

# from the Mayor

#### Winter:

Winter is likely to come again this year. The Farmer's Almanac has called for a longer, colder, and snowy one for this upcoming winter. Just a reminder to check out your own gear before it becomes immediately necessary to be functional: windshield wipers, ice scrapers, shovels, will your snow blower start? How about that car battery that has been a little fussy? In my personal experience, it is a lot easier to change a car battery out at 50+ degrees as opposed to -20 degrees.

Now is also a good time to put stuff away that when froze down is hard to get loose. Remember to disconnect your garden hoses and drain them.

Remember that your City will mechanically remove snow of greater than 2" off the streets. To make that job more efficient, please remember to move your stuff off the street.

#### **Grant Applications:**

Our small community, like most in rural America, is thin on financial ability to do projects. Therefore, we make an effort to apply for grants to do all or part of most projects we need to accomplish. For each grant applied for, we try to assess the amount of effort it will take to accomplish the myriad of boxes to check, and questions to answer, the extra costs of engineering, the extra costs of landscape architecture, the extra costs of environmental and archeological studies, and hours of administrative time, compared to the amount and percent of the grant for the project and the value it is to the City. In many cases the grant application takes so long to be approved that the project cost estimate is no longer even close- that needs to be factored in also. Following is a short synopsis of the grants we are in the middle of right now:

- 1) New sewer lift station standby generator: FEMA Hazard mitigation grant. Existing unit is 50+ years old and replacement parts are becoming unavailable. New one needs to be elevated above the 500-year flood plain. Preliminary cost estimate is \$50,000. Estimate grant will cover 85%.
- 2) Sewer line on west side of river. Several homes are currently un-served on that side of the river and a new large customer would be the County campground and Lodge. Application has been made for a USDA Rural development grant for 75% of the project. The City sanitary sewer fund would put some \$ in and the County has suggested they would loan the City some money at favorable terms because it is very important to them for the campground and Lodge to be able to use it. Preliminary project cost estimates are in the mid \$500,000 range.
- 3) Standby generator for the City wells. Presently there is no direct connection of a generator to the wells. City has been approved for an Iowa Innovation Grant for the purchase of the generator itself. The generator has been on order for months, and hopefully will arrive any day now. The grant covers 100% of the generator, but all the switches, concrete pad, and electrical connections qualify to come out of the American Recovery Plan money already received and earmarked for this project. The whole project is \$20-25,000.
- 4) Storm water diversion project at the northeast corner of East Market St and 1<sup>st</sup> Street. Have been calling dirt contractors for a couple of years to come work on this project. The project qualifies to be funded 100% by the American Rescue Plan money already received.
- 5) Keep Iowa Beautiful grant from Diamond Vogel. Simple application and we have received \$250 worth of paint to do the floor in the north entrance to the old school gym. The paint is on hand and ready to be applied.
- 6) Brownfield Grant in the amount of \$10,000 to do a hazardous substance (read asbestos) study of the old schoolhouse. This is a 100% reimbursement grant to hire Impact 7G to begin the study next Tuesday.
- 7) New Gym lights. This is a rebate program through Alliant Energy. New LED lights are ordered and should be installed in the next 60 days or so. These lights are not inexpensive but will be a huge upgrade to the gym lighting. Significant rebate from Alliant and the energy savings will pay for the cost after rebate, in about 2 years.

Enjoy the beautiful fall in Iowa as much as you possibly can!

I KNOW THAT VOICE! And now you know... the. Rest. Of. The story.

If you're like me, in just reading those lines, you can hear the distinctive, one and only voice of the late, great Paul Harvey.

There are certain voices that we've heard in our lives that we can immediately recognize, right? Of course, there's family and friends, but I mean famous, well-known voices that are so unique, they can only belong

to one person. A few that come to mind for me are the afore-mentioned Mr. Harvey, Howard Cosell, John Wayne, Casey Kasem and Vin Scully. Whose golden-throated tones do you immediately recognize?

How about the voice of God? I mean, God does speak to us, doesn't He?

Oh yes, God does speak to us. We are assured of that many times in the Bible. In one instance, Jesus says in John 10:27 in the NASB, "My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me."

One would think that should God speak; it would be instantly recognized by all of us. Unfortunately, I don't believe that's always the case.

Has the Holy Spirit provided supernatural signs or indicators that it is from him?"

I also believe that our faith helps us determine when God speaks to us. John 8:47 in the NLT says, "Anyone who belongs to God listens gladly to the words of God. But you don't listen because you don't belong to God."

Faith and hearing God go hand in hand. When we have faith, we are more likely open to hearing God. In fact, we tend to welcome it. Hearing God then reinforces our faith even more. It's a cycle that only makes us stronger.

Last month, I started reprinting an article about our town of Steamboat Rock. The following is a continuation of that article. Hope you enjoy!

#### Saturday Night in Steamboat Rock

One of the two town pumps was located on the corner of the Chevy garage. Across the street was the barber shop. Otto Filbrant was the town's barber for many years. He was followed by Merle Sherbun, Claude Heard, and George Hemmen. The building which currently houses the library was the office of the Central Iowa Telephone Company. Hattie Tholen, Betty VanDornam, and Emma Williams were operators.

Heading east, the next building was Ruppelt's Meat Market. Dr. J.Willard Caldwell's office was next door. Eiler's Store was on the corner where the second town pump was located.

Across the intersection was the Farmers Savings Bank. In 1909, J.A. Holmes went to work for D.W. Turner's Farmers Exchange Bank in that building. The Turner family owned the bank for many years. Harry Turner followed his father as bank president until he was killed in an automobile accident. His sister Nellie then became president, a pioneer as a woman in that position. Elda Christians was cashier, followed by Holmes, and Ben Jaspers. Beatrice Cramer, Frances Gast, Alvin Jaspers, Doris Ruppelt, Anna Doolaard, and Bernice Heard worked at the bank. Later the Ruppelt family secured the majority interest in the business.

The next building east was the old Potgeter Lumber Yard office. Henry Schwitters managed this business for a number of years. After the lumber yard was moved to the elevator site, the house became the home of Albert Kruse. Frank and Barbara (Bobby) Fredericksen lived in the vine covered home next door...The back side of the house was made into an apartment which was occupied by a family Card and later Sharp Hathaway. The Presbyterian/Congregational/Presbyterian church was on the corner.

Some businesses located off Market Street included a restaurant south of the DX station. It was called Wally's Wagon when it was operated by Wally Heffelmeir...Later Ed Frerichs operated it. The post office later moved to this area and the old blacksmith's shop rounded out the businesses in this area. It was later used as an industrial arts shop by the school, and it also served as a restaurant for a time.

Sam Volk ran a repair shop on the intersection of Highway 118 and Main Street. Later Ray Diamond opened his shop there and sold Dino gasoline as well.

Joe Cervetti ran a successful construction business for a number of years. One of his specialties was building churches. He also made violons as a hobby. Other carpenters were John Gast, Harry Folkerts, and Bill Eckel.

The Potgeter Elevator was a family institution for much of Steamboat Rock's history. George was an avid reader and was pretty much self-educated. He appeared before a Congressional Committee advocating private enterprise rather than cooperatives. Local folks looked forward to the "Yellow Sheet" which Potgeter printed weekly.

Leonard DeVries and George Harms operated hatcheries and Charles and Orville Asher did electrical work.

Some of the old phone numbers might be familiar to a few.

The Steamboat Rock City Council met in regular session October 10th, 2022, 6:30 p.m. in the City Council chambers and available via zoom. Present were Mayor Stearns and the following council members: Adam Blackburn, Dave Mull, Kevin Pieters, Jon Schurman. Absent: Cory Schurman. Also present were Melissa Johanson, Scott Williams, JD Holmes, and Renee Oltrogge.

Mayor Stearns called the meeting to order. Pieters moved, seconded by Mull to approve the posted agenda. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: C. Schurman.

Blackburn moved, seconded by J. Schurman to approve the minutes from September 19th, 2022. Motion carried unanimously, Absent: C. Schurman. Pieters moved, seconded by Mull the motion to approve City bills as presented. Motion carried unanimously, Absent: C. Schurman. Hours were presented for Renee Oltrogge, City Clerk and Kelly Haskin, Water/Sewer Supervisor. Pieters moved, J. Schurman seconded the motion to approve hours as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: C. Schurman.

Public comments: Mayor Stearns advised we have 9 Oak trees growing by the solar panels of all sizes with eight of quality to move to another location in town. A local individual recently purchased a tree spade for commercial use and we will ask him the cost. Veld would like a few planted at the river landing to replace the Ash trees that have died. Bob Hutchcroft would like some in the school yard. The library had one of the new ones just planted that did not take. Melissa will discuss it with the board. Mayor Stearns and Bob Hutchcroft will take a tour this week to see if we want them anywhere else.

Melissa Johanson, Librarian presented the library report. The new shelving was installed thanks to James Ogden and Jack Boelman. The new front door is installed. Sign is fixed and re-hung thanks to Mayor Stearns. Working on adult programming for the 14<sup>th</sup>. Making event plans to coincide with the tree lighting.

Fire Department report was presented by Fire Chief Scott Williams. Recent successful grain bin rescue. Uniforms are starting to come in and will need assistance disseminating the billing with Renee. Plan to help with the County Conservation Fall Event at the Lodge October 15<sup>th</sup>. Discussing activities to coincide with the tree lighting. Updated by-laws have been passed. Department has a large hand-held concrete saw, a skill saw, and a small gasoline generator they no longer use and plan to sell. Mayor Stearns advised since the money will stay in the department for equipment, they should sell as their association sees fit. Williams asked about replacing a few broken windows now, and then finding a grant for new siding. Presented PO's 82 for Sandry \$1,1528.00. Blackburn moved, seconded by Mull to approve the PO's as presented. Motion carried unanimously, Absent: C. Schurman. Pieters was called away at 6:52pm.

JJ Veld was not present to provide the public works report. Oltrogge advised Veld has help lined up for a short time in November while he is out of town. Thanks to Veld for putting down rock on Main St & 7<sup>th</sup> and fixing the manhole on 2<sup>nd</sup> St. Mull advised there is a manhole at Market St and 3<sup>rd</sup> St that needs addressing.

Nuisance Reporting sheets were reviewed then shredded.



J. Schurman reported on street repairs activity. Everything has been measured to get quotes.

Siren may need to be moved due to a potential change in ownership of the land it is presently located on. If required to be relocated, the tower, and electrical cost estimate is \$5,500. Mayor Stearns has discussed with Tom Creighton (Hardin County EMA/911) about this potential move. The County is considering changing the way all of the sirens in the County are funded and Steamboat Rock should wait for that decision prior to any agreement. City Attorney has been contacted about any possible existing easements.

Halloween beggars night date to be Monday, October 31st, 2022 from 5pm - 7pm.

Mayor Stearns discussed The Visionary Group Tree Lighting, fundraiser, and request for street closure the evening of 11/23/2022. A company has been contacted that would remove the old lights, install new lights, and provide a 6 year warranty for \$6250. Blackburn moved, seconded by Mull to approve the street closure as requested for half a block on Market St by the tree. Motion carried unanimously, Absent: C. Schurman, Pieters. The Visionary Group is asking for donations to assist this project.

Making the 4-way stop intersection at the end of the River's Edge Trail and adjacent to the Rockstop safe for pedestrian and bike traffic was discussed. Anticipation of many bikers patronizing the Rockstop leads this discussion. Much of the vehicle traffic doesn't come to a full stop at this intersection. Mayor Stearns discussed with County Engineer, Taylor Roll different ideas of signs, flashing yellow lights, or rumble stripsall of which have limited success per Roll. Mayor Stearns asked everyone to think about other ideas. Blackburn suggested a pedestrian walk.

Blackburn asked if the city should consider creating zoning codes. Specifically discussed Market St being coded commercial since we are experiencing more folks planning residential in the "downtown" area which may leave the City short on locations for businesses to locate there.

Mayor's comments: Welcome sign on the south side has received damaged and more lighting will be replaced.

"Engineering the Future Economy of Hardin County". Since Tam Elerding, HCCEF Program Director was unable to attend. Mayor Stearns presented a second flyer for this event on November 8<sup>th</sup> – 10<sup>th</sup>, 2022 in Eldora, IA. The purpose of these meetings is for our Communities/ County to put a plan in place focused on making the economy grow faster than the population.

Blackburn moved to adjourn the meeting, Mull seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.
