
"We must keep on our work-clothes, for our life is not done - but your clothes are for holiday, because your tasks are over," said the branches.

HAPPY 167th BIRTHDAY STEAMBOAT ROCK, IOWA!

Steamboat Rock was <u>platted</u> in 1855.^[3] It was named from a large rock on the river bluff which is said to resemble a queue of steamboats from a distance.^[4]

Steamboat Rock is located at 42°24′27″N 93°3′59″W (42.407607, -93.066276).[5]

According to the United States Census Bureau, the city has a total area of 0.55 square miles (1.42 km²), all land.^[6]

Steamboat Rock is located on the <u>lowa River</u>, at a point where the river marks the east edge of the Altmont Moraine, the <u>glacial moraine</u> that marks the east border of the <u>Des Moines Lobe</u> of the <u>Wisconsin Glaciation</u>. The river valley here is a deep gorge through the <u>sandstone</u> bedrock underlying the moraine. Unlike most of Iowa, where prairie dominated, this area was historically woodland.^[7]

Steamboat Rock is a major producer of <u>corn</u> (for <u>ethanol fuel</u>) and producer of <u>ethanol</u>, which is made from corn. The city was covered on a segment of the <u>60 Minutes</u> television news program on May 7, 2006, in regard to its production of ethanol. The long dormant railroad line through the town was reactivated in 2007 with the establishment of the <u>lowa</u> <u>River Railroad</u> - a rail line that primarily serves the ethanol industry.

AGWSR Community School District operates area public schools.^[12] The district formed on July 1, 2001, with the merger of the Wellsburg-Steamboat Rock Community School District and the Ackley–Geneva Community School District. The former was established on July 1, 1992, by the merger of the Steamboat Rock and Wellsburg school districts.^[13]

from the Mayor

River's Edge Trail:

Recently my wife and I traveled to Jackson Hole, Wyoming at the base of the gorgeous Teton Mountains. Had been 22 years since the last time we were there and to my surprise and delight, there are now 270+ miles of multi-use trails in Jackson Hole and all through Grand Teton National Park. Had both my road bike and mountain bike along and had time to ride about ninety miles of those trails. Everywhere I travel in Iowa and other states, people and communities are excited about their multi-use trails

In 2017 the Iowa DOT published "Iowa in Motion 2045". Section 4.2 details the importance of biking and walking to Iowa's economy, fitness, tourism, and the environment. This document was mainstreamed to include the DOT, DNR, Counties, and Cites throughout the state to promote safe biking and walking wherever feasible. In the Iowa DNR five-year plan published for 2013-2018 "outdoor recreation in Iowa ", called for an expansion of the state trail system.

There have been multiple case studies about the positive economic impact trails have on a community. In a 2011 study completed by the Iowa Bicycle Coalition in cooperation with the Sustainable Tourism and Environmental Program at UNI, showed a \$364.8mm annual trails impact for Iowa, or about \$1,000,000/day spent on cycling. A 1992 study completed on the Iowa Heritage Trail showed at that time, users spent \$4-11/ day on stuff along the trail or bicycle related items. A West Virginia study on their 2,000 miles of trails showed an \$107,000,000 annual economic benefit to the state. A Maryland study conducted, showed a \$7.51 /user/day economic benefit to the state. The most successful economic impacts are felt when a community embraces the multi-use trail through community leaders and private enterprise participation in goods and services provided to the trail users.

Today here in Iowa we have about 2,000 miles of MUT (multi-use trails). Since 2012, the definition of multi-use trails (MUT) here in Iowa is a 10' wide path designated for bicycles and pedestrian use. This definition was used repeatedly in the DOT, DNR, and Iowa Natural Heritage websites.

After searching multiple websites and placing multiple phone calls, the truth came out about where the money comes from to fund MUTs in Iowa. 80% of the funding comes from: Federal Recreational Trails programs, Iowa Trails (sales tax driven), State Recreation Program (state legislator sets aside \$1-5mm annually for entire state), and a Region 6 Pool (federal pool of money targeted specifically toward trails). A phone call to the Iowa Bicycle Coalition confirmed that the Iowa road fuel tax you all pay at the pump is prohibited by constitution from being used for MUTs. A phone call to the Iowa DNR in Des Moines confirmed that no money "never/ ever" from hunting and fishing licenses is used for MUTs in Iowa.

The remaining 20% comes from grants and private donations including the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation who has participated in about 850 miles of MUTs.

Per Chris Wieting, River's Edge Trail group, the five miles of multi-use trail between Steamboat Rock and Eldora cost about \$3,000,000 to complete including all the bridges. A number of folks have suggested to me that the money could have been used for road or bridge repair in Iowa. Per my research, which is not a factual statement, because the money would have gone towards the very competitive MUT funding construction somewhere else in Iowa, if not here.

Here in Steamboat Rock, we are blessed to have the expanding River's Edge Trail begin in our back yard. Many of you know it was extended from Steamboat Rock to Eldora this summer and the actual ribbon cutting is planned for October 1st. For those of you who have not had the opportunity to experience this beautiful part of our community, take the time to bike or wander down the trail. As the weather begins to get a little cooler and the leaves begin to turn colors would be an excellent time to take to the trail.

Your opportunity to participate in the celebration could be by attending a free will donation breakfast at the Schuller's outdoor venue on the west side of the Iowa River, Saturday, October 1st. The donations will be used for further trail development and ongoing trail maintenance.

See you on the trail!

Steamboat Rock Fire Department

The first weekend in September (for me) marks the end to the summer even though summer technically is not over. Some leaves begin to change, you see the crops showing signs of changing.

Super Nationals in Boone, IA is the exclamation point to a summer filled with racing, and Fireman's Convention, being held in Iowa Falls this year and next, is a time for all departments to come together to meet up with friends, days of competition, and the annual meeting.

Last minute yard work is getting done before the first frost. Leaves are beginning to fall. Some may burn your leaves and grass clipping coming this fall. Remember to call in even the smallest burn to Hardin County. It doesn't take much wind to spread something small, so when burning leaves, stay fire safe.

If you are attempting to burn branches or other items that are considered legal to burn, remember there is a stipulation on the size of the pile you are burning. Your pile CANNOT be any larger than four feet wide, four feet in length, and not over four feet high. This 4x4x4 method is for residents wanting to burn within city limits. Always be considerate of your neighbors by letting them know you will be burning. You MUST make a phone call to the Hardin County Sheriffs Dept. and notify them of your location of your burn.

On Labor Day weekend, SRFD collected for MDA and graciously collect \$1,200. This marked the 15th year we have collected money and every year the final tally is surprising. I would like to thank all those that stopped to give and just visit. We appreciate your generosity and support for MDA.

I would like to thank all those that donate their cans. SRFD will continue collecting cans but the drop off area will be changing. We will be moving the drop off area to fire station. Please be looking for a three-sided area where you may leave your bags. Please do not dump out the bags. You may still leave bottles, but they need to be in a bag or original carrier.

It is also a good time to consider buying a new filter for your furnace. We could go from AC to heat in a matter of a day - this is Iowa.

Last but not least – this month holds the big in-stat rival between the Iowa Hawkeyes (Go Hawks) and the Iowa State Cyclones football teams. Enjoy your get togethers but please be responsible.



The groups' name is an amalgam of the members' first letters of their first names. The group is one of 4 groups from Sweden to ever hit number one on the U.S. Billboard Hot 100.

With all that, is it any wonder ABBA is in the Bible?

quartet. Abba in the Bible is a designation given by Jesus to God. It appears three times, all in the New Testament, in <u>Mark</u> <u>14:36</u>, <u>Romans 8:15-16</u> and <u>Galatians 4:6</u>. Scholars can find no reference to God as "Abba" before the appearance of Christ. It is an Aramaic term meaning, "father." Abba actually is a more intimate word than "father," perhaps more like a small child calling their father, "daddy".

If you look up all three of the references I've listed earlier, you'll find that in each, the word "Abba" is followed with the word "Father." If you're like me, you're asking, "Why is that, if they mean the same?" According to the website, learnthebible.org, it's because "the New Testament writers are careful to avoid too great a familiarity in addressing God. Instead of translating Abba, they transliterate it, so that it takes on special significance in reference to God. Then, Abba is used in conjunction with the word Father – "Abba, Father." Father is the translation of Abba, but by putting the two together, the address to God is both personalized and kept in the proper tone of respect. The double title has both intimacy and dignity."

Through Christ, we are adopted as sons and daughters of God when we accept Jesus as our Lord and Savior. We would do well, then, when we address God as our Father to also include "Abba," expressing not only our respect, but our love. A deeper love than most. A love like for, perhaps, a Father.

Last month, I started reprinting an article about our town of Steamboat Rock. The following is a continuation of that article. Hope you enjoy!

Saturday Night in Steamboat Rock

Market Street has changed considerably over the past 60 years. In the block south of the school, Ray Karsjens operated the Standard Oil station. One pump was a gravity flow unit. It featured a glass globe marked with the number of gallons. A lever on the side allowed Ray to pump the number of gallons the customer wanted. One pump featured regular and the other ethyl. West of the station was the little icehouse where blocks of ice were separated with saw dust. Electric refrigerators doomed the ice business. Ray never removed the snow from his driveway saying that the guy who put it there could remove it. Karsjens also did a great imitation of Winston Churchill...He later served as mayor and town marshal. The gas station later became a DX station and was operated by Al Boll and Earl Stupp.

The creamery was located west of the gas station. Eventually it became a cheese factory. Harry Blosch was the main operator and Otto Jensen, and Jim Harris were cheese makers. A man named Harms later managed the business. Enno Harms, among others, picked up milk from the farmers to deliver to the cheese factory. The milk cans were unloaded on a roller system located on the east side of the building The cheese factory office was once a small café operated by Esther Kruse.

The next building was the drug store, and the post office was connected to it on the west. These two buildings, built after the big fire, eventually became the Green Door. The post office was converted to the offices of Drs., Temple, and Bremner. It also housed Burn' Grocery after the former Ruppelt Market burned.

Leo and Ivadell Knight built and operated a locker plant west of the post office. Leo did the butchering and was helped by Unc MacDonald and Frank Dedrick.

The City Hotel was the last structure on this block. Ubbe and Gustie Peters ran it for many years. Along with food and beer, you could rent a room quite reasonably. There was a pin ball machine on the west wall and there was a sign that said, "our pie is so good that we eat it ourselves." Lloyd Condon operated the hotel before Peters and John Kline operated it after the Peters moved on.

Across the street west was the Cramer Implement building which was used as a storage area for the Luiken Hardware next door. Along with brothers Tony, Harry, and Carl Luiken, their uncle Jake Cramer worked there. Besides the typical range of hardware, Luikens handled appliances, televisions, and Minnesota paint which came out of the spigot as the Chi-Namel paint handled at the drug store. The next-door west was what was left of the Ruppelt-Cramer tin shop. West of the tin shop was Johnson' Store. Across the alley to the west was a little tavern-café operated by Ubbe and Gustie Peters. Gustie made great hamburgers in an iron skillet. When Ubbe retired the business was sold and operated by Sonny and Margery Sharpshair. Next door was the city hall and jail. The main part of the building was divided by a spoked railing and the fire bell was toward the rear of the building. When the new city hall was built, the jail was moved to the home eventually occupied by Rex Heard near the boat club. It served as a garage. The building west of the city hall served as Harold Luiken's appliance and TV shop. Next door was the Luiken Chevrolet garage. One unusual feature was the storage of the town fire truck. Kids used to enjoy playing on this vehicle and especially making the siren blow. This unit was a "one of a kind." It was a 1928 Pontiac custom made from an automobile. It carried the chemical tanks that were once mounted on the carts stored at the old schoolhouse plus a supply of $2 \frac{1}{2}$ " hose. For fires in town the hose was attached to a hydrant and since the water tower was located high on a hill, there was plenty of pressure for the hose. Often the tires would have to be inflated before leaving the garage because they were old and tended to leak. New tires of the correct size were unavailable.

Additional Comments on the Above Article

- 1. There is more to this article that will be included in the next issue. .
- 2. At the museum we have a "Wagner Sausage Stuffer #2" that was first patented in 1859. This item was donated by the Knight family.
- 3. As a child, I rode the route with my dad to pick up milk and take it to the cheese factory. And I so remember falling off the roller system on the east side.
- 4. Also, as a child, I can remember going into Ubbe's and Sonny's with my dad.
- 5. At our museum, we have a barred window from the old jail.
- 6. And I seem to remember going into what was one time the City Hotel for a community event. (Long time ago)

Hopefully, this article brings up a few memories of your own as you remember your time living in Steamboat Rock.

The Steamboat Rock City Council met in regular session September 19th, 2022, 6:30 p.m. in the City Council chambers and available via zoom. Present were Mayor Stearns and the following council members: Adam Blackburn, Dave Mull, Kevin Pieters, Jon Schurman, and Cory Schurman via zoom due to traveling for work. Absent: no one. Also present were JD Holmes, Scott Williams came at 6:50pm, JJ Veld, and Renee Oltrogge.

Mayor Stearns called the meeting to order. Pieters moved, seconded by J. Schurman to approve the posted agenda. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one.

Blackburn moved, seconded by Mull to approve the minutes from August 15th, 2022. Motion carried unanimously, Absent: no one. Pieters moved, seconded by C. Schurman the motion to approve City bills as presented. Motion carried unanimously, Absent: no one. Hours were presented for Renee Oltrogge, City Clerk and Kelly Haskin, Water/Sewer Supervisor. Pieters moved, Blackburn seconded the motion to approve hours as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one.

Public comments: Mayor Stearns presented building permits for 106 E Main St. J. Schurman moved to approve as presented the permit seconded by C. Schurman. Motion carried unanimously, Absent: no one.

Tornado Siren may need to be moved due to a potential change in ownership of the land it is presently located on. If relocated, the tower, and electrical costs are unknown at this time. All council advised they can hear the siren from its current location at their homes. Mayor Stearns will discuss with Tom Creighton (Hardin County EMA/911) about any Iowa Code location parameters and with the City Attorney about any possible existing easements.

Mayor Stearns presented a flyer for "The Engineering the Future Economy of Hardin County" since Tam Elerding, HCCEF Program Director was unable to attend.

Melissa Johanson, Librarian was not available to present the library report, it was presented by Mayor Stearns. The shelving was delivered. Summer reading was great and ended really well.
