# Welcome to October

This month's name stems from the Latin octo, "eight," because this was the eighth month of the early Roman calendar. When the Romans converted to a 12-month calendar, the name October stuck despite the fact that it's now the 10th month!

October's full Moon, known as the Hunter's Moon, arrives on Thursday, October 17. Like September's Harvest Moon, the Hunter's Moon is closely tied to the autumnal equinox.

Also, keep an eye out for the Draconid meteor shower in the late evening of October 9, and the Orionid meteor shower in the predawn hours of October 21-22.

With the autumnal equinox in late September, foliage season has officially begun across much of the United States.

Why do leaves change colors? Did you • know that fall's vivid colors are actually hidden underneath summer's green? The • main reason for the color change is not autumn's chilly weather, but light—or • rather, the lack of it. The green color of leaves disappears when photosynthesis (from sunlight) slows down, and the chlorophyll breaks down. Trees with a lot of direct sunlight will produce red leaves, while other trees may turn yellow, orange, or brown.

October is all about ending the harvest and storing your crops.

Fall is the best time to plant garlic and bulbs for spring flowers, Do these tasks soon if you haven't yet!

October's birth flowers are the cosmos and the calendula or marigold. Cosmos is a symbol of joy in life and love and peace. The calendula (aka garden, English, or pot marigold) represents winning grace, grief, or chagrin in the language of flowers.

The October birthstone in the opal, which symbolizes faithfulness and confidence. The symbolize hope and purity and were once thought to improve eyesight or enhance intuition.

A little Folklore for the season:

- When deer are in a gray coat in October, expect a hard winter.
- Much rain in October, much wind in December.
- A warm October means a cold February.

Picking your Pumpkin:

- Color-look for one that has deeporange color.
- Give them a Thump-knock on it to check that it is hollow.
- When they are ripe, it's stem is also
- If you gently push you thumbnail into the skin, it should dent it but not puncture it.
- Make sure the bottom is not mushy!



# Steamboat Rock Fire Department

National Fire Prevention Month/Week October 6<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup>

October – the month where we start to see the beautiful colors of fall begin – the month where we see a difference in the crops – the month where we notice a true difference in temperatures - Trees start to shed their leaves. These are just a few really noticeable differences. Take time to go out and see and enjoy God's canvas.

We have not had rain for some time now. But as I am currently typing this, Sept. 19, the skies have cut loose. Conditions are still right for just a spark to ignite another area. Be mindful IF you are planning on burning. Make sure that all necessary steps have been taken; called the controlled burn in to Hardin Co. dispatch (nonemergent number), contacted the chief of your local department, and have enough water to distinguish the burn you are conducting. Keep in mind that if you don't call it in and for some reason the department shows up, by law, we will put it out.

This time of year, harvest will begin or is currently underway. Large machinery will be traveling down the roads and country roads causing a smaller area of roadway to travel on. Be aware of where you are at. Don't pass on a double yellow line, near a field entrance, or an intersection putting yourself and others at risk. The lack of rain has now made our rural roads very dusty. When traveling on gravel, slow your speed down as the dust may hide a parked vehicle on the side of the road.

Beggar's night will be coming at the near the end of the month. Remember if you WANT them at your door, please turn your porch light on. There will be many littles out and about, so keep a watchful eye if driving others around.

#### The Autobiography of Mildred May Smith-Fiedler

Last month, I told you about the lady from Door County Wisconsin, who had her great-grandmother's autobiography. She visited our town and museum to find out more about her family's time here in Steamboat Rock. Mildred May Smith-Fiedler was born here in 1900 and lived here with her parents until they moved to Eldora sometime before 1910.

In her journal, she wrote a few things about Steamboat Rock that she remembered. Sometime in the future, we will have her full biography at the museum, but for now I want to share a small portion of her story with you pertaining to her time in Steamboat Rock. The following is directly from her journal:

The blacksmith, Mr. Hartman, lived up the street from us. There was quite a large family—a fat wife named Tina. One son was about my age. Everyone used to tease me about him. They tell a story about Mr. Hartman. He had to get up very early as the farmers would come in early to have their horses shod before getting to work in the fields. One evening they had company who stayed quite late. After making several hints—Mr. Hartman said, "Well Tina, I guess we had better go to bed so these folks can go home."

After selling out the Hardware Store to his partner—Dad and Mom took over the "City Hotel." Most of the business was local bachelors. Some I can remember:

- 1. Prof Hightower—Supt of the school
- 2. Jim Holmes—cashier in the bank
- 3. Ole Oleson—worked on the section gang on the railroad
- 4. Uncle Lloyd

There was a town drunk called "Uncle Doc". One time he took me by the hand and kept saying—"Come on with Uncle Doc and go get candy!" Dad saw him and gave him a kick and a scare, so he never bothered me again. Jim Holmes brough a beautiful bride, "Doll" to town. She and Mamma became very good friends.

The above gives a little glimpse into life in Steamboat Rock back in the early 1900's.



The Steamboat Rock City Council met on September 9, 2024 for their regular session. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Dave Mull at 6:30 PM with council member Kevin Pieter, Travis Hollander, and Marv Veld present. Marc Havens and Cory Schurman were absent.

Kevin Pieters made a motion to approve the agenda and was second by Marv Veld. Motion carried.

**COMMENTS AND CONCERNS FROM THE PUBLIC:** Diane Hennagir was present and discussed the issue of stray cats and wondered what if anything the city could do to rectify this issue. City informed Diane that there was nothing they could do, but the residents could remove the cats themselves. She also asked about community events and why the city doesn't have them anymore. Council explained that they could not get help or anyone to organize. She also asked about the City dump and why it was locked.

**REPORTS:** 

LIBRARY: No Report

**FIRE DEPARTMENT:** Scott Williams reported that the department had received the "torpedoes." These are a piece of equipment to aid in extinguishing fires quicker and safer for the firemen. The department ceased receiving cans for recycling and contacted the Visionary Group to see if they would like to take over. They have not had a response from them as of the meeting. Still working with other departments to define territories/boundary for each fire department but have implemented dual page. Dual page is having two departments respond for a call but the department whose territory will be primary.

**PUBLIC WORKS:** Shannon Hazelton reported that they should be ready to install the new electric pump by the end of the month. Need to finish getting things ready for it to be installed.

Kevin Pieters made the motion to approve the minutes from last month's meeting and it was seconded by Marv Veld. Motion carried.

Travis Hollander made the motion to approve the bills as presented, with Marv Veld seconding the motion. Motion carried.

Kevin Pieters made the motion to approve the hours and Travis Hollander seconded the motion. Motion carried.

**OLD BUSINESS:** Discussed the list of street repairs that need to be addressed. City had one bid from Will Venenga and a second one from OEL Construction. After further discussion, council decided there were a few manholes that need attention, so they will be getting separate bids for that work.

Kevin Pieters made a motion to award the street repairs to Will Venenga and to get a separate bid for manhole cover repairs. Travis Hollander seconded the motion and motion carried.

**NEW BUSINESS:** Cathy Armstrong presented signatures from her neighbors and was asking for council approval to have goats (2) on her property. She had all signatures but one. A motion was made by Kevin Pieters to grant permission for Cathy to have goats on her property with the stipulation that she was to obtain the signature of Nicole Tate and present the completed paperwork before moving forward. She told the council it would not be until spring for her to purchase the goats.

Council discussed a Resolution for the Hardin County Conservation Board concerning the maintenance agreement and permanent sanitary sewer easement. Resolution was presented to council and motion was made by Kevin Pieters and seconded by Marv Veld to accept the resolution. Vote was taken with a roll call vote: Kevin, yes; Travis, yes and Marv, yes. Marc and Cory were absent. Resolution passed.

City Hall received an email from Kitty Hemmen concerning the weeds blocking the view of oncoming traffic at the corner of W Market Street and County D56. She was wondering if the city could do something about the weeds. Dave said he would talk to Jim Kramer, since the property belonged to the Baptist Church. Kevin Pieters also said that he would look into doing something.

Council discussed the agreement from the Engineering firm of CGA, Inc. for the search grant money. Had questions as to what the money can be used for or if it is to pay CGA, Inc. for their services. Council decided to wait to sign until Dave can talk with Julie Winter from Region 6 Resource Partners.

Motion was made by Marv Veld to adjourn and move into closed session. Travis seconded the motion and motion carried. Meeting was adjourned at 8:02 pm.
