

10 Fun Close-to-Home Summer Activities

Behold, God is my salvation; I will trust, and will not be afraid; for the Lord God is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation.

~Isaiah 12:2



Warm weather and long days are a recipe for family fun. No matter the ages or the size of your family, try an activity from our list to enjoy the summer season together – all close to home! As you create fun, lasting memories with your family, check out our electrical safety tips to keep your family safe.

1. **Host an outdoor movie night.** Hang a sheet or tablecloth, set up a projector with an extension cord, and create a circle of cushions, blankets, or chairs for viewing. Double-check your outdoor lights and extension cords before you gather. Only use Extension cords made for outdoor use, as they are made to withstand the elements. Inspect cords and plugs for frayed or broken pieces.
2. **Create a neighborhood scavenger hunt.** Create clues that will take your family members on a tour of the neighborhood as they solve each puzzle. The first team to return to home base with all clues collected and documented receives a prize. Safety tip: While you're out, help your kids identify major power lines in your neighborhood and talk about how to keep a safe, 10-foot distance from electrical lines.
3. **Open up your professional kitchen!** Challenge each member of your family to create a side dish to accompany dinner. Try each other's dishes and evaluate the taste, appearance, and originality. Pretend you're a judge on a cooking show. While you're in the kitchen; Regularly check the cords of the lights, appliances, and plugs in your kitchen and throughout your house. Make sure none of your cords are damaged or sitting out in high-traffic areas.
4. **Try balloon volleyball – wet or dry!** Get out balloons or water balloons and challenge your family members to volley back and forth. If you have enough people, create a tournament! Careful! Know the location of power lines and other lines and avoid them when you hang nets and plan where you will play. Be especially careful to keep a 10-foot distance from power lines attached to your house. If the ground is wet, don't use electric power or yard tools.
5. **Experiment with backyard breakfasts.** Who says picnics are just for lunch or dinner? Try taking your weekend family breakfast to your yard. Make baked goods that can easily be transported from the kitchen or bring an electric skillet outside with extension cords to try a hot breakfast in a new location. Use an extension cord specifically for the outdoors; outdoor cords are heavier and less likely to be damaged. Make sure you extension cords are properly plugged in and not broken.
6. **Create a backyard obstacle course.** Using outdoor furniture and natural elements, create an obstacle course low to the ground for family members to complete. For added fun, time each participant to see who can complete the course the fastest! You might find the littlest kids can hold their own! Before you play; make sure you know where power cords are located and avoid getting too close.



- 7. Write thank-you notes to your community heroes.** Call or go online to find the addresses of local police, fire, hospital, and emergency services staff. Write thank-you notes to let them know you appreciate their service. First responders know electrical safety: In the event of an emergency in your neighborhood that brings down electric transmission and distribution lines, you can call your local fire or police for help. They will coordinate with the utility to safely respond.
- 8. Plant a new tree!** Select a new tree or bush from your community garden center and recruit the family to work together to plant it. Plant safely! Never plant a tree that could grown to twenty-five feet or more near a power line and avoid areas around electric meters, transformers, or other equipment. Before digging, visit Call Before You Dig (Iowa One Call), call the local underground utility locator service at 811 to mark the location of underground utilities, so you don't accidentally come into contact with a power line.
- 9. Create an indoor party atmosphere!** Install colored light bulbs in your household lamps and overhead lights to change things up in your home! Pick a theme – such as fiesta or the Fourth of July – and play music that fits the occasion. While you're replacing bulbs: supervise or assist children to ensure they are safely installing new bulbs. In addition, check bulbs to make sure the wattage matches fixture requirements and do not install bulbs with a higher wattage than recommended. securely screw in bulbs.
- 10. Start a summer bucket list!** what is a project, new sport, hobby, or neighborhood activity that your family hasn't done? Ask your family member to help you brainstorm a bucket list and start checking off those fun to-do items!

from the Mayor

City Wide Clean-Up Days Reminder: Lots of junk, appliances, and scrap iron came in during the first clean-up day. The second clean-up day is Saturday, June 25, 2022, at the City stick dump just north of the Fire Station. Designated spot available to place your clean recyclable scrap metals.

Hazardous Waste Disposal Reminder: Saturday, July 9, 2022, between the Post Office and the old school gym. 9-11am. Sponsored by Hardin County Solid Waste and Metro Waste.

Street Repairs: Your city council is in the process of getting cost estimates together to fill potholes and repair areas that were torn out for water and sewer repairs. Input was collected from each council member and a few others for priority spots. This may be an opportunity for volunteerism to keep the cost down. Stay tuned for more information.

Five Year Strategic Plan: Your city has reached an agreement with Region 6 to assist Steamboat Rock with a 5-year strategic plan. The survey you all filled out about one year ago will be used in this plan. There may be additional information and study groups needed. The reason this is important to our community is when applying for grants, having a five-year plan rate higher in the scoring model towards points on many competitive grant applications. Your city council has requested that this plan have at least some flexibilities and be fluid enough to be effective without being restrictive.

Lawns: Wow-the entire town looked great for Memorial Day weekend-great work everyone. Last year at this time Hardin County was in a "Burn Ban" and it stayed dry all summer. This is Iowa-different year, different weather! Don't know about you, but in my own lawn I struggle with the challenge of keeping ahead of the weeds without killing my wife's flowers-be careful out there.

The heat has arrived!! If you are doing work outside, please stay hydrated!! One can become overheated very quickly. Take breaks regularly to make sure you are not overworking yourself. Even though you may not feel thirsty, drink some fluids.

If you have pets outdoors, they too will need plenty of water available. Farm animals need to have an eye kept on them when the temperature creeps up.

This is also the season that many unfortunate mishaps occur in vehicles. It doesn't take long for the inside of a vehicle to become deadly. If you should take your pet for a ride, roll down the windows or leave your vehicle on with A/C. Just cracking the windows isn't enough.

One helpful tip when carrying an infant, place your workbag/purse/briefcase in the rear on the same side of the carrier. This would allow a check in case they may have fallen asleep.

Maintenance Tip: You have been mowing your lawn for a few months now. Now would be a good time to remove all the dead grass that has accumulated on your mower. You would be amazed on where that grass has accumulated. This accumulation of dead grass is a very good fire starter next to a heat source (motor, rotating pulleys, etc.)

Awhile back, I mentioned to change your filter for the cooling season. If you didn't do that then, it may be a good time to do that now. It is amazing on how quickly those build up.

There seems to be a lot of talk these days about mental health or mental illness. Which is good, I think, because we as a society don't talk much about mental health, if we talk about it at all. We're fine talking about our physical health. We're even quick to bring it up when someone asks, "How've you been?"

But mental health? Not so much. There's almost a stigma attached to even mentioning it. Like maybe, if we ignore it, it'll just go away.

But consider these statistics from the National Alliance on Mental Illness, **NAMI**: -1 in 20 U.S. adults experience serious mental illness each year. In Iowa, 128,000 adults have a serious mental illness.

-More than half of people with a mental health condition in the U.S. didn't receive any treatment in the last year. Of the 154,000 adults in Iowa who didn't receive needed mental health care, 29% didn't because of cost.

-Iowans are over two times more likely to be forced out-of-network for mental health care than for primary health care — making it more difficult to find care and less affordable due to higher out-of-pocket costs. About 1.8 million people in Iowa live in a community that does not have enough mental health professionals.

-About 2 in 5 adults in Iowa jails or prisons have a history of mental illness.

-58% of Iowans ages 12–17 who have depression didn't receive any care in the last year.

-7 in 10 youth in the juvenile justice system have a mental health condition.

So, why should we as the church care? And what can we as the church, do for those who might be suffering from mental illness? That's a question that can't quickly be answered. Certainly not in the limited space we have here.

Unfortunately, there are a lot of things we can't do; like find treatment for those who need it. Or miraculously heal people like Jesus did. But there are things we can do.

We can see people as people, not as problems. See them as people created in the image of God, like Jesus did.

We can have compassion like Jesus did.

We can care like Jesus did.

We can love like Jesus did.

Will this solve all our mental health issues? No.

But it is what Jesus would do and that, friends, is what we, as Christians, are called to do. May it be so.

BROADWAY STREET

We moved from Cedar Falls where we had lived for seven years to 104 Broadway Street in 1963. George had taken his barber training at the Waterloo Barber College and serviced his apprenticeship at Williams Barber Shop on Main street, Cedar Falls. When the barber shop in Steamboat was listed for sale, we decided to move back. It was a 2 for 1 deal: the house AND the business for a total of \$8,000. Neighbors at that time were: Jerry and Dee Higgason at 102 Broadway, George & Antje Geerdes across the street at 105 Broadway, Henry/Annette, & Lydia Buthman at 106 Broadway.

102 Broadway Street: Ken & Fern Amsberry; Neil & Curly Hoekstra (beauty shop); Jerry & Dee Higgason
Moved in after Higgason's-Cecil & Shirley Rotgers (6 children) Howard & Lois Hollander; Jim & Ladana Van Eschen (2015)

105 Broadway Street: Geerd J. & Antje Geerdes; Gordon & Stella Geerdes(4 daughters). Roger & Jolene Pickering;
Mike Hansen 2016

106 Broadway Street: Henry, Annette, Lydia Buthman Bill & Sandy Trampe (1982)

We have always had good neighbors. The Buthmans had an "outhouse" on their property, but I don't think it was used as such. This was always a target for pranksters on Halloween and I remember Henry watching it one whole night to prevent a tip over.

They had a huge garden with their property line about 4 feet from the north side of our house. When Henry died, we bought that area which now extends to the north side of our garage In that area. During a storm, a big branch from one of their trees came down very close to their house. I called over to see if they were O.K. Mrs. Buthman said that Lydia had a sore toe so of course we went over, but it had nothing to do with the broken branch!

I checked on them often after Henry died and one day when I asked how she was, she said she was so tired." I asked, didn't you sleep well"? Well, she said, "When Hannah Harms shuts her porch light off, she (Mrs. Buthman) would go to bed. For some reason Hannah had left the light on all night and that was why she was tired.

Another time I looked out and saw Lydia lying in the garden. I ran over to tell them and Mrs. Buthman Just said, "I told her it was too hot". Apparently, she had seizures now and then, but I didn't know that.

If I would go over there on a Sunday, she would have her good dress on with a brooch. The parlor doors were open for any company that might come. Otherwise, those doors were shut during the week.

When Cecil and Shirley Rotgers move in next door, the kids were all young. Apparently, Cecil had pointed out the lot line as when I went outside, there all six of them stood in a row, on the lot line, as they had probably been told to stay in their own yard©. They were good neighbors our kids spent a lot of time together. We had a small dog that we were going to have spade and were trying to explain this to our kids. Gregg was around 3. Soon after this George had his appendix out and was sitting on Cecil's step talking to him about this. He told Cecil that his dad had his appendix out and now he couldn't have puppies ©.

When Gordon and Stella Geerdes moved in across the street, the fun really was in full swing. Gordon and George were like 2 little boys, always pulling pranks on someone. Gordon did a lot of wood carving and one day we found a huge mushroom in our front yard. From a distance it looked very real.

One Sunday, Gregg was sick, so I stayed home with him. I went into his bedroom to check on him and Glanced out the window. There was Gordon, tying little red balloons on our tomato plants.

There was a goose that wondered the neighborhood and George "planted" a wooden egg in their barn where the goose usually slept. He had the Geerdes girls convinced that the goose had laid that egg.

Sandy came home one day to hear some talking and found Gordon and George at the grapevine, helping themselves to the ripe grapes while they visited. The hadn't asked permission but knew it was O.k.

I had a large whiskey barrel that I wanted to plant flowers in. We had drilled the holes in the side filled It with dirt and had just planted all the flowers in it. George had the hose and was starting to water from the top of the barrel. Gordon arrived home in time to see the plants shooting out of the holes in all directions. He laughed so hard he could hardly come across the street. He had the solution. He helped us drill holes in drainpipes and put them into the barrel. We replanted the flowers and now when we watered, we would put the hose down the pipes which in turn would run out of the holes to water the flowers. This lasted lot of years. We always teased them about how their pasture would make such a nice city park. I put a notebook together to show them all of the possibilities for that park.

When Hollanders were going to leave on a fishing trip, we were in charge of watching their house. We thought they had been gone for too long so made up a For Sale sign and posted it in their yard by their driveway. It listed all the possibilities.

Overall, we have had very good neighbors who help out wherever needed and we enjoy each other. I am truly blessed.

The Steamboat Rock City Council met in regular session June 13th, 2022, 6:30 p.m. in the City Council chambers and available via zoom. Present were Mayor Stearns and the following council members: Adam Blackburn, Kevin Pieters, Cory Schurman, and Jon Schurman absent: Jackie Hagberg. Also present were Brandon Dilley, Dave Hagberg, Dave and Cindy Mull, JD Holmes, Bob & Vicki Hutchcroft, Sandy Trampe, Alan Whiley, Carol Williams, Melissa Johanson, Renee Oltrogge, Scott Williams, and JJ Veld.

Mayor Stearns called the meeting to order. Pieters moved, seconded by C. Schurman to approve the posted agenda. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Hagberg.

C. Schurman moved, seconded by J. Schurman to approve the minutes from May 9th, 2022. Motion carried unanimously, absent no one. J. Schurman moved, seconded by C. Schurman the motion to approve City bills as presented with the correction of check # 2302 and 2307 voided due to errors. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Hagberg. Hours were presented for Renee Oltrogge, City Clerk and Kelly Haskin, Water/Sewer Supervisor. Blackburn moved, Pieters seconded the motion to approve hours as presented with the correction, May 6th is Friday not Thursday. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Hagberg.

Public comments: Brandon Dilley has received two nuisance letters for dogs not on leash. Dilley is not happy with the way these letters were handled. Dave Hagberg complained about an interaction with a local individual on Friday, May 27th at 103 E Main St.

Truck 651, along with several other fire departments participation, was used to haul water on June 4th for the Old Baptist Camp pool. Recouped our fuel expense. Chief Williams presented PO #83 \$2,700.00 Freightliner Truck Center for repairs on the ambulance. C. Schurman moved, J. Schurman seconded the motion to approve the PO as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Hagberg.

JJ Veld presented the report from public works. There is a hole in the ground due to a culvert problem and needs to be repaired/replaced at the corner of 1st St and W Market St. Veld has called to get it dug up and repaired. Veld will attempt to blow out a plugged culvert going East and West at Broadway and E Market with the fire departments assistance. Hydrant flushing on the list. Veld explained we can lock valves on water meters if needed when we can't locate the shut off.

Mayor Stearns advised on distressed properties; 101 E Main- sale pending. 208 3rd St- Roll off has been delivered, burn scheduled for Saturday June 18th. Mayor Stearns requested a vote to use funds to complete demolition and clean-up of 208 3rd Street with the estimate originally at \$4,000.00. C. Schurman moved, Pieters seconded the motion to approve the spending as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Hagberg. 301 W Market St has had more damage and we are having City Attorney continue the process of condemnation. 308 6th St & 601 W Sycamore have requested a building permit to demolish the houses and leave the detached garages, waiting on permit to be turned in to the city. Property south of the Post Office is obtaining quotes to replace South and East walls.

Hardin County Conservation & Sewer Hook Up presented by Mayor Stearns advised they have started their studies and they are going down the River Road instead of underneath the river. They believe they will let bids in October with construction in 2023.






