Announcements:



While looking for some different material to cab for this month's newsletter, I came across a couple of polished slabs of Ocean Wave Jasper from Madagascar that I had purchased at a show about 15 years ago. I was able to cut two beautiful cabs from one of the slabs (see the first photo.) I believe this material rivals the beauty of the more famous orbicular Ocean Jasper that also came from Madagascar.

The second photo shows a very nice Pompom Agate that must have come from Needle Peak which is located just north of Big Bend National Park in West Texas. It was in a box of material that I purchased from the daughter of one of our deceased club members. She remembers her father taking her and her brother to the Woodward Ranch, which is located about 18 miles south of Alpine, in 1962, to go hunt agate. Although she doesn't remember how her father acquired the Pompom Agate slabs, I believe he must have bought them from Frank senior at the ranch.

The pompoms in the cab are composed of aragonite crystals that have been replaced by silica (chalcedony), with the exception of the smaller halfpompom located just above the much larger pompom at the bottom of the cab. Part of the smaller pompom was undercut by the grinding



process where the aragonite was exposed. I had to rework the cab to eliminate the undercut area. I was able to polish the chalcedony portion of the cab with cerium oxide and then follow up with ZAM to polish the exposed Aragonite. The ZAM did not affect the cerium oxide polish.

Author's Correction: There was an error in designating photo numbers in the July 2023 issue of the SHOP TIME article. Figures 2 & 4 were reversed during preparation for publication. The Poppy Jasper from Black Butte Reservoir in California should be labeled as the second photo and the red banded agate in transmitted light should be labeled as the fourth photo. My apologies for any confusion this error may have created.

What do bombs, excrement, diamonds, and teeth have to do with each other? At first glance, surely nothing but when used as visual aids in a presentation on geology and paleontology, each item can spark interest, heretofore unknown, especially in a young mind.

The bomb would be a periodotite bomb, blown out from a volcano, the August baby's favorite example of an igneous rock. Excrement, the fossilized kind from a dinosaur, receives a name change – coprolite - and becomes a thing of beauty and science. Diamonds need no expla-

nation save for a lesson on their dark beginnings, and a multitude of teeth from an array of creatures begins to give a picture of ancient inhabitants of this chunk of rock we call earth.

All these items and many more were on display for a group of approximately forty individuals ranging in age from grandmothers to toddlers at the Rusk library July 11th. As part of the library's summer reading project, East Texas Gem & Mineral Society members Fred Mahaffey and Becky Whisenant spoke to the

group on the subjects of geology, mineralogy, and paleontology giving students the opportunity to ask and answer questions and hold and examine mineral specimens and fossils.

The goal, to coin a 1960s term, was to broaden their horizons, and plant seeds in their developing minds that may one day take root and grow. Overall, it was a gratifying and fun experience.
