From the Mayor

Clean-up Days:

Ditch clean-up on Saturday April 30, 2022: Recently biked along S-56 south of Steamboat Rock and it is heavily littered again. Specifically, the section between the Rock Stop and the entrance to the Pine Lake Golf Course. In 2021 we picked up two full pick-up loads of trash and junk in that stretch after not being picked up for years. Should go much faster this year. Meet at the east parking lot of the Steamboat Rock Baptist Church at 9:00 am. the Hardin County Roads department is providing Safety vests and signage. Start as a group at the parking lot where we will divide up into two teams. One team will start from the parking lot and the other will start at the golf course entrance. End will be where we meet in the middle about at the east gravel road that leads to the Pine Lake Wildlife Club. This is an activity where the more the merrier applies!

City Wide clean-up Days: Saturdays June 11 and June 25, 2022. City will provide a large roll-off to put junk in that has accumulated on your property. Same location as in prior years at the City Stick dump just north of the Fire Station and members of the City Council will be there to assist in unloading. This is a great service the City has provided for many years to get rid of your extra junk. Get your friends and relatives to give you a hand with this activity if you are unable to do it yourself.

Appliances will also be accepted at a cost of \$15/appliance. As in the past, this is a pass through for the city, not a fee we keep. There will be a designated spot to place your clean recyclable iron and metal including aluminum, stainless steel, and all kinds of other scrap iron immediately south of the compost bins. My own scrap iron pile includes things like the aluminum parts of old pots, internal camper brake assemblies, worn out leaf springs, iron pipe, many times repurposed angle iron, and misc. other metal scraps. Please keep the scrap iron well off the driveway path so we do not create any flat tires. Prior to the official clean-up days, the stick dump will be open every Saturday for sticks, tree limbs, dead falls, and so forth prior to the official clean-up days which are junk only. You are welcome to bring metal scraps to the iron pile any of those Saturdays.


Hazardous Waste disposal: Saturday July 9th, 2022, between the Post office and the old School Gym, 9-11 AM. Sponsored by Hardin County Solid Waste and Metro Waste Authority. This is very specifically an opportunity for you to get rid of toxic substances, petroleum-based waste products, all kinds of chemical type products, used oil filters, and a plethora of other stuff that may be starting to leak all over your basement or garage. In the last year, twice, someone in town dumped something toxic into our sewer system which killed the good bacteria in our sewer plant. That is a really bad idea because it screws up the sewer plant so much that the DNR can fine the City for that happening if they think it will continue. That would be your hard-earned property tax money and sewer bill payments used to pay a fine for an event that should not have happened. So, the moral of this story is- bring that kind of stuff to the hazardous clean-up disposal day!

Steamboat Rock Fire Department 💈



Please keep in mind that this can be a dryer portion of the year and some like to burn off the old dead grass. When burning, take note of the wind conditions, speed, and direction. It doesn't take much for a spark to travel and ignite something else.

If you do burn, call Hardin Sheriff NON-EMERGENCY number (641-939-8190) and give them the location of your burn before you start and when you are finished. This gives them valuable information on whether to dispatch your local FD.

To give you an update on things that have been happening around the station. Ryan S. and assistance from Damion H. have diligently worked on getting the air system up and functional. All our trucks that have air brakes are now equipped with a backup air system. What does this mean, it means that when we are called, we can have the air system be fully charged and not have to wait for the system to build up air to leave, if there happens to be a small leak in the truck system. This money (\$5,000 - \$6,000) has come from the multiple fundraisers that a portion of that was set aside for this purpose.

We have currently ordered two portable LED rechargeable lights (\$600/light). These lights will help light up the scene when the incident is further away and help light up the scene where the truck lights can't reach. This also eliminates the risk of cords and water mixing.

The Steamboat Rock Volunteer Fire and Rescue Association set the date for their breakfast. It will be held on Saturday, May 28^{th} at the Boat Club now The Lodge (Iowa River Conversation Club) from 7 - 11 a.m. More information will be coming in the May newsletter.

WHAT'S IN A (NICK) NAME?

Bucky. Bo. Toad. Willie.

Just a few of the printable nicknames of friends and classmates of mine back in high school. Did you ever have a nickname? A name that people knew you by and probably called you by more than your given name. I think most of us did. Especially within our circle of friends that we were closer than most with.

It seems like most nicknames were derivatives of our last names or, in other cases, something that referred to a funny incident that happened to the name. Or perhaps it referenced a certain physical feature that was easy to make fun of.

Whatever it referred to or wherever it came from, our nicknames were meant to be fun and not necessarily mean or insulting.

The Bible gives us many instances of people getting a new name. Abraham, Jacob, Sarah- all of these received their new names from God. But the two that come to mind immediately for me are the nicknames given to Peter, James, and John. Jesus gave Simon, son of John, a nickname when He gave him the keys to the kingdom. John 1:42 in the Contemporary English Version Bible CEV says, "And when Jesus saw him, he said, "Simon's son of John, you will be called Cephas." This name can be translated as "Peter."

A nickname of Cephas, which in its original Greek form can be translated to "rock". And what was Peter to be? The rock upon which Jesus would build His church. Matthew 16: 18 in the NIV has Jesus telling Peter," And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock, I will build my church..." A fitting nickname indeed.

Jesus gave the apostles James and John their team nickname in Mark 3:17 in the English Standard Version Bible ESV "James the son of Zebedee and John the brother of James (to whom he gave the name Boanerges, that is, Sons of Thunder) …"

Sons of Thunder. That's a fun nickname. It sounds like a pro wrestling tag team. Why would Jesus call James and John sons of thunder? Well, the Bible never really comes right out and tells us why, but we can assume that Jesus knew everything about the two when He called them to be apostles and thus, was fully aware of their "thunderous" personalities.

Jesus knows about you, too. And He's called you to follow Him. And to work for Him. Using whatever talent or gift you may have. Are you a rock? Something Jesus can use to build upon? Welcome, we'll call you Peter.

Blast from the Past

STATIC of October 5, 1944

Over the past 20 years, I have spent time looking up what my father, Kenneth Kramer, did during WW2. It has been very interesting as I have been able to find a lot of information. I even talked to one of his crew mates and he sent me pictures of the crew and other photos of my father while he was stationed in England, including record of their part in the invasion at Normandy.

In looking for something to put in this month's newsletter, I decided to just look through some of the old "Static" papers that the school printed for many years. I had a stack of them dated as early at 1936. In looking through these papers, I discovered a letter that my father wrote in response to a request from the Static staff. I am very thankful to have another bit of information about the time my father served in WW2.

STATIC OCTOBER 5, 1944 HONOR ROLL Tech/Sgt. Kenneth C. Kramer 37654525 U.S. Army Air Forces

Dear folks on the home front,

I am home for a twenty-five-day furlough after flying a thirty-two-mission tour in the European Theater of Operations as a top-turret gunner on a B-24 Liberator Bomber. It feels pretty good to back in the States again where there is a little light on the city streets. In England, the streets were pretty dark, but I understand they have lighted things up there a bit again.

I flew overseas in February and had a very enjoyable trip over. I spent a few days in South America and Africa before going to England.

The weather in England is usually quite damp with plenty of fog. It seemed to me that the sun shone very little and when it did shine, it was for a very short time. As a rule, the air is always damp and cold.

I visited London several times. It is really a large place with plenty to see and enjoy. I saw several robot planes which made you feel a little funny the first couple times, but you get used to them quite easy.

I flew raids to Berlin and Paris and other targets in Germany, France, and a few of the other smaller countries nearby. Seventeen of my thirty-two raids were to Germany.

I have been awarded the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

After my furlough, I report to Miami, Florida for a couple weeks then I will be assigned to an Air Base somewhere in the United States.

I remember my father telling me that when he arrived in Miami, Florida after the war, he would only be there a few days until he received his assignment. However, after quite some time, he finally talked with those in charge to find out when he would get his assignment. It was at that time that they discovered that his file had fallen behind the filing cabinet. He was then assigned to Chanute Field in Champaign County, Illinois until such time he was released.

City of Steamboat Rock "A Valley of Friendliness"

The Steamboat Rock City Council met in regular session April 11th, 2022, 6:30 p.m. in the City Council chambers and available via zoom due to COVID-19 restrictions. Present were Mayor Stearns and the following council members: Adam Blackburn, Jackie Hagberg, Cory Schurman, and Jon Schurman absent: Kevin Pieters. Also present were Melissa Johanson, Dave Hagberg, Heidi Young, Todd Fleming, and Renee Oltrogge.

Mayor Stearns called the meeting to order. C. Schurman moved, seconded by Blackburn to approve the posted agenda. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters.

Hagberg moved, seconded by C. Schurman to approve the minutes from March 14th, 2022. Motion carried unanimously, absent Pieters. C. Schurman moved, seconded by Blackburn to approve the minutes from March 23rd, 2022. Motion carried unanimously, absent Pieters. J. Schurman moved, seconded by Hagberg the motion to approve City bills as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters. Hours were presented for Renee Oltrogge, City Clerk and Kelly Haskin, Water/Sewer Supervisor. C. Schurman moved, Blackburn seconded the motion to approve hours as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters.

Public comments: Mayor Stearns presented building permit request for new deck and ramp for 202 E Market St. C. Schurman moved, Hagberg seconded the motion to approve the permit as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters.

Dave Hagberg requested the city allow wood chips (not allowed in the City stick dump) to be piled on the east side of the fence adjacent to the north bin of the compost center. He would like to promote this as a source of wood chips for residents' use. J. Schurman moved, C. Schurman seconded the motion to approve the wood chip pile as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters.

Melissa Johanson, Librarian presented the library report. Working to re-install the library sign. Grant just received for new bookcases. 14 people came to the author reading. Norm will be planting some new Maple trees on the property line, with the neighbor's approval at no cost with the ability to put some signage up for his tree nursery. Mayor Stearns advised we have 8-10 oak trees that need to be transplanted from in front of the solar panels, they might be able to use. POs requested #202203011 \$25.00 JC Powers for snow removal, #20220302 Baker & Taylor \$427.72 for books. Hagberg moved, Blackburn seconded the motion to approve the POs as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters.

Scott Williams, Fire Chief was not present for the Fire Department report. Mayor Stearns relayed from the Chief's written report: advised no burn bans at this time. All members needing new gear have been fitted and ordered. Fireman's Breakfast on May 28th from 7 - 11 a.m. Pancakes, French toast, eggs, sausage, bacon, toast, and drinks. Newest members Harrison and Justin are continuing classes for certification for FF1. Practice burns on April 23.

Nothing to report from public works.

Mayor Stearns advised on distressed properties; 101 E Main- a petition is in process. 103 E Main-deed to transfer ownership signed and waiting for the transfer to be recorded. 208 3rd St- City attorney has sent "Consent to enter judgement" and "Request to release lien" to IRS. Plan to get a roll off with volunteers to clean up the junk, then burn the sticks. Sources of additional volunteers were discussed. 301 W Market St is sold and the new owner plans to rehab the property. 305 4th St has been sold and clean-up is in process. 308 6th & 601 W Sycamore are 50% thru the 90-day notice. No response so far.

New Superintendent of Janitorial Services at Community Center has no applicants and City Clerk is asking Council to consider increasing to offering wage. Blackburn suggested to make it an hourly job instead of salaried. C. Schurman moved to make the offering \$10/hour with a maximum of 24 hours per month, Blackburn seconded. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters.

Hardin County Conservation & Sewer Hook Up presented by Mayor Stearns requesting the council to approve an easement for the county campground to hook up somewhere to the City sewer system with the proper legal documents. Blackburn moved, C. Schurman seconded. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters.

Proposed River Road Sewer Installation was discussed by Mayor Stearns with the two estimates received so far, each with a variety of options. Long term, the gravity feed proposals, while higher in cost, would allow more flexibility as the community expands to the SW over the next 15-20 years.

Mayor Stearns suggested we apply for grants covering 40% of the cost, pay for 20% out of the Sewer fund, and request financing for the other 40%, about \$200,000 on a 10-year loan. This could be doable to justify the return on investment. Currently seven potential customers on the west side of the river, plus hook up the county campground on that line. Long term there could potentially be an additional 6-12 homes construction to the SW. Sewer in that area would promote new homes which would increase the tax base and we could serve the residents that are already there better. Mayor Stearns suggested that gearing this towards tourism as a joint venture for the bike trail and County Conservation, along with growing our town might add to the competitive nature of a grant application.

Happenings Bike Night Dates to be exempted from the sound ordinance and street closures were presented by owner Heidi Young. Dates requested are the 3^{rd} Saturday of each month, 5 pm – 9 pm May through September with street closures from noon – 10 pm. This is the fifth year they have done these types of activities here in Steamboat Rock. The August one coincides with Jeep Jam. C. Schurman moved, Blackburn seconded the motion to approve the noise exemption as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters. Hagberg moved, J. Schurman seconded the motion to approve the street closures as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Absent: Pieters. Young, who has been helping re-build the official city website, asked for additional local input for suggestions of what to include on the city website.

Mayor Stearns advised a bid for 12 LED gym lights has not yet been received. To fix the current lights costs about \$250 per fixture which is not cost effective when the fixtures could be changed to LED for about the same amount of money, then apply for the Alliant rebate of an estimated \$130 per fixture and reduce electric usage by 80%. The project is estimated at a net cost of about \$2,000. No motion until further, more complete information is received. The idea of some donations towards the fixtures was discussed and getting the Visionary group involved to embrace that was agreed.

The City has the right to request employee to submit or be subject to drug testing. Either party can terminate this contract with or without cause with 14 days' notice.






