The Immaculate Conception is the doctrine that the Virgin Mary was free of original sin from the moment of her conception. It is one of the four Marian dogmas of the Catholic Church, along with Mary's Divine Motherhood, Perpetual Virginity, and Assumption. Debated by medieval theologians, it was not defined as a dogma until 1854, by Pope Pius IX in the papal bull *Ineffabilis Deus*.

**What it is**: The belief that Mary was conceived without original sin. God granted her this privilege at the moment of her conception, preserving her from all "stains of original sin."

What it is not: It is not the virginal conception of Jesus. Jesus's conception by the Holy Spirit is celebrated at the Annunciation on March 25, nine months before Christmas.

## Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe



Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe, conocida comúnmente como la Virgen de Guadalupe, es una aparición mariana de la Iglesia católica de origen mexicano, cuya imagen tiene su principal centro de culto en la Basílica de Guadalupe, ubicada en las faldas del cerro del Tepeyac, en el norte de la Ciudad de México.

De acuerdo al relato guadalupano conocido como Nican mopohua (1556) que narra que tras la primera aparición, la Virgen ordenó a Juan Diego que se presentara ante el primer obispo de México, Juan de Zumárraga, para decirle que le erigieran un templo el cual recogió la tradición oral mexicana, y lo descrito por otros documentos históricos como el códice Escalada (1548), el Nican Motecpana (1590), Nican Tlantica, el Huei Tlamahuizoltica (1649) y otros documentos, María, la madre de Jesús se apareció en cuatro ocasiones al indígena chichimeca Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin en el cerro del Tepeyac, y en una ocasión a Juan Bernardino, tío de Juan Diego. El obispo Juan de Zumárraga pidió una prueba a Juan Diego, pues era escéptico a dicha aparición. En la última aparición de la Virgen y por orden suya, Juan Diego llevó en su ayate unas rosas de Castilla que cortó en el Tepeyac y se dirigió al palacio del obispado. Al desplegar su ayate ante Juan de Zumárraga, dejó al

descubierto la imagen de la Virgen María, cuyos rasgos han sido interpretados como "mestizos" a pesar de ser de piel mucho más clara que su homónima española. El parecido entre esa figura y la bordada en el entonces por todos conocido Pendón de Hernán Cortés sería la causa de que se le denominara Virgen de Guadalupe.

Según el Nican Mopohua, texto hagiográfico publicado en el siglo XVII, las apariciones tuvieron lugar en 1531, ocurriendo la cuarta el 12 de diciembre de ese mismo año. La fuente más importante que las relata fue el mismo Juan Diego, que habría contado todo lo que había acontecido. Posteriormente esta tradición oral fue recogida en un escrito con sonido náhuatl pero con caracteres latinos; este escrito es llamado el Nican mopohua, y es atribuido al indígena Antonio Valeriano (1522-1605). Posteriormente, en 1648, es publicado el libro Imagen de la Virgen María Madre de Dios de Guadalupe por el presbítero Miguel Sánchez, contribuyendo a recopilar todo lo que se sabía en la época sobre la devoción guadalupana.

Según diversos investigadores, el culto guadalupano es una de las creencias más históricamente arraigadas en el actual México y parte de su identidad, y ha estado presente en el desarrollo como país desde el siglo XVI [8] incluso en sus procesos sociales más importantes como la Independencia de México, la de Reforma, la Revolución mexicana y en la sociedad mexicana actual, en donde cuenta con millones de fieles, algunos de ellos profesantes como guadalupanos sin ser necesariamente parte del catolicismo. Las raíces devocionales primigenias de esta imagen estarían en la Virgen de Guadalupe de Extremadura, por la cual tenían devoción los conquistadores españoles.

## Our Lady of Guadalupe

Our Lady of Guadalupe (Spanish: Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe), also known as the Virgin of Guadalupe (Spanish: Virgen de Guadalupe), is a Catholic title of the Blessed Virgin Mary associated with four Marian apparitions to Juan Diego and one to his uncle, Juan Bernardino reported in December 1531, when the Mexican territories were part of the Spanish Empire.

Pope Leo XIII granted a decree of canonical coronation for the image on 8 February 1887. The rite of coronation was executed by the former Archbishop of Mexico, Próspero Alarcón y Sánchez de la Barquera on 12 October 1895. Pope Paul VI raised the shrine to the status of Minor Basilica via his Pontifical decree titled Sacra illa Ædes on 6 October 1976. It is the most-visited Catholic shrine in the world, and the world's third most-visited sacred site.

According to the Nican Mopohua, included in the 17th-century Huei tlamahuiçoltica, written in Nahuatl, the Virgin Mary appeared four times to Juan Diego, a Chichimec peasant, and once to his uncle, Juan Bernardino. The first apparition occurred on the morning of Saturday, December 9, 1531 (Julian calendar, which is December 19 on the (proleptic) Gregorian calendar in present use). Juan Diego experienced a vision of a young woman at a place called the Hill of Tepeyac, which later became part of Villa de Guadalupe, in a suburb of Mexico City.


According to the accounts, the woman, speaking to Juan Diego in Nahuatl, his first language and the language of the former Aztec Empire, identified herself as the Mary, "mother of the very true deity". She was said to have asked for a church to be erected at that site in her honor.[4]

Based on her words, Juan Diego then sought the Archbishop of Mexico City, Juan de Zumárraga, to tell him what had happened. Not unexpectedly, the Archbishop did not believe Diego. Later the same day, Juan Diego saw the young woman again (the second apparition), and she asked him to continue insisting.

The next day, Sunday, December 10, 1531, in the Julian calendar, Juan Diego spoke to the Archbishop a second time. The latter instructed him to return to Tepeyac and to ask the woman for a truly acceptable, miraculous sign to prove her identity. Later that day, the third apparition appeared when Juan Diego returned to Tepeyac; encountering the same woman, he reported to her the Archbishop's request for a sign, which she consented to provide on the next day (December 11).

According to the story, the Virgin arranged the flowers in Juan Diego's tilmàtli or cloak, and when Juan Diego opened his cloak later that day before Archbishop Zumárraga, the flowers fell to the floor, revealing on the fabric the image of the Virgin.

The next day, December 13, Juan Diego found his uncle fully recovered as the Virgin had assured him, and Juan Bernardino recounted that he also had seen her after praying at his bedside (fifth apparition); that she had instructed him to inform the Archbishop of this apparition and of his miraculous cure; and that she had told him she desired to be known under the title of "Guadalupe."

Who was Isabella la Católica?

Queen Isabel was born in Alcázar, Kingdom of Ávila, Spain, on April 22, 1451. She married Ferdinand, heir of Aragon, at 18 years of age, on October 19, 1469.

She was crowned Queen of Castille on December 13, 1474, and lived much of her life under duress of severe struggles for power with in the State. Along with King Ferdinand, she launched Christopher Columbus' greatest voyage of history and therefore is perhaps better known for her benevolent sponsorship of the discoveries of the new world where Christianity was yet unknown.

A brave and virtuous woman, in addition to adversity, she also had to contend with her own personal tragedy, losing prematurely many of the persons closest to her, including a son and a daughter.

The National Daughters of Isabella was founded in New Haven, CT, in 1897. Although not officially affiliated with the Knights of Columbus (since the KofC does not grant permission to any organization to affiliate with it) the National Daughters of Isabella have always worked in conjunction with them. With their motto of "Unity, Friendship, Charity," the group is open to practicing Catholic women.

Members of the D of I work in sympathy and accord with the Catholic Church, to combine the resources of Catholic women to promote the social and religious up-building of women, promoting the high ideals of life and morals, and a to create a mightier force for the advancement of good in the world.

Locally, the Daughters of Isabella, St Rose of Lima Circle 73 boasts 77 members on its roster and is led by Regent (the President, or equivalent of Grand Knight), Billie Stieneker. The group has been actively serving both St Joseph and St Vincent parishes since 1918, and meets monthly on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of each month at Columbian Homes.

"We do a lot in support of St. Elizabeth|Coleman," Billie says, "including providing donations and support for their infant nursery program." St. Elizabeth|Coleman is a licensed, nonprofit adoption agency, located in Indianapolis, providing full-service birth parent and adoptive parent preparation - see <a href="https://www.givingbirthtohope.org">www.givingbirthtohope.org</a> for more information.

The D of I also sponsor multiple Holy Masses throughout the year for Queen Isabella, for their departed members, and for other purposes. They hold two major fundraising events annually - a Salad Luncheon on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday of June and a Game & Card Night in October.




