"The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought them out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice."

John 10:3-4

Lately, I have been thinking and me thinking has at times been a dangerous thing. Here is what I have been thinking. There are a lot of voices in this world calling out our names and seeking our undivided attention. We can hear voices of fear and hopelessness when we listen to or watch the news. In the news we continually hear of violence, war, natural disasters, the presence of evil, hatred, division, and the list never ends. We hear voices calling for our allegiance through the "promises" of politics and politicians. We hear the voices of uncertainty with a doctor's diagnosis. We think about our lives with all of our sins, struggles, and failures and possibly hear the voice of *you will never measure up or be good enough*. I could go on and on, but I think you may get my point. There are voices all around us calling out our names for our attention and focus. For me, there seem to be so many voices it all sounds like a bunch of noise; and I feel like the Grinch on the Grinch Who Stole Christmas when he shouted out, "Noise, noise, noise!" Have you ever felt that way?

With all of the voices calling out our names and seeking our attention, if we are not careful and begin to listen to those voices we have the great potential to miss the most important voice we need to hear and listen to - the voice of Jesus. The two verses of Scripture I have listed above from John's Gospel are in the section of Jesus calling himself The Good Shepherd. In the entire section of this discourse, I am reminded that listening to the voice of Jesus above all other voices will lead to life, because with Jesus as my Shepherd, I have a Shepherd who will guide, love, protect, and never leave me. However, if we listen to the voice of the 'hired hand' or the stranger (voices we hear in the world around us) then we will be led to destruction, as we will be led without a shepherd and left alone in our greatest times of need.

In our lives, what voices are we listening to? Are we trying to listen to the voice of Jesus and the voices of the world? If so, that will not work because the voice of Jesus and voices of the world always collide and are in conflict. When we are listening to all the voices around us, if it is not the way of Jesus that we can read of in the Gospels, then that is a voice we need to turn a deaf ear to.

Finally, I am reminded of an older song by the Christian band, *Casting Crowns*. The song is entitled, *The Voice of Truth*. I will leave you with the lyrics of the chorus of the song which says: *But the voice of truth tells me a different story, the voice of truth says 'Do not be afraid!' And the voice of truth says, 'This is for my glory'. Out of all the voices calling out to me, I will choose to listen and believe the voice of truth.*

I would encourage us all to listen to this older song, it is a good reminder to make sure we are listening to the right voices.

Hello St. Mark Family!

"Be still, and know that I am God." Psalm 46:10 (The Voice)

August is a strange month, isn't it? It still feels like summer, but school supplies are already on the shelves, fall sports practices are starting, and our calendars are beginning to fill up again. It's the in-between season. We're holding on to summer while preparing for what's next. And that makes August the perfect time to *reset our rhythm*.

Let's be honest: Summer has a way of throwing off our routines. Bedtimes get later, schedules are looser, travel keeps us busy, and even our spiritual habits can take a backseat. That's not a guilt trip, it's just reality. But now, as a new season approaches, we're invited to slow down, take a breath, and realign our lives around what matters

most.

Psalm 46:10 says, *"Be still, and know that I am God."* That's more than a nice verse for a coffee mug; it's an invitation to *pause*. To *breathe*. To *remember* that God is God and we are not. When life speeds up, and it will, being still is how we keep our soul in sync with the Spirit.

May your heart find rest, your calendar find balance, and your spirit find renewal as we walk into this next season together, one step at a time, in rhythm with Jesus.

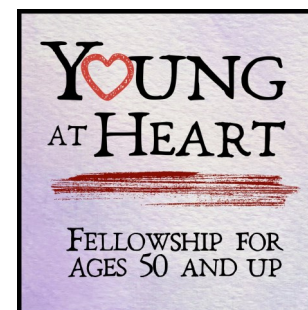

WHAT CAN YOU EXPECT FROM OUR STUDENT MINISTRY?

EPIC is an acronym for Endless Possibilities in Christ. We are using the same curriculum at EPIC Sunday Nights that we have used since 2009. The curriculum addresses each student's need to be closer to God and to fervently follow Him. Items needed at the Food Bank:
Canned tuna, chicken, or salmon, Peanut butter and jelly, Meals in a can (chunky soups, stew, chili), Canned fruits in its own juice or water, Canned food with pop-top lids, Dried beans (pinto, blackeyed, kidney, lima, etc), Pasta (including whole grain), Rice (brown, white, yellow), Low-sugar whole grain cereals, Grits and Oatmeal (bag or box), Powder or shelf-stable milk, Bottled water and fruit drinks,

Healthy snacks (granola bars, nuts, dried fruit).

St. Mark has been providing weekend meal bags for Dist. 50 school children for 14+ years. During that time, the program has grown from 16 children the first year to 147 children last year. We have been blessed to have Harris Baptist, Tabernacle Baptist, Laurel Baptist, and Greenwood ARP churches assist us in getting needed food into the hands of children who might otherwise have little or nothing to eat over the weekend.

Each bag contains:

- 3 protein sources (the weekend has 5 main meals)
- 2 breakfast items
- 1 cup of fruit and 1 of pudding
- 3 snacks
- 2 drinks
- a spoon and napkins

Each bag costs about \$11 (depending on how many items we find on sale.) That is a total cost of about \$1,617 each week for this mission. I get many questions, and I want to answer two of the questions I get asked most frequently.

1st) Why don't you use store brand/generic products instead of name brand? We have to be extremely careful not to send out any products that might contain nuts.... I don't know why, but most store or generic brands have warnings on the packing saying that the product may contain nuts or that they may have been produced in a factory that might produce products containing nuts.

2nd) How can you be sure that the bags go to the children in need and not someone else? We can't be sure, but it is not our job to know where these bags go; our only job is to answer the charge that Jesus gave us to take care of the least of these.

SO NOW: HOW CAN YOU HELP!

1st) By your prayers. (If you are unable to do anything else, you can pray for the children, their situations, the volunteers and their safety in delivering the bags, etc.)

2nd) By your service (anyone who wants to watch the operation or volunteer is welcome on Monday mornings around 8:00)

3rd) And of course, by your gifts; whether you give a small or large donation, or give one in honor or memory of someone, they are all greatly appreciated. **BUT REMEMBER**, you were asked to support the church with your tithes and offerings. Tithes are a percentage of your giving, and your offerings are the extras you want to share.
