from the Mayor

Review of Last Four Years as Mayor

When becoming Mayor, I was very clear to the City Council members that they would not always like or agree with the choices I made. That being said, I have always tried to do the right thing, sometimes visionary, but always the right thing for the City of Steamboat Rock to prosper today and forth going. It's been interesting, challenging, and occasionally fun.

With the help of the City Council, a lot of volunteers, some professional services, and the Visionary Group, a lot has been accomplished in the past four years:

When coming to the Mayor position, the Council was quick to try to fill my plate by tasking me to get distressed properties cleaned up. There are still a few (and always will be) to clean up, but there were specifically five that have been pleasantly mitigated. The process was for the City to continue to put pressure on the owners of the distressed properties that had been in a difficult state of repair, in some cases more than a decade. Fortunately, private individuals were able to purchase and improve four of the five and your City cleaned up the fifth.

Took down a couple of dead or dying very large trees that were in danger of damaging City property as pieces of the trees began to drop. Cleaned the trees out of a few ditches that were blocking the view and creating a traffic hazard. Trimmed branches and took out dead Ash trees at the lift station/ Iowa River landing providing parking for an additional dozen vehicles. Trimmed out the trees, undergrowth, and seeded grass in the triangle between the lift station and the River's Edge Trail, Iowa river bike bridge. Have noticed several wedding parties taking pictures in this area in the last two years.

Analyzed six different scenarios of what could be done with the old school house. Analyzed potential grant sources. None of either were feasible. Acquired a Brownfield Grant to do an Asbestos/ hazardous materials study in the old school house and received estimates of the mitigation cost. Several City Codes updated.

New roof and paint on the old ball diamond concession stand. Market street patched and crack sealed. Several man-hole covers replaced. Storm-water mitigation installed on East Market Street. Purchased a 30-year newer used snowplow truck. New bucket built for the end loader.

Pursued and scored a grant for an automatic standby generator for the City Well which is just now coming on-line. New state-of-the-art Pickle Ball court installed. New LED light installation in the old school gym- partially funded by Alliant Energy grant.

Successfully held three ditch clean-ups on the roads leading South and West out of Steamboat Rock. Couple of Iowa River clean-ups. Encouraged people to clean-up their own properties and help their neighbors do the same if they needed help.

Thank-you to all the many volunteers who have helped make these improvements possible.

While writing about 40 Mayor Columns over the last four years my goal was for them to be informative, occasionally humorous, encouraging, and helpful in understanding why the City made some of the decisions it made. Hope you have enjoyed them. Best of luck to the new Mayor and the primarily new City Council.

Pursue the facts, don't argue the rumor. Be careful out there.

I can't believe it is December as I write this to you. This means another year is coming to an end, 365 days, where have they gone?

SRFD had Santa arrive a little early this year and was present at the lighting of the Town Tree. He handed out 55 sacks and received many Christmases wishes. Thank you for all who attended and made this event a success!!!

Many may have their Christmas tree up and may have had it up for some time now. Remember to give your tree water every day. When you hang your lights, make sure the wiring is in great condition. Granted LED lights don't get as warm, but a bad spot in the line can be a fire hazard on your tree. If you hang lights around the house or outside, these lines also need to be in great condition.

This month would be a good time to check the furnace filter and possibly change it. Not having proper filtering may have an effect on your furnace's efficiency. That efficiency is not only for heat, but also for poisonous gases that your furnace emits. IF it is not properly ventilated, these gases can be released into the home and cause health issues. Please keep in mind CO just doesn't come from just the furnace; how many of you have a gas hot water heater, how many have a garage that is attached to the home and leave the car running to warm up? Each of these emit CO just as a furnace. Are these items properly vented and exhausted from your home? This gas is a gas that is both odorless and colorless and is a silent killer.

There are numerous types of CO detectors and if you have one, is/are the batteries current?

To help prevent this have yearly inspections done on anything that uses LP or Natural gas to help power a unit in your home.

Make sure the fluids and batteries in your vehicle are at operable levels? No need to be stranded!! How is the rubber looking on your vehicle? Weather in Iowa can change within the hour. Having the proper tread on your tires will also assist you while driving on bad road conditions. Please remember to NOT over drive and pay close attention to oncoming traffic. If you should be traveling and witness a car in the ditch, before calling in, make sure there is an occupant/s. When you do call in, give the correct location. Sending emergency crews out for no one in the vehicle puts them in harm's way; Not giving the correct location, waste valuable time for proper care. Please be responsible when making the phone call.

Last but not least, SRFD will be hosting their dance at Happenings on January 20, 2024. We will again have Six Pack Jack presenting live music. There will be a cover charge of \$5, door prizes, silent auction items and a chance for a 60" + TV. We will have free will donation for food in the back room, thanks to Marc. H.

All the proceeds raised are used for equipment replacement or purchase of new. One item we are striving to get is a new thermal imager. This new device will range from \$5,000 - \$8,500. This will allow firefighters to see through the smoke, present the images in a different color, and allow them to see where a hotspot maybe inside a wall. Come out and enjoy a good night of music, dancing, and visiting with friends.



MELVIN FRANKLIN BAKER FAMILY

John Smith Baker, father of Melvin, spent forty-five years in the Eldora township community. He was born on Oct. 20, 1838, in Licking County, Ohio, the son of Charles Baker.

Charles Baker was born on May 19, 1814, in Licking County, Ohio, and remained there until 1852 farming and operating a canal boat on the Ohio Canal. On January 20, 1835, he was married to Elizabeth Smith who was born in Pennsylvania and who bore him six children: George W, John, William G, James N, Elizabeth Deliah, and Mary Catherine. He died on September 18, 1884 and was buried in the Buckner Cemetery.


John Smith Baker was married on March 23, 1876, to Alice V. Madden, who was born in Pennsylvania on December 22, 1853, the daughter of John and Elizabeth (Wert) Madden. To this union were born Melvin Franklin, Lillie Elizabeth, John Smith, Mary Ellen, Charles Clayton, Alice Valentine, Jessie Lee, and Fleda May.

On August 6, 1862, John S. Baker enlisted at Rockford, Illinois, in the 74th Illinois Infantry Company F of the Union Army. He served three years. In 1866, he came to Iowa, arriving in Eldora with fifteen cents in his pocket. The first property he owned was an old but good horse which he traded for an eighty-acre farm. This horse took the first prize at the first Hardin County Fair which was held in Steamboat Rock.

On December 14, 1904, Melvin Franklin was married to Grace Darling Bartine of Clemon, Iowa. Born to this union were five children. Helen Grace was born December 24, 1905, and married Donald Chance, one child Jared Michael was born to this union. Later on, she was married to C. Jackson Garn. Robert Elon was born July 16, 1907, and was married to Lillian Valentine Ulch and had one daughter, Shirley. Miriam Blanche was married to A.J. Marken, a widower with two children Linda Mary and Margaret Joe. They were adopted by Meriam and A.J. and Meriam had a son Alan James. Maxine Bartine was born in September 26, 1912. She was married to Russell Holmes, and they became the parents of Dennis Holmes. Meridith was born July 24, 1924, and married Glen Willig of Eldora. They became the parents of Deborah, Diane (Hart), Denise, and Donna.

Melvin Franklin Baker was born in a log cabin on a farm east of Eldora. He worked on the farm each spring and fall and attended school during the winter term graduation from Eldora High School in 1898 and from the University of Iowa Pharmacy College in 1900. He also attended medical school at Northwestern University for a short time. He also was an embalmer for a short time.

Many families recall his interest and generosity toward the children seeking an education in Steamboat Rock. He worked as a pharmacist in Clemons, Rhodes, Ogden, and Steamboat Rock. In his later years he was employed in various stores as a relief pharmacist.

The Steamboat Rock City Council met in regular session on December 11, 2023, 6:30 P.M. in the City Council Chambers. Present were Mayor Stearns and the following council members: Dave Mull, Kevin Pieters, Cory Schurman, and Jon Schurman. Absent was Adam Blackburn. Also, present Linda Whitt-Jensen, Jim Green, JJ Veld, Marvin Veld, Marc Havens, Michelle Kelley, Travis Hollander, and Scott Williams.

Mayor Stearns called the meeting to order. Pieters moved, seconded by C. Schurman to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously. C. Schurman moved, seconded by Pieters to approve the November 13, 2023 minutes. Motion carried unanimously. K. Pieters moved, seconded by J. Schurman to approve City bills. Motion carried unanimously. C. Schurman moved, seconded by Mull to approve employee hours as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

Public comments: Approval of Livestock permit for Jim Green and Michelle Kelley. Pieters moved, seconded by Mull to approve permit. Motion carried unanimously.

Library: No report

Fire Department: Scott Williams, Fire Chief, reported that the fire association theft has been repaid; the volunteer is no longer affiliated with the Fire Department Association. 12 members in the department presently. 55 Santa bags provided to children during the tree lighting. Bill will be sent to Whitten Fire for an assist. Working on scheduling with Breda to get compartment door fixed. Scott was voted in again as Chief and Damion is the new Assistant Chief.

Public Works report – JJ Veld reported the snow plow repair will be costly and recommended pursuing other options. The Council explored various options with follow up meeting schedule for 12/14/2023 to consider options. Mayor Stearns will call Alden Diesel about options. Mull will talk to Stupp's about their willingness to take a run at doing the repair.

Distressed Properties – Waiting for IRS to sign-off on 208 3rd St. Suit being filed pending lien search on 308 6th St and 601 W Sycamore St

Nuisance reports: none

Account balances were presented and reviewed by Mayor Stearns. A budget meeting was scheduled for 12/28/2023 to start work on the FY25 budget beginning July 1, 2024.

Old Business: Dog park proposal withdrawn. Nuisance Ordinance and Municipal Infractions Ordinance – pending. Animal Control Code section 5-2-1 was reviewed. Remaining Animal Control code is still pending. Periodic State Audit has been completed and exit review scheduled with only two City Council members allowed, for Monday 12/18/23 at 10:00 am. Water code revisions are pending. Both the Affidavit Operator and Water and Sewer Superintendent hires are pending Council approval.

New Business: David Mull, Sr., Mayor Elect and council members elect Marc Havens, Travis Hollander, and Marvin Veld were sworn in with terms beginning 01/02/2024 at 12:00 PM. Marc Haven agreed to be Mayor Pro-temp. Pieters moved, seconded by C. Schurman to approve Linda Whitt-Jensen, David Mull Sr., Mayor Elect, and Marc Havens, Mayor Pro-temp elect. as signers for all accounts at Greenbelt Bank & Trust and Hardin County Savings Bank, upon commencement of term. Motions approved unanimously. C. Schurman moved and Pieters seconded the motion to approve Resolution #2023-13 to apply for USDA-SEARCH Grant. Roll call vote: J. Schurman – Aye, Pieters-Aye, Mull-Aye, and C. Schurman-Aye. Motion carried.

Mull moved to adjourn, seconded by Pieters. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 8:05 PM.
