Welcome to Summer- all of a sudden! This week our intentional (planted) and unintentional (dandelions+) flowers really popped. After all spring can be a really colorful time. You can hear mowers running all over town and this time of year it is hard to keep up. Keeping ahead of the growth also makes it easier to avoid windrows on your lawn. When mowing my own yard last Thursday, it occurred to me that using a new or freshly sharpened blade really does make a difference in mowing efficiency. With the current fuel prices mowing could get expensive without proper mower maintenance.

Old school Gym: At last Monday's City Council meeting we approved spending some money to upgrade the lights in the gym to LED. Currently three of the light fixtures are bad and would cost about \$250 each to fix. New fixtures installed are about \$430 for each of 12 fixtures. City will apply for the \$130/fixture rebate from

Alliant. The net cost after rebate will be about \$3,600. You all use LED lights in your homes to save energy, the estimate is the energy savings will pay for the new lights in 1-2 years with the recent increase in usage of the gym.

Had a rain date of Saturday May 7th for the S-56 ditch clean-up. *Thank you* to all those who helped. Had an entire pick-up load of bags to the top of the cab again this year- wow, after just one year! As we were collecting the litter, we all kept asking "Who does this?" About 50% Aluminum cans, about 20% plastic bottles of all kinds, 15% plastic sandwich boxes, and 15% miscellaneous other. This morning on my bike route in another area seeing all the litter, it struck me that Hollywood does a serious dis-service in their movies and TV series when in many scenes you watch- someone is littering. Please respect our land and waterways and don't litter.

City Wide clean-up Days Reminder: Saturdays June 11 and June 25, 2022, at the City stick dump just north of the Fire Station. Appliances will also be accepted at a pass-through cost of \$15/appliance. Designated spot available to place your clean recyclable iron and metal including aluminum, stainless steel, and all kinds of other scrap iron immediately south of the compost bins.

Hazardous Waste disposal Reminder: Saturday July 9th, 2022, between the Post office and the old School Gym. 9-11 AM. Sponsored by Hardin County Solid Waste and Metro Waste Authority.

Iowa River dam here in Steamboat Rock: Many of you are aware the Iowa DNR is in process of preparing to remove the low-head dam here in Steamboat Rock. As a paddler, I am very encouraged that the dam will be coming out. However this discussion is not about + or- of the project. Many people have asked me when this will happen because they want to WATCH. Here is what I have been told by the DNR about the process: There is 8 feet of vertical fall in the dam. They will lower the dam in 2-foot increments with a bottom scouring rain event before they do the next two feet. This may not be a quick process. As the information comes to me, I will do my best to let you all know about the timing and where we (including me) can safely watch.



And for any of you graduates of SRHS who played baseball or softball, I am sure you have some memories, both good and some not so good of your times playing ball there. But just how did it get there? THOSE BUMPS WERE ROYAL INDEED

As one reaches the late fall or early winter of his earthly existence, reminiscences from the greenness of spring and summer inundate the memory.

It must have been the fall of 1953 when students at Steamboat Rock High School spent several days picking up rocks at what became the baseball diamond at the northwest corner of town. This transformed the former gravel or sand pit and replaced the diamond on the south side of the school building.

One unfortunate result of the new and improved facility was the destruction of the pit and the royal bumps. Many days were spent at the pit playing cops and robbers and cowboys and Indians on the various trails probably left there by cattle.

Often the weapons used were sticks which were shaped like guns. Improvisation and creativeness were necessary for youth in those items.

The Five and Dime located west of the courthouse in Eldora sported the neatest most authentic 45 caliber cap pistol imaginable... I must admit that I coveted that wonderful toy... Reminded of the excessive cost of that make-believe weapon, I was surprised when in late August, I received it as a birthday gift...

When I arrived at the pit with my prized gift, my good side-kick Frankie Cervetti wouldn't play unless he could use my gun so on that first day, I was again relegated to using the weapon that mother nature provided.

Many of life's lessons were experienced at the huge rock which at various occasions served as a bank, jail, or sheriff's office. What wonderful tales could be related if that old pit could talk...One story involves Ross Ellison on his first night as marshal. It was Halloween and he was supposed to work along-side of his predecessor Ace Robinson who was due to retire...Ross lived a block east of the pit on Madison Street. As he started his walk-up town to start patrol, he lobbed a stick of dynamite down in the pit...As you can imagine, it made quite a bang which reverberated up and down the Iowa River valley. Ace came on the run and asked Ross if he saw the guy who set off that big firecracker. "I didn't hear anything", was Ross' reply.

On the west wall of the bowl-shaped pit was the location of the royal bumps. Every winter's first snow fall brought flocks of girls and boys to the bumps. The name royal bumps came from two depressions on the hill. Mind you, there was nothing particularly royal about this area, but I can attest to the effectiveness of the bumps. One soon learned that you needed to lie down on your sled and hang on for dear life. If you sat on your sled, chances were great that you would fly into the air at the first "bump". On a good day you could reach the river on your sled.

Another winter treat was slipping or sliding on the ice above the dam. Some old tires were obtained from DX station and a big black smoky fire was built on the river. Snow was cleared for ice skating or for those of us who chose to run and slide with our shoes. Butch Wickham would bring his Jeep and we would take rides up the river to do a little sliding with his vehicle.

Can you imagine how the DNR would react to burning tires anywhere, especially on the river? In spite of this possible pollution, there was an abundance of game fish below the dam when the ice receded, and the water was clear.

Today's young folks are barraged with a plethora of planned activities whether it be wrestling, soccer, basketball, football, or dance. Some of these activities begin before children start school...Perhaps it is a vicarious experience for parents or perhaps this gives them the opportunity to demonstrate their coaching expertise. Either way it is too bad that youngsters can no longer find fun on their own initiative.

Do they still play kick the can, marbles, or barbaree?

The Steamboat Rock City Council met in regular session May 9th, 2022, 6:30 p.m. in the City Council chambers and available via zoom. Present were Mayor Stearns and the following council members: Adam Blackburn, Jackie Hagberg, Kevin Pieters, Cory Schurman, and Jon Schurman absent: no one. Also present were Perry Gjersvik, Carol Williams, and Renee Oltrogge. Scott Williams, JJ Veld, and Craig Babcock came late.

Mayor Stearns called the meeting to order. C. Schurman moved, seconded by Pieters to approve the posted agenda. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one.

Pieters moved, seconded by Blackburn to approve the minutes from April 11th, 2022. Motion carried unanimously, absent no one. Blackburn moved, seconded by Hagberg the motion to approve City bills as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one. Hours were presented for Renee Oltrogge, City Clerk and Kelly Haskin, Water/Sewer Supervisor. C. Schurman moved, Blackburn seconded the motion to approve hours as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one.

Public comments: Robert Nazario for Iowa House District 54 introduced himself as he lives in rural Iowa Falls and described his history. He is a delegate for Hardin County Republican Central Committee.

Clerk Oltrogge requested to mention our new bank, Green Belt Bank & Trust has made available autopay for City utility bills. The form will be the last page in your Friendly Valley Times this month. Garbage services the week of Memorial Day will be on Tuesday. The Cemetery is having a Memorial Day Service at 11 am. There are signs up for The Michael Pittman Memorial Race on May 28th at The Independence Motor Speedway.

Melissa Johanson, Librarian was not present for the library report. Mayor Stearns presented POs requested #20220501 \$147.02 Baker and Taylor for books, #20220502 \$75.00 Shield Pest Control, #20220503 \$55.00 Times Citizen for yearly subscription, #20020504 \$350.00 Absolute Science for butterfly tents, #20020505 \$350.00 Mikayla Oz for a magic show, #20020506\$207.44 Blank Park Zoo for offsite program. Hagberg moved, J. Schurman seconded the motion to approve the POs as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one.

Scott Williams, Fire Chief presented the Fire Department report. April was a busy month with 7-8 calls. Hosting a free will donation breakfast on Saturday, May 28th, 2022, from 7-11 a.m. at The Lodge (The Boat Club) with a raffle. Mailings will go out to the residence of Steamboat Rock and Clay township. Harrison and Justin have completed FF1-passed the written exam and still have the hands on to complete. Truck #653 (Grass Rig) needs new tires as the current ones are old, underrated, and weather checking. PO#82 \$936.90 for tires. C. Schurman moved, Blackburn seconded the motion to approve the PO as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one. Williams asked to have a fleet card to pay for fuel during off hours to fill after an incident and before they would get called for another one. Much discussion and it was left to Scott's discretion. Williams asked about hooking up an existing City generator to the Fire Station/ Municipal shed to be able to open the overhead doors when the power is off. Williams mentioned there is scrap steel at the station for the cleanup days.

JJ Veld presented the report from public works. City was reprimanded by the DNR from an incident one-week last July when the discharge nitrates levels exceeded the standard limits due to something in the sewer that killed the good bugs in the system. There hasn't been one since. By 2024 EPA wants a lead pipe survey of all of the water lines in the town recorded to include what goes from the city lines to the pipes going into homes. This report will need to include every property in town. If you don't know what type of pipe you have for the survey, someone from the city may need to look at your incoming water line before the meter. In some cases, digging may be needed and/or a water sample inside your property may be needed. More information as your city learns more about this survey. Veld advised there may be a good alternative scrap iron company for our City-wide clean-ups for future years.

Mayor Stearns advised on distressed properties; 101 E Main- no new information. 208 3rd St- Roll off has been delivered. Volunteers welcome to clean up the junk and then burn the sticks by June 1st. 308 6th St & 601 W Sycamore have until June 6th, 2022, to reply.

New Superintendent of Janitorial Services at Community Center still has no applicants after offering \$10 an hour at 24 hours a week. Clerk is asking Council to consider any new ideas.

Hardin County Conservation & Sewer Hook Up presented the signed easement agreement and a diagram to begin the archeology and environmental studies. If the project takes this route, a 28E agreement will need to be developed by the City attorney, County attorney, County Conservation, and the City Council, detailing ownership, and responsibilities of each party. Blackburn wants to make sure everyone is aware of where the hook up is going to be placed.

Proposed River road sewer installation was discussed by Mayor Stearns with another estimate by CGA at mid \$500m's. Mayor Stearns advised he is still searching out grant applications and/or loans.

Mayor Stearns presented a bid for 12 LED gym lights received for a net after rebates of about \$3,600. Discussed the electric bills for the increased gym usage compared to prior years. Stearns estimates a 1–2-year payback through power savings. C. Schurman moved, Hagberg seconded the motion to approve the project as presented. Motion carried. Absent: no one.

Mayor Stearns discussed completing the City 5 Year Strategic Plan with the help of Region IV and will set up an appointment this week to get started with discussions for this plan.

At our previous meeting council approved as requested by Dave Hagberg for the city to allow wood chips (not allowed in the City stick dump) to be piled on the east side of the fence adjacent to the north bin of the compost center. Pieters is requesting an end date be put into place at one month. Pieters moved, C. Schurman seconded the motion to approve the one month as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one.

Perry Gjersvik from Short Elliott Hendrickson Inc presented an agreement to have the city allow them to research grants to pay for funding for our wastewater system study, engineering, and design. A USDA Search Grant Program for engineering studies of \$30,000.00, SRF Planning and Design Loan with 0% interest and no limit, 3-year term for planning and design work associated with wastewater system improvements and a 20-year payback. Mayor Stearns advised we are up to date per the DNR until 2024 and then the DNR would give us a plan on what needs to be updated. Gjersvik advised this process can start at any time and they would get the information from the DNR with the new rules. There were no motions at this time on this topic. Mayor Stearns also mentioned we need to include in our 5-year strategic plan to provide services on the west side of the river and to annex down S. River Rd to the southwest and also to the northeast of 200th St.

Mayor Stearns discussed the updated Street Condition Report completed by Councilpersons and Veld. C. Schurman suggested the spots where we have cut out the street for water/sewer repairs and/or have potholes needs to be priority. Pieters advised the county has approved us to use cold press and we will get billed. Mayor Stearns advised we need to rent a roller and air compressor and have enough volunteers to do all the potholes and cut-out spots in one day. Pieters and J. Schurman volunteered to get costs and present at the next meeting.

Mayor Stearns presented Public Budget Adoption Hearing Resolution 22-05. C. Schurman moved, Pieters seconded the motion to approve resolution as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one. Roll call - Blackburn- aye, Hagberg- aye, Pieters- aye, C. Schurman- aye, and J. Schurman - aye. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: no one.

Pieters advised the pile of rock down by the fire department where semi-trucks are parked was put there by an individual and he is asking to give them a credit on their utility bills. Hagberg, C. Schurman and Mayor Stearns advised this is two different budget departments, they would like to use streets fund. C. Schurman suggested we pay for part of the bill for the rocks instead of giving a credit and Pieters will discuss it with the resident and present it at the next meeting.

Mayor's comments: Ditch walk was last Saturday and those who helped were much appreciated.


