# **Amos Bannagin**

(Crouching at grave of Peter Bannagin) Hey! Who goes there?!! (Look up quickly – make move for a knife) Oh, it's you – I suppose you're all here wondering why I would be in Steamboat Rock tonight - well, then, have a seat – quickly now. I don't want to be here long. I don't want everyone here in Steamboat Rock to know that I'm here tonight.

It was 120 years ago this last February that my father Peter Bannagin died in Cody, Nebraska. I brought him back here to be buried. 120 years ago, I stood here in this very spot to mourn the loss of my father. My parents were good people – and today I can only wish that I could start my life over. But I'm getting ahead of myself. Let me share my whole story.

My name is Amos Bannagin. I'm the second child of Peter and Celestia Seabury Bannagin. I was born August 16, 1863 in Lena, Illinois. My father came to America from Ireland when he was one week old, originally settling in Canada and then moving to New York. My mother's family was one of the earliest settlers in America. Eventually my parents settled here – one mile north of Steamboat Rock near what is still known today as "Bannagin's Ripples". Pruella, Ernest, Lettie, and William were my brothers and sisters. I had one infant sibling who is here buried here beside my father. Celestia's parents, Martin & Mary Seabury are buried right over here. Martin died in a prairie fire. *Cont'd on page 7*

**New City Ordinance for ATV/ UTV:** The entire new Ordinance can be found in this issue with the 5/08/2023 City Council Meeting Minutes. Over the next few months, it will be "Codified" into our digital code found on the City website. Many of you are aware that the State of Iowa issued new rules for ATVs in the middle of 2022 and then handed it off to each county to establish rules within the state parameters. Hardin County then established their rules generally parallel to the State of Iowa. Cities were then instructed to develop the rules for inside the City limits. Here is the summary for the City of Steamboat Rock boiled down in simple terms; follow all traffic rules, stop at stop signs, don't exceed the posted speed limit, don't go down alleys that are not access to your own property, stay off the multi-use trails, keep your noise level down, get your machine registered, and pay attention to the age and driver's license restrictions. And, as often as you can- be kind to the Sheriff's department staff that is tasked with enforcing these rules!

#### **Reminders:**

**City Wide Clean-up Days:** Are scheduled for Saturday June 10<sup>th</sup> and Saturday June 17<sup>th</sup>. 8:00 to 11:00 am each day. The City will provide a roll-off at the City stick dump. This is an excellent opportunity to get rid of that junk that was too big for the garbage truck or just an extra spring-cleaning pile you have created. Fee of \$15 for each appliances to be disposed of, right at the location. That is a pass-through fee to the company that picks up the appliances. This collection of junk excludes TVs and RV refrigerators. There will also be a place to get rid of recyclable metals at these events. If your friends and neighbors did not get the **Friendly Valley Times** by email this month remind them to turn in their email address to srcityhall@heartofiowa.net along with their name – so we know who sent it!

Memorial Day this year is Monday May 29<sup>th</sup>. **Garbage** will not be picked up that day but will be picked up on Tuesday May 30<sup>th</sup>.

Final DNR public meeting for **Steamboat Rock dam** removal tentatively scheduled for July 13, 2023 6:00 pm at the Hardin County Conservation Lodge. Iowa DNR has been approved for a \$1,000,000 Fish Habitat grant to assist in the dam removal, placement of fish habitat structures, and erosion mitigation costs. Fishery Biologists from the US Fish & Wildlife Service plan to be in attendance.

How many you of remember when swimming pools had high diving boards? The Ackley pool had one. And one day, when I went to swimming lessons back when I was 9 or 10, we all had to jump off the high board. My turn came and I climbed the ladder very slowly. I wasn't too fond of heights and still am not. I stepped out even more slowly to the edge of the board and .... I couldn't. I couldn't jump. I can still hear my instructor yelling in a very strict tone, "Why can't you just jump?" But I couldn't. So, I backed down the ladder.

I wasn't old enough to know what "humiliated" meant, but that's what I was. All I knew was I could hear the other kids laughing and I just wanted to go home. If only I could've jumped. Made that decision, made that commitment to just jump.

In Matthew 19, we read the story of the young, rich ruler who comes to Jesus asking questions and seeking wisdom. He was good and faithful, but he realized something was missing. So, he came looking for answers. At times, it's not just the lost who need directions; not just the unbelievers who have questions. The faithful need answers sometimes as well. This passage is about decision making, commitment, and separation from God. It makes us question the things, attitudes, and practices in our lives that keep us from total commitment. It's about ending the separation and just jumping. Like standing on a high diving board, here a rich young man comes to Jesus and stands on the edge of really a huge decision.

Jesus saw what the problem was and said to the young man in Matthew 19:21, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." But the price was too high. With shaky knees, the rich man slowly backed down. He couldn't make that decision, that commitment. He couldn't jump and the Bible says he "went away sad, because he had great wealth."

When money and things take first place in our lives, we're fixing our heart on the world, not God. They can separate us from God. And it's not just money or things. Many things can separate us from God. An attitude. A prejudice. Jealousy, political views, indifference, a hobby, even our theological beliefs; all of these can separate us from God if they take first place in our lives. We're called to fix our heart on God. God will not take second place in our lives.

What's God calling you to jump from? What's holding you back from jumping off that edge? What's calling you back down that ladder saying, "Don't do it. It's scary. It'll hurt." Why can't you just jump?

Friends, know this- in that jump is our salvation. Salvation comes through faith in God through Jesus Christ. Christ will save us. But we've got to jump. That's the jump the rich young man couldn't and a lot of us can't take, giving up everything and following Jesus. Matthew 19 confronts us, it challenges us, and it calls us to stand on the edge, on the edge of the board, with our shaky knees and our closed eyes. It challenges us to just jump. May God bless you this month and always.

# Steamboat Rock Fire Department Memorial Weekend Breakfast

The Steamboat Rock Volunteer Fire and Rescue Association has again set the date for the Memorial Weekend Breakfast. This breakfast will resemble the style of breakfast that

was held for years by the Boat Club committees. It will be held on Saturday, May  $27^{\text{th}}$  at the Boat Club (Iowa River Conversation Club) from 7 – 11 a.m. The menu will be pancakes, French Toast, eggs, sausage, bacon, toast, and drinks.

## This will be a free will donation.

Monies raised this year will be going towards the purchase of three or more SCBA carbon fiber tanks. These tanks are used for breathing while attacking a fire or overhaul of a fire scene. Each tank is right around \$750 a piece. We currently have six but would like to purchase more. Each tank has a shelf life of 15 years and after that they need replacing. We are also looking at the purchase of another five- gas monitor. This machine will also detect explosive gases along with the standard four; O2(Oxygen), H2S (hydrogen sulfide), CO (carbon monoxide), and %LEL. This particular machine will be used in a confined space and this device will lead us to the spot of where there might be a gas leak or CO leak. This device currently is costing around \$2,300. Any support that is given is greatly appreciated.

## **Amos Bannagin**

Our life here was good – my father worked for the Iowa Central Railroad and my mother was loved and respected by many. I'm not sure when things began to go south for me. I think it was about in 1879. I was only 16 years old at that time. I suppose it was when I began to hang around with men who had crooked ways. I also got associated with the saloon business with my father and I seemed to not be able to handle the drink as other men could. One of the men I associated with was William P. Hiserodt, also known as Black Bill.

Black Bill was a leading figure in the counterfeiting ring and other assorted crimes that happened in and around this territory. He had one of those charismatic personalities that I suppose really attracted a sixteen-year-old boy like me at the time. I liked the risk and adventure of the life he led. That choice led me into other decisions that led my life down a spiraling trail.

On New Year's day, January 1, 1884, at the age of 21, I married Black Bill's daughter Elvira Hiserodt. This was a shortlived marriage that ended in separation. I was single and living alone in Belmond, Iowa by 1885. By January, 1885, Enoch Johnson had been ambushed and killed sending Frank and Nate Rainsbarger to prison for thirty years for a crime they did not commit. Newspaper and personal accounts put me at this ambush.

But for myself – the most disastrous night was when Henry Johns was ambushed on April 16, 1885. I was with William Hiserodt that night and was identified as one of the men taking part in that ambush that eventually led to the death of Henry Johns. Hiserodt was so frightened that Johns would turn states evidence against him – against all of us for the crimes we committed. I know that Johns saw me that night – I can still see him looking right at me. It's a terrible thing to live in fear – but it seemed that was to be my life for years to come. In courtroom testimonies it was stated by many that my reputation for truth and veracity was bad.

Finn and Manse Rainsbarger were the scapegoats of this dastardly deed. They were arrested and were shot to death by a lynching mob on June 5<sup>th</sup>. Most reports of the events of that evening have me there as part of it all. Many innocent people had been convinced of the Rainsbargers guilt. My life drove my father to heavy drinking and broke my dear mother's heart.

In December of 1885 I was charged with perjury and burglary. Charges had been brought against me before, but it seemed that no charges against me could ever stick; maybe it was because I knew too much. So much had happened that all of these events led to our entire family to move to Cody, Nebraska around 1885.

My brother Ernest became a jockey. Not surprising since my father, Peter was the owner of some fine racehorses. Following this Ernest became a highly respected farmer in Cherry County, Nebraska. My sister Ella graduated from the college in Ames, now called Iowa State.


After moving to Cody, Nebraska, she became a country school teacher and played the pump organ for country dances and would play until the wee hours of the morning. She was a spiritualist and became a fortune teller and picked up coal along the highway. She married Frank Wink Mogul. She taught at country school and was very talented. My brother William Jerome and his son Dale operated the White Eagle gas station at Cody, Nebraska. My mother was dearly loved by my many in Nebraska and many mourned her passing in 1914, twenty-two years after my father. She ministered to many in their sickness – and her small- framed figure left a huge impact on many.

And as for me –I moved to the Black Hills in 1895. I married my bride Lucy in1897 in Rapid City, South Dakota. She was born in Guide Rock, Nebraska. After working for the Home Stake Mining Company in Lead, South Dakota, we moved to a ranch in Crook County, Wyoming until 1927; During this time, I worked at the Home Stake Mining Company as a timber man. This meant that I installed the timbers in the tunnels of mines. In 1927 we moved to Belle Fourche. Lucy and I had four children: Roy, Troy, J.N, and Letha. I lived out the last 14 years of my life in Belle Fourche. I died December 8<sup>th</sup>, 1940 at the age of 77. Lucy died in 1951.

Many years had passed after that short, but difficult time here in Steamboat Rock.

My wife Lucy and I are buried in Pine Slope Cemetery, in Belle Fourche, South Dakota. We both have unmarked graves. No marker to recall the good years that we had following the chasm of tragedy marked in Steamboat Rock. Not a good beginning to a young man's life. I beg of you tonight – consider well the company that you keep and the choices that you make today – they may well affect the future of your life. Well, I must hurry off now – I still fear that someone may be looking for me...

Pieters moved to approve the minutes of the April 10, 2023 and April 17, 2023 council meeting, seconded by J. Schurman. Motion carried unanimously, Pieters moved, seconded by Blackburn to approve City bills as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

JJ Veld was unable to attend. Mayor Stearns reported that the end loader needs brakes fixed. Dump truck/snow plow needs hydraulics and starter fixed. Discussion about having a couple of local men with a good reputation for mechanical skills do some of this repair work. Agreed that if the repairs went that direction, they should get paid as contractual workers to avoid liability issues.

Mayor Stearns advised on the property at 208 3<sup>rd</sup> St, the IRS has agreed to file a release. Nuisance Reporting- none

Road repairs: short discussion agreeing that concrete and asphalt don't move together in the freeze/ thaw cycle. Jody Stonebraker has a connection with a company that also does asphalt hole patching. Cory or Jon will call him again.

Animal Control Code Ordinance Update. final pending.

Mayor Stearns presented the ATV/UTV Code for the 3rd and final reading. C. Schurman moved to resolve to adopt this new ordinance as Resolution #2023-8. Seconded by Pieters. Roll call vote: J Schurman-Aye, Pieters- Aye, Blackburn- Nay, Mull- Aye, C. Schurman- Aye. Motion to make resolution passed in a four Aye, one Nay vote.

Mayor Stearns discussed City insurance. The council requested that a representative from the Agency attend the June 12,2023 City Council meeting to explain how we are covered.

Mayor Stearns reported on the periodic state Audit that is in process. State staff is collecting data and at some point will work directly in the City Hall.

Mayor Stearns reported on the ditch clean-up held April 22, 2023. Twelve folks helped with the project and collected two pick-up loads heaped up with garbage bags. Completed about 11:30. Thank you to all who helped.

Mayor Stearns reminded Council of the Spring Clean-up Days scheduled for June 10<sup>th</sup> and June 17<sup>th</sup>. Mayor Stearns confirmed with the Steel and appliance collection company and the roll-off company for these dates. Council members will help unload at the stick dump and other volunteers would be welcome to help.

Mayor Stearns presented a request from Hardin County Solid Waste for a board member and alternate. C. Schurman agreed to continue as the representative and Blackburn will continue as the alternate.

Mayor Stearns requested input on where and how to advertise for a new City Clerk. Suggestion to post at churches and Rock Stop. Also place ad in Eldora paper again and in the County wide advertiser. Mayor Stearns presented a request to choose an engineering firm for the west side sewer project, City Attorney Niederhoff suggested we need to get three proposals prior to choosing an engineering firm. Two are in hand and a third will be acquired. A special council meeting may be held once the third is acquired.

Mayor Stearns presented a request from Rock Stop to renew their license to sell cigarettes. Pieters moved to approve, J. Schurman seconded. Motion carried. C. Schurman abstained due to possible conflict of interest.

Mayor Stearns brought up discussion about The Friendly Valley Times being presented to the residents by email only, due to cost savings to the City and the Visionary Group. Further discussion about using email to send out City Bills and that all of the council members will begin to get their FVT and City Bills in that manner. In a joint effort between the Visionary Group and the City, a postcard will be sent out requesting submission of email addresses. A hard copy of the Friendly Valley Times will be available at the Library for those who do not have email.

C. Schurman moved to go to closed session to discuss real estate, pending legal, employment issues. Pieters seconded. Motion carried unanimously. The room was cleared of visitors.

Mayor Stearns reopened the public meeting at 8:29 pm.

C. Schurman moved to adjourn the meeting, Mull seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 8:32 pm.
