THE WITNESS



The Sundays of Easter have concluded. The Day of Pentecost has come. We have entered ordinary time or what is otherwise called the "green season" — a time for living out the Christian faith in ordinary life. The time after Pentecost is also a time, typically, when parish life slows down for the summer months. For us as Michiganders it means weekends at the cottage, baseball games at Tigers stadium, and Sunday barbecue with the family. Indeed, there is a certain pattern to parish life that ebbs and flows according to the church calendar. Summer is the time for sabbath, the time for rest, the time for joy with family and friends.

While we may take time away from church in the summer months for the purpose of vacation, family gatherings, or other weekend events, there are several things we can do to nurture our spiritual life in this season of the church year. When we do travel on vacation in the United States or abroad it is a wonderful opportunity for us to seek out a parish and to pray with fellow Episcopalians or fellow Anglicans within the worldwide Anglican Communion.

When I visited Israel in 2020, one of the opportunities I experienced was the chance to attend service at St. George's Cathedral. It just so happened that when I visited, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, along with the Anglican Bishop of Jerusalem, Suheil S. Dasani, also happened to be in attendance. And when I visited Dominica, I worshiped in an Anglican parish in Portsmouth, a parish located within the Anglican Diocese of Northeast Caribbean. During the service I experienced our prayer book tradition in a new key as both similarity and difference became manifest in the Anglican liturgy. continued on page 4)

As always a wonderful event to kick off the summer and enjoy fellowship with our parish family. Bring a friend or friends to have fun along with us.


A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRIEST (CONTINUED FROM PG. 1)

Rise Against Hunger Spring Event with Troy High School Students!

An important goal the Vestry set this year is to reach out and engage in our community. One of the initiatives they decided on was to host a Rise Against Hunger event and invite the local youth to come and participate. Linda Pierce reached out to the Troy High School and 45 Troy teens have signed up to help package 10,000 meals. The event will be held at St. Stephen's on Saturday, May 25th from 10am till about 2pm including a pizza lunch.

The event is being funded through a grant from the St. Stephen's Endowment Fund. We would like to have about fifteen St. Stephen's members come to help organize and help work with the teams during the event. There is a sign-up sheet in the gathering area.

In case you didn't know, Rise Against Hunger is an international hunger relief organization that is growing a global movement to end hunger by nourishing lives, empowering communities, and responding to emergencies. They work with groups like ours to package nutritious meals that are then distributed to partners in need all around the globe. Rise Against Hunger work with international partners to create sustainable solutions to hunger and to equip them with agriculture training, business skills, and more, helping them to create and sustain food in their own communities.

We have set the date for our annual Rise against Hunger Outreach event! It is **September 21**, **2024**.





FROM THE KITCHEN OF ST. STEPHEN'S COOKBOOK 1985

PORK 'N BEANS BY DENISE POPE

1 lg can Pork n' Beans

1 small can Pork n' Beans

1 can butter beans

1 can kidney beans

1/2 to 1lb hamburger

Onions and celery chopped

1/2 lb bacon

1/2 to 1 c catsup

1/2 c white sugar

1/2 to 1 c brown sugar

Mix all beans, sugar and catsup together. Brown the hamburger, bacon, onions and celery together. Add two mixtures together and bake at 350 for 1 hour. (pg 188) Then bring to the parish picnic on June 9th!

FROM A COLLEAGUE AT ST. JOSEPH SCHOOL)


1 pkg frozen peas (unthawed)

1 can Spanish peanuts

1 cup MIRACLE WHIP

That is it! I usually double the recipe and you want about the same amount of peas to peanuts or a little less of the peanuts

than the peas. I usually mix in the Miracle Whip a spoonful at a time until coated. Some people add cooked bacon bits. I do if I have them. You cannot use mayonnaise. The peas thaw by themselves after being mixed so don't thaw. I make it in the AM to serve in the PM, but not overnight.

Love the Church—Receive the Spirit




