Hurricane Preparedness is a Year-Round Commitment

While we hope for a calm season, living in Hawai'i means being prepared for hurricanes and other severe weather. Taking a few proactive steps can make a significant difference.

Create an emergency kit:

Stock up on non-perishable food, water (for 14 days), medications, flashlights, batteries, and a portable phone charger.

What to do when there is a warning?

Secure loose items: stack and tie up outdoor furniture, bring potted plants, or other loose items from your lanai indoors to prevent them from becoming airborne in high winds.

Protect your windows: If you don't have hurricane shutters, have either plywood cut and ready to cover your glass doors/windows, or tape your windows across.

Fire Safety



Fire Safety is Everyone's Responsibility!

A small fire can quickly become a major disaster in a multiunit building. Please follow these essential safety guidelines:

Watch your food by cooking, never leave the pot unattended on the stove.

Test smoke alarms: Check the batteries in your in-unit smoke detectors regularly according the manufacturer instructions.

Do not overload your electrical outlets, and avoid using broken electrical cords.

Never obstruct fire lanes, walkways, stairwells, or doorways with personal items. By an emergency, every second counts to save lives.

Keeping Our View Clear

A friendly reminder to all residents to please take a moment to clean your jalousie windows and tracks from time to time. Regular cleaning helps keep our building looking its best, preserves the window mechanisms, and ensures everyone can enjoy a sparkling, clear view. Regular maintenance is key to their longevity. Allowing dirt and grime to build up can damage the window seals and mechanisms over time, leading to costly repairs. A little cleaning now can prevent bigger issues down the road.
