#### Is Your Giving Like God's Giving?

It has been said by some that, "Thanksgiving is just a day, but Christmas is a season." Visiting your local favorite retailer might convince one of that sentiment, but I reject that thinking. We should take time everyday to say thank you to our Lord. Why? Because He gave us Jesus.

Some years ago, my former pastor, Rev. Dr. Kelvin T. Calloway, preached a message from the familiar John 3:16 which asked the provocative question, "Is your giving like God's giving?"

Yeah, I know we've often sung during the Benevolent Offering that, "You can't beat God's giving/No matter how you try," but what do we mean by that? It's this: God gave us His Son Jesus, and while we're counting up all that we're thankful for in this season, we should pause and thank God for Jesus every chance we get!

Pastor Calloway described life without Jesus like running on a treadmill where you build up a sweat, but get nowhere. In this season, if we're not careful we'll busy ourselves building up a sweat, and forget the real reason to be thankful—salvation!

The problem is, while God has given (and continues to give) us the best, we often try and give our *least*. Doesn't God deserve our *best*? Our *best* gifts? Our *best* heartfelt thanks? I mean, not because we *deserve* it, but God loved us so much that He gave us His Son.

And, if that doesn't get you excited, know this, God's giving is continuous. The writer of Lamentations even notes (3:22-23), "The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." Ours often has a beginning, middle, and end. I guess what I'm trying to say is that there's no comparison, when we hold up *our* giving to *God's* giving. And for that, we should never stop giving thanks.



Carol Smart is our Church School Superintendent. *Join us!* In **November**, we'll conclude the Fall Quarter, "Worship in the Covenant Community" with Unit 3: "Psalms of Thanksgiving and Praise."

This "final unit of the quarter focuses on the Hebrew psalter. The psalmists invite us to 'praise the Lord' (Psalm 461, Lesson 11) and to 'shout for joy to the Lord' (Psalm 100:1, Lesson 12). The worship of the people of God should be filled with thanksgiving and praise to the Lord, for He is our good shepherd who sustains us (Psalm 23, Lesson 10). The Lord is not distant and far off from us. Instead, the Lord is near us and has invited us to have a close relationship with Him (Psalm 139:1-12, Lesson 13). As [we] study the worship practices of the people of God, [let us] consider how [our] worship is a response to the truth that the Lord ia the one who is worthy of praise."
