Jason's Journal

"The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: He leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul: He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; Thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: Thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: And I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever." Psalm 23

Out of all 150 Psalms, Psalm 23 is likely one of the most familiar to Christians, and even non-Christians. Psalm 23 is usually read aloud during funeral services as this psalm offers hope, comfort, and peace during times of loss and grief. I share this verse with us this month as we too, St. Mark UMC, have experienced loss and grief over the last few months. I would suggest that there have been trying times and even times of trauma. There are people we have worshipped with, attended Sunday school with, and done life with that decided they could no longer be a part of a United Methodist Church. We feel the loss, the hurt, and the grief. While grief is difficult, I believe grief is also a gift from God; as grief leads to healing. I also believe the only way to get through grief is to go through the stages of grief so that healing can occur.

Yet, over the past few weeks I have been meditating on portions of this psalm. I have been attentive to the truth, "The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want." God is the One leading us, St. Mark, and we are called to follow God's leading in all things and in all our ways. It is God who will lead us through this life, whether it be green pastures or still waters - the times of ease and refreshment. It is God who will restore our souls and bring healing to our lives and the church. As well, it is also God who will lead us in our trying and traumatic times, those that seem like the shadow of the valley of death. The NRSV translates verse 4 this way: Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff they comfort me. Although I have read this verse more times than I can count, I heard something new in verse 4. We walk through the darkest valley, with God leading us, we do not stay there because God does not intend to leave us there. We are only walking through the dark valley.

St. Mark UMC, since our founding in 1965 we have experienced and walked through various dark valleys; yet we remain a strong and vital church because of our faith in God's leading us. God has never failed us and God never will. We are a church that trusts in God's leading as our Shepherd, we are empowered by the Holy Spirit, and we are committed to the way of Jesus. While we have experienced grief together, let us be reminded that God will not waste this pain. Let us be reminded we are only walking through the dark valley, God does not intend for His people to stay there. Healing is on the way and God will bring the healing we need.

Hello St. Mark Family!

As we walk into another month together, I've been thinking on what it means to be Christ in our community. More than just gathering on Sundays, we are called to live out the love, grace, mercy, acceptance, and hope of Jesus every day. Our faith is not confined to the walls of St. Mark—it's alive and active wherever we go. We have a calling, a holy responsibility, to be His hands and feet in the world around us. Incorporating wisdom from the Acuffs' book, we're bringing students a series aimed at helping them tap into the superpower of mindset. We'll cover topics from repeated negative thoughts to the experience of temporary feelings. Every week will help high schoolers discover just how much the way they think, impacts the life they live. Thankfully, God cares deeply about our thoughts, so each week we'll look to Scripture to help us choose mindsets that align with the full life we were created to live. By the end of this series, students will have discovered that mindset is a superpower we can all use.

We will continue the month with a new series, Start the Party. Have you ever noticed how some people seem to be living more life than others? Well, put simply, some people know how to start the party better than others. The kind of party we're talking about is one that interrupts your routine, helps you celebrate the value of others, and adds a better perspective to your life. See, Jesus was great at these kinds of parties. From weddings to dinner parties, He had a way of leveraging the energy of a good party to remind all of us of what mattered most. Over the course of these eleven weeks, teenagers will be challenged to see ordinary moments as extraordinary opportunities to bring more life, more joy, more hope, and more energy to their own lives and the world around them. From practically serving other people to fostering a personal vision for a better world, all summer long through stories from Scripture and on-the-ground highlights from story tellers around the globe, teenagers will be inspired to be people who make life a party.
