Originally, August did not have 31 days. Now this is probably one of the most intriguing facts about August because it seemingly came from a tinge of jealousy. August had only 30 days, while July, which was names after Julius

Caesar had 31 days. however, Augustus, the Roman Emperor did not want his month to have fewer days than Julius' month. So, he added a day to August, making it 31 days long, just like July.

The Perseid Meteor Shower is one of the most popular meteor showers. It usually peaks around August 11th to 13th and can be visible from most parts of the world. Similar to May, August also has two birthstones. The birthstones for August are peridot and sardonyx. Peridot is a green gemstone that brings good luck and Protects against nightmares. Sardonyx is a reddish-brown

gemstone that brings courage and happiness.

August's flowers are the gladiolus and poppy. The gladiolus is a tall and Elegant flower that symbolizes strength, honor, and moral integrity. The poppy, is a beautiful red bloom made famous

Which would eventually take us back to the drug store for a double dipper of our favorite flavor. Those are a few colorful characters who shall remain nameless for obvious reasons.

Those days were long, giving us plenty of time to head up to Mrs. Pierson's yard, grab a hold of the willow tree branches to swing across the crick. We spent our days running through the cemetery, trying to climb Tower Rock, and dangling our feet off the pontoons down by the river. We swam in the river and knew well enough to stay away from the dam. I truly can't think of one bad experience above the usual kid stuff. We were safe and it seemed we were looked after wherever we went.

They say time is the stuff life is made of. We had the time of our lives growing up in the small town in Iowa. I wouldn't change a thing.

The Steamboat Rock City Council met in regular session on Monday, July 8, 2024 at City Hall. Mayor Dave Mull called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm with council members: Kevin Pieters, Travis Hollander, Marv Veld, Marc Havens, and Cory Schurman present.

Cory Schurman made a motion to approve the agenda and was seconded by Kevin Pieters. Motion passed unanimously.

There were no comments or concerns from the public.

Library Director Melissa Johanson reported that there was 2 weeks left in the summer reading program and all was going well. Good attendance for the special programs. Several books are being checked out, but movies are not as successful.

Fire Department report was given by Kevin Pieters (Scott Williams was not present). The Fire Department has purchased two torpedo nozzles to use to combat fires faster. They should be in service by the end of the month.

Public works: Shannon reported that the new pump has been ordered and is on its way. The pump should be here in 3 to 5 weeks giving time to get things ready for installation. Discussion on how to get information from residents concerning lead in the pipes at the water meters, need a picture from residents or to physically inspect the meter. Topic will be put on next month's agenda for further discussion.

Motion was made by Kevin Pieters to approve the minutes as written and seconded by Marc Havens. Motion was approved unanimously.

Motion was made by Travis Hollander to approve the bills as presented and was seconded by Marc Havens. Motion was approved unanimously.

Motion was made by Cory Schurman to approve the hours and was seconded by Kevin Pieters. Motion was approved unanimously.

Old Business:

Utility Deposits – This was discussed in the June meeting and tabled for later discussion. The Council compared the current deposit of \$100.00 in comparison to the minimum water bill for a month and decided to raise the utility deposit. Motion was made by Cory Schurman to raise the utility deposit from \$100.00 to \$200.00; motion was seconded by Kevin Pieters. Motion passed unanimously.

New Business:

Scott Pottorff of MMS Consultants, Inc. from Iowa City was present and talked to the council about possible ways he could help the city in the future with projects: such as how and where to apply for grants and low interest loans. He will keep in contact via email.

Discussed the issue of the East door, had water in the conference room after a big rain and it seemed it came in the east door entrance. Marc was going to check with Scott on fire code and then see what can be done to fix the issue.

Several items were listed for next month's agenda: Property Cleanup, Street repairs, Promotion for the School to attract businesses to rent space.

Motion was made by Kevin Pieters to adjourn the meeting and seconded by Cory Schurman. Motion approved unanimously and meeting was adjourned at 7:40 pm.
