WHAT MATTERS





Greetings to the Saints of St. Mark!

Summer is often a time that is a little different than the rest of the year. The pace usually slows down a bit, vacations are taken, and even the days are a little longer. Summer can offer us a time to reflect and gain perspective on our lives. We can get so caught up in activities and the hustle and bustle of life that we lose perspective. Perspective is important. It keeps the bigger picture in mind. The stories of the Bible, though they happened thousands of years ago, are still there to offer us a helpful perspective on life, God, others, and ourselves.

Jim Elliot is a name that is not well known to this generation, maybe not even to those who would have been his peers in the 1950s. Jim was a talented man, a born leader, who wrestled for his college and enjoyed every sport. He was a gifted speaker and a hard-working student. As he entered college he sensed a call to the ministry and while there it found its expression in becoming a missionary. Upon graduation, he married and went overseas to serve in Ecuador among the Waodoni Indians, also known as the Auca's. The name "Auca" is the Waodoni word for "savage."

Many may have been confused by the direction his life took. Some from high school may have thought he was too talented, too much a leader to waste his life on the mission field. Others in college may have wondered why he would go to a place so savage and no one knew. Still others may have wondered if his talents could not be better used in industry, politics, or even as a pastor in a large church in America.

Those who knew Jim best, of course, knew what energized his life was his relationship with Jesus and his desire to live his life in obedience to His will and bring Him honor. Yet, what would be unknown to Jim and his new wife was, after arriving a few months before and shortly after making contact with the Auca's, Jim and the four men involved in this mission project would be killed by the Auca. Their young wives and children were overwhelmed by fear and grief by their deaths. But amazingly, the families of Jim and the other men stayed, working and serving the tribe that murdered their husbands. The actions of love, forgiveness, and grace their lives demonstrated became the means God used to convert that tribe. The gospel changed a people from Auca, "savages," to Christ-followers.

Jim realized that life is fleeting and yet, because of the Risen Christ, our lives have meaning. Whether long or short, on a mission field or the streets of Greenwood, our actions count and can make a difference. It just takes living life and seeing ourselves from a different perspective – God's perspective. Jim's life verse is the quoted below. His way of saying it was "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose." It's living life, not based on acquiring things or pleasing others, but found in living in the life and love of a Risen Savior. No fool, indeed!

So while you have some time . . . what do you think?

¹⁵Do not love the world or the things in the world. The love of the Father is not in those who love the world; ¹⁶for all that is in the world—the desire of the flesh, the desire of the eyes, the pride in riches—comes not from the Father but from the world. ¹⁷And the world and its desire are passing away, but those who do the will of God live forever.

Spotlight on Finance

Every family has money, takes in money, spends money, and - hopefully - gives money. Our church is no different. Here is the latest information regarding St. Mark's financial matters. As you look at the most recent information available to share, please keep in mind that this reflects our finances as of the end of June. We know it is August, but each month closes about the middle of the next month. Closing involves three things: all giving from online and in person from the last Sunday of the month received, all bills having been paid for the month, and the bank statement received and transactions reconciled to the account. So June was closed in mid-July. Since the monthly newsletter must be assembled and mailed out before the beginning of the next month (August, in this case), the results in each newsletter reflect the finances about six-weeks ago. This is the best we can do in providing accurate information each month.

The finances at the end of June look like this:

General Fund	\$256,939		
Actual Expenses	\$461,358	Budgeted Expenses	\$551,154
Actual Income	\$442,063	Anticipated Income	\$550,344

The good news is that we continue to spend less than we budgeted for 2022. In fact, we have spent \$89,7967. The church leadership activity reduced the budget by about \$200,000 at the beginning of the year and our budgeted expenses reflects this. Further, the church staff and mission areas have proactively worked to reduce spending where possible these uncertain economic times - and will continue to do so where possible as the year continues.

The challenge is that we anticipated receiving about \$542,969 and we have only received \$442,063. This means we were short \$108,281. The actual figures for our income reflect the giving of the church through half the year. Obviously, we understand the current rise in inflation often causes some persons to give less. We are still seeking to understand what else may be involved.

The numbers that are important to compare are what we actually spend and what we actually receive. As one can see, we have spent about \$19,295 more through half the year than we have received. This reflects several factors. Expenses vary from month to month in the life of the church (as does the offering). For example, some months can have three pay periods (the typical month has two). We paid the second quarter of our Sending Forth expenses (this is the fund that comes from ten percent of the offering we receive for the year and goes toward mission projects in Greenwood to around the world). Lastly June had Vacation Bible School expenses (a large ministry that reached almost 400 children and reflects those kind of expenses). It is not surprising in this one month we spent more than we received in offering during this difficult time.

The most important factor St. Mark's finances are not the numbers. It's the people. It is us as a church being faithful in giving to the Lord as we are able. We pray and trust the Lord will provide for the financial needs of our church families - your home and everyone else's. We pray in turn we will respond in giving as we are blessed and cared for. Every gift can make a difference. It is never what one person or family does but we can do together.



“And Simon and his companions hunted for him. When they found him, they said to him, ‘Everyone is searching for you.’ He answered, ‘Let us go on to the neighboring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do.’ And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.” (Mark 1:37-39)

Greetings St. Mark!

I recently had the opportunity to revisit the story of the Tortoise and the Hare. The story was still the same. The Tortoise and the Hare race and the Tortoise wins the race proving “the faster runner is not always the one who wins the race.” (*The Tortoise and the Hare adapted by Teresa Mlawer & Illustrated by Olga Cuellar*). However, for me this reading hit differently as I found myself focused on the Hare's unrelenting pace after realizing the tortoise had passed him. A pace that caused him to collapse on the ground inches away from the finish line. Why did the Hare have to move at this unrelenting pace? Maybe, it's because he stopped and took two naps and, in the process, he was passed by. Or maybe he forgot to stay focused on the finish line.

Have you ever been the Hare? I have. I have been the one who loses focus, especially when many things are trying to grab my attention. Things like family, friends, work, and school. And to try and keep up with these demands, we feel that we need to keep an unrelenting pace only to fall just short on all fronts. So, what do we do? In Mark's Gospel, when the disciples begin moving at an unrelenting pace, becoming so focused on bringing “all who were sick or possessed with demons” (Mark 1:32) to Jesus, they lose sight of Jesus who has gone to pray and connect with God. The disciples desperately search for Jesus. Once the disciples find Jesus, they are taught slow and steady wins the race. Our family and friends, work and school are all important and it is good that we want to give our undivided attention to them. But our self-care is also important. Church, if we do not take care ourselves, we run the risk of losing sight of Jesus. Let's be slow and steady.

In this season of transition. As summer winds down, school begins, and we begin holiday event planning take time to connect with Jesus. Pray, spend time in God's word and God's world. Let the God of rest and healing work within so that you go and be the hands and feet of Christ. For that this is what we are called to do,



AUGUST PREACHING SCHEDULE

We follow the Church Calendar as way of remembering and celebrating our life with Christ. It starts with Advent, the season of preparation for Christ's coming. It ends with Christ the King Sunday, as we look forward to the time when He is recognized as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. The Sundays in August are known as part of the Sundays after Pentecost. The Spirit of God has come - God with us - and so we live our lives in knowledge that we are not alone. Our Heavenly Father is with us, the risen Christ with us, because the Holy Spirit is with us.


