Welcome to November

And the dead leaves lie huddled and still, No longer blown hither and thither; The last lone aster is gone; The flowers of the witch-hazel wither ...

November, the 11th month of the year, has 30 days and marks the beginning of the winter holiday season for most folks, even if the winter solstice, doesn't occur until late December.

November's full Moon is traditionally called the **Beaver Moon**. Why this name? In the Colonial Era, this was the month to set one's beaver traps before the swamps froze and beavers retired to their lodges, to ensure a supply of warm winter furs.

In 2024, November's full Moon occurs on Friday, November 15.

November's traditional birthstone is the **topaz**, usually a yellow to amber color. The ancient Greeks believed that topaz could make a wearer invisible. A symbol of honor and strength, topaz was also believed to bring longevity and wisdom.

November's birth flower is the **chrysanthemum**. Generally, chrysanthemums represent cheerfulness. A red one conveys, "I love you." White symbolizes truth or pure love. A yellow one indicates slighted love.

The Anglo-Saxons had quite a fitting name for November. It's usually at this time of the year in the northern hemisphere that cold winds start to chill you to the bone, and as such, they called it "Wind Monath," or wind month.

The Anglo-Saxons also called the month of November "Blod Monath," or blood month

It gained this name as it's in November that they would traditionally slaughter cows to provide food for the long winter months.

Thanksgiving is celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November and has been celebrated since 1621. The first Thanksgiving was a feast celebrating the first bountiful harvest of the pilgrims of Plymouth and New England. It is still celebrated in a similar way, with families coming together and sharing plentiful amounts of food traditionally available during November.

The beginning of the end of the War of Independence began on November 30, 1782, when a provisional treaty was signed between the newly-formed United States of America and the Kingdom of Great Britain. The final treaty wasn't completed and signed until nearly a year later in Paris on September 3, 1783.

On November 19, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln delivered the Gettysburg Address at the consecration of the National Cemetery at the site of the Gettysburg battle. While Lincoln's speech was just two minutes long, it summed up everything important there is about democracy. Interestingly, Lincoln was in the middle of a minor bout of smallpox while he gave the speech and looked drained and ghost-like.

Steamboat Rock Fire Department

Just a friendly reminder that Hardin County is still in a burn ban at the time I wrote this article. Should you burn and your burn gets called in, we will extinguish it, and you have the possibility of receiving a fine.

Burn Ban includes no open burning – campfire, trash, etc.

Doesn't seem possible that harvest is almost over, but it is. Please be aware of the large machinery still out on the gravel roads. Be cautious when traveling on gravel, the dust is horrible. Take it slow as you may not see that semi parked on the side, slow moving wagon, or a broke down vehicle or equipment because of the dust factor.

Speaking of dust; now would be a good time to look at your furnace (change filter??) or dust off the top of your base heaters. Don't forget to blow out your AC fins before putting that cover on.

Please remember that the SRFD is not taking cans or bottles. If there is a group that you may know that is interested in doing this, please have them contact either myself or city hall and they can relay the message to me.

The Steamboat Rock Fire and Rescue will again be hosting Santa's Christmas sacks, but this year will be a little different. Santa and sacks will be present the night of the lighting of the tree, Nov. 27th. Santa and his Fire Dept. helpers will be there from 6 - 6:30 p.m. Come and grab a sack and watch the lighting of the tree.

Yes, it is almost Thanksgiving!! If you are traveling, please travel safe.

Well, consider this. If you're a Christian, if you've professed Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior and you believe that Jesus died and rose again for you and for the forgiveness of your sins; then I'm your brother.

John 1:12-13 in the NIV Bible affirms this. "To all who received him, to those who believe in his name, he gave the right to become children of God — children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God." Everyone who receives Christ, everyone who believes in Christ becomes a child of God. Everyone, like you and me. So, how've you been, bro! Good to see you, sis!

Cemetery Theater Revisited

During "Cemetery Theater" back in 2002, one of the people that we portrayed was Heinie Eekhoff. Below you can read the script that was researched and written by Terry Folkerts and Dennis Holmes. You will see that Heinie Eekhoff played a big part in helping this community grow. Some things that he helped organize are still in use today.

Heine Eckhoff Researched by Terry Folkerts and Dennis Holmes

My name is Henry Eckhoff, but most folks call me Heinie. I'm proud to say that Steamboat Rock is my town even though I was born in Dumont way back in 1897. My folks were Arend & Helen Fessner Eckhoff, and I was raised in the Reformed tradition. I got my education right here in Steamboat Rock. At the age of 19, I married Helen Luiken at her father's house. WE had two daughters, Roberta, and Marjorie.

I tried my hand at many things over the years. I owned and operated a dairy for a number of years down near where Jamie Potgeter now lives. We milked the cows, pasteurized the milk, bottled it, and delivered it to our customers throughout the town. Having a good restaurant in town was always near to my heart because I wasn't the greatest cook, and my pa and ma operated a little restaurant here years ago. For years I maintained a building that I owned as a café and brought in many people to operate it. Some did a pretty good job, and some not so good. Oh, did I mention that I partnered with Fred Eilers for a while in the farm implement business?

Through it all, I was Steamboat Rock's rural mail carrier for 51 years. When Doc Caldwell passed away, the town wanted the building that housed the post office for a doctor's office 'cause young Doc Temple was coming to town.' I owned the building where the post office is today. I leased it to Uncle Sam, and it's been there ever since.

I tried my best to promote the town of Steamboat Rock. I served on the council and the fire department and was Marshall for a while. When the town had Christmas drawings, I promoted them and even called out the names of the winners. I was instrumental in getting Harry Blosch to come to Steamboat Rock and get our cheese factory going. By the time of the centennial the little factory was turning out over a thousand tons of Colby and cheddar cheese for Kraft each year.

I especially enjoyed helping with the centennial back in 1955. I helped organize the recognition of the town people over 75 and helped to bring in the carnival. Several years later I suggested that the town have a "Callithumpian" parade during one of our celebrations. Hardly anyone knew what a "Callithumpian" parade was, and I took my share of razzing about it. It is simply a parade with a lot of hullabaloos. From time to time, we set up little carnivals with games and the like in the school gym to raise money for the fireworks and what-not. Speaking of school, every once in a while, I volunteered to drive kids to the ball games. Most of the kids never forgot those rides but I believe we stayed on the road most of the time.

One summer evening five of us guys were sitting on Neil Hoekstra's front porch, right up there where the patrolman lives now. We came up with the idea for the boat club. I leased the ground to the club for the club house and later sold 150 acres which make up the present Iowa River Conservation and Improvement Club. It has been a great asset for the town and I'm glad to have had a part in getting it started. Over the years I docked my little launch I called the African Queen nearby. For many years, I gave rides up the river at boat club events. I also took various groups out on the river for early morning breakfasts or evening cookouts. Gosh that was fun.

I passed away July 23, 1989 at the age of 92. My funeral was at the Presbyterian Church where I had maintained my membership

The Steamboat Rock City Council met on October 14, 2024, for their regular meeting. The meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM BY Mayor David Mull with council members Travis Hollander, Marc Havens, Cory Schurman, Kevin Pieters and Marv Veld present.

Cory Schurman made the motion to approve the agenda, and the motion was second by Marc Havens. Motion carried. **COMMENTS & CONCERNS:** No comments from the public. **REPORTS:**

Library: No report.
Public Works: No report.

Fire Department: Fire Chief Scott Williams reported for the Fire Department. The department will do the training on Thursday 10/17. Reported calls for one combine fire and one auto accident. The Steamboat Rock area is in a burn ban – no open burn of any kind until further notice. The department ordered four new scene lights to aid the department during night calls. Possible training for grain bin emergency in the month of November. Will also have training on driving the fire truck soon.

OLD BUSINESS:

Updated the council on the Engineering Service Agreement for Search Grant – the money is to be used for the search only. The council agreed to sign the agreement.

Cathy Armstrong's permit for goats is on hold, she did not show up with the additional signatures needed.

Information was needed for signers for the account at Hardin County Savings Bank to be recorded in the minutes. Cory Schurman made the motion to have David Mull Sr., Marc Havens, and Valeria Kjormoe as signers on the account. Motion was second by Marv Veld. Motion carried.

NEW BUSINESS:

Halloween Trick or Treat hours were set for October 31st starting at 5 to 7:30. Marc Havens made the motion, and it was second by Travis Hollander. Motion carried.

A Resolution for water service line to be run under the river for the Hardin County Conservation board is needed from the City of Steamboat Rock. Motion was made by Cory Schurman and second by Marc Havens to approve the Resolution 2024-04 stating that the City of Steamboat Rock grants permission for the Hardin County Conservation Board to run and maintain a permanent water service line for connecting their property. Motion was approved by a vote with Marc, Travis, Marv, and Cory voting yes. Kevin Pieters left the meeting before the vote.

Resident Kailey Tubbs had inquired concerning the requirement for a permit for installing a storage building on her property. The issue was discussed by the council, and they would like to have her attend the next council meeting or send a letter stating what size and how the building will be placed on the property (on a concrete slab, concrete blocks, or skids, etc.) The council would then decide if a permit is required.

Building permit(s) application: Marc Havens and Kevin Pieters both applied for building permits. Motion was made by Cory Schurman to approve both permits, with Travis Hollander seconding the motion. Motion was approved with Marv Veld voting no on the permit for Pieters.

Motion was made by Marvin Veld to adjourn the regular meeting, with Marc Havens seconding the motion. Motion passed with the meeting being adjourned at 7:26 PM.
