gem on the end. Continue until all branches have a glued rock on the end. Let dry and then shape your gemstone bonsai in any form you wish. (Fig. 4)

Have fun and enjoy your masterpiece!

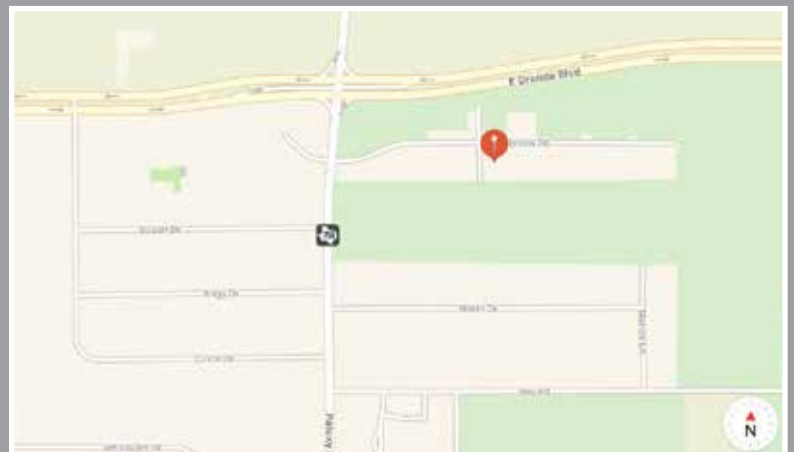
