What was in Jeremy's Egg?

For as the soil makes the sprout come up and a garden causes seed to grow, so the sovereign Lord will make righteousness and praise spring up before all nations.

“Then sings my soul, my Savior God to thee, How great thou art, How great thou art”
“How Great Thou Art”. What a great old hymn, right? Well, kind of. It’s great, and it is a hymn, but the popular tune isn’t all that old. The hymn’s roots are old, however.



Back in 1886, Swedish author Carl Boberg wrote a poem he titled, “O Store Gud” (in English, “O Great God”). In the next few years, the poem was matched to the music of old Swedish folk song and appeared in Swedish hymnals.

Much later, an English missionary, Stuart Hine, heard the song and was inspired to create his own version of “O Store Gud”. Hine took a few creative liberties, as songwriters often do, changed the title and in 1949, wound up with the publishing rights to what we now know as “How Great Thou Art”.

As great as we find this cherished hymn today, it wasn’t all that popular back in ’49. In fact, it wasn’t until 1954 that the hymn really took off. It was then that the owner of a Christian recording label, Manna Music, bought the rights to the song from Hine. That owner’s name was Tim Spencer, a songwriter and along with a guy named Roy Rogers, was a former member of the cowboy group, Sons of the Pioneers.

As any good song owner would do, Spencer began to push “How Great Thou Art” to any singer who might sell some records with it. While in England in 1954, the song eventually fell into the hands of a guy named George Beverly Shea who just happened to be working for a guy named Billy Graham. Graham loved the song; Shea could sing it very well, and the rest, as they say, is history.

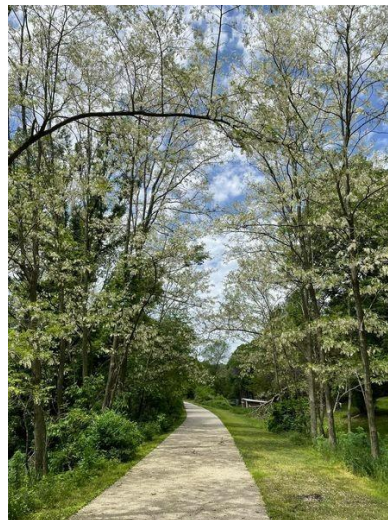
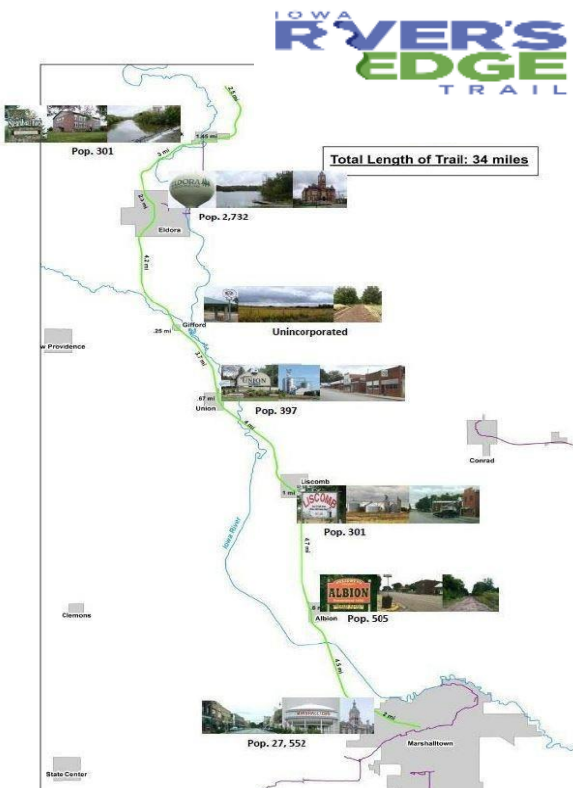
Graham once said about it, "The reason I like 'How Great Thou Art' is because it glorifies God. It turns Christian's eyes toward God, rather than upon themselves. I use it as often as possible because it is such a God-honoring song."

Since then, it’s become one the world’s most favorite hymns ever. "How Great Thou Art" was ranked second (after "Amazing Grace") on a list of the favorite hymns of all time in a survey by Christianity Today magazine in 2001 and in a nationwide poll by Songs Of Praise in 2019.

And so, here in 2024, we celebrate the 75th anniversary of a treasured “old” hymn. Maybe you could honor that anniversary by finding your favorite version of it online, on a CD, a tape, or an album and giving it a play.

My favorite is the one done by Carrie Underwood and Vince Gill. Find it on YouTube and give it a look. And grab a tissue as well. Trust me, you’ll need it.

Steamboat Rock Fire Department

We have a very calm and warm winter/spring. The amount of moisture we are lacking is causing/raising alarm across the state. The local news stations have been doing a great job of notifying the type of weather condition we are in for burning. There have also been weather conditions sent over cellular devices about conditions for burning.

There has been talk about a "Burn Ban" for Hardin Co., but it has not been implemented. Before the writing of this article, our conditions were not in favor of burning because of the wind conditions and dryness. As I'm writing, the rain has been falling for a very good portion of the day. Yes, it may seem that it would be safe to burn, but IF the wind picks up and as dry as our state is, this rain will immediately be absorbed into the ground taking and care of any remaining moisture making the dormant grass easily flammable once again.

With that said, if you call any member of the city council or member of the SRFD, they will advise not to burn (just because of the lack of moisture), but you can burn as there is no county burn ban.

Remember, if you do burn, call Hardin Sheriff NON-EMERGENCY number (641-939-8190) give them the location of your burn before you start and when you are finished. When burning, take note of the wind conditions; speed and direction. It doesn't take much for a spark to travel and ignite something else.

IF you don't call in a burn that you started and the department gets called, by rights we have to extinguish the fire. So do your due diligence and call.

When you are finished, call the non-emergency number to inform them. This gives them valuable information on whether or not to dispatch your local FD. When calling in a controlled burn, keep in mind, you must have enough water on hand at the burn to extinguish said burn.

Homeowners, if you haven't checked your smoke detectors, now would be a good time. Probably a good time to do a battery check in all the smoke detectors in your house and camper (if having one) as well. If you have forced air from your furnace, it would be a good thing to dust them as well. The amount of dust that accumulates will affect the proper function of your detector. Sometimes it seems we move from using the furnace to using the AC. Don't forget to change your AC filter before turning that on as well.

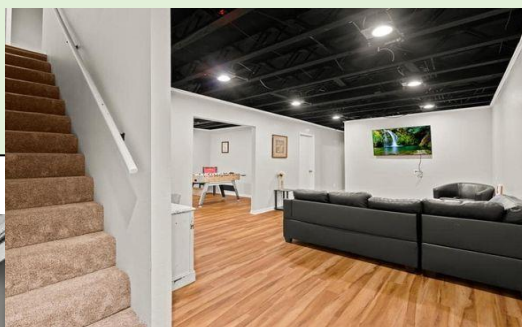

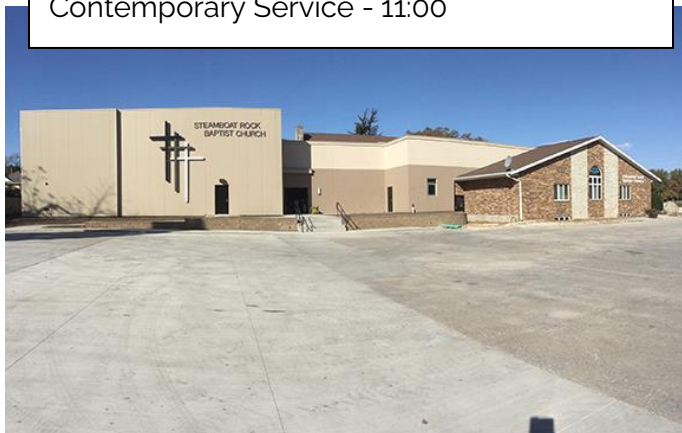

The Steamboat Rock City Council met in regular session on Monday, March 11, 2024 at Steamboat Rock City Hall. Mayor David Mull called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm with council members: Marc Havens, Travis Hollander, Kevin Pieters and Marvin Veld answering roll call.

Marc made a motion to approve the minutes from the February 12th and February 27th meetings and was seconded by Marvin. Motion passed unanimously.

Kevin made a motion to approve the bills and was seconded by Marc. Motion passed unanimously.

Library Director, Melissa, was present to report on the Library activities. Painting has been popular activity. Summer reading programs are in the works.

There was no update on the distressed properties and there was no nuisance reporting.

The Budget vs. Actual report and the fund balance for the sewer fund were reviewed by the council.

Under old business, CGA worked to get the Shore property plotted and will have an update next meeting.

Clerk Mentor – Melissa Simmons, explained the changes made on the budget spreadsheet. She will email the correction of adding the remaining \$15,050 to the Road, Streets and Sidewalk Capital Outlay Fund.

Shannon presented a T-Mobile offer that will have 1 cell phone and cameras that can be used to protect the city. More information to come on this offer.

Shannon requested the council all walk-through the water and sewer areas to help make plans for 1-, 3-, 5- year plans on updates that will be needed.

Marvin made a motion to approve going into closed session with Scott Williams – Fire Chief according to Iowa Code 21.5 i. Marc seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

Kevin made a motion to open the meeting again. This was seconded by Marc. Motion passed unanimously.

No action was needed following the closed session.

Fire Chief Scott Williams updated the council on the happenings for the fire department.

Employee JJ Veld filed a discrepancy regarding a paycheck from January. More information will be coming on what was discussed regarding payments.
