Always Choose Great!

I came into AA on a recommendation from my lawyer. I was going through a divorce and willing to do anything for joint custody of my children. At my first meeting, although I didn't speak other than to introduce myself, I found comfort, understanding, fellowship, and a new routine. I continued with this routine and settled in. I began to feel comfortable, and things got better. I could chair a meeting, volunteer at a unity dinner or picnic, or do some readings. These actions from the outside would "in my mind" make me look like a good guy and someone who was involved. The fact was, I really wasn't, yet things were going along okay.

At about six years sober, a very good friend of mine asked me, "How are you going with your recovery?" I responded, "I am good, I'm sober, everything is good." After all, that is the purpose of AA, isn't it? To be sober? My friend looked at me and asked, "What is the biggest obstacle to greatness?" I had no response. He said, "The biggest obstacle to greatness is being content with good." And that's what I had been, content. I immediately thought of myself as a young boy. I was naturally a good little baseball player – but I wanted to be great, make the all-star team, and play varsity when I got to high school. So, I worked at it, did drills, played pick-up games, threw a rubber ball against a wall, etc. If I could do that for baseball as a kid, why didn't I have that same commitment for something that would change my entire life?

A few days later, I was chairing the men's meeting (you know, because it was easy) and when I introduced my speaker, Matt, he called me out then and there. He said that when I introduced myself, it seemed like I still didn't think I was an alcoholic. I hadn't done step one! He spoke that night about the Doctor's Opinion and I finally got it. I have an allergy. Nothing good, nothing bad – just an allergy. And then just a few days later at my Saturday "By the Book" meeting, I chaired and read from page 42. It said, "and it meant I would have to throw several lifelong conceptions out the window. And that was not easy." For the first time I realized I couldn't keep doing this my way. I would need to turn it over. I am not in control.

I then decided to do something every day to better my recovery – read from the Big Book, get a sponsor, work the steps, do service work, and attend step workshops. I had been sober for six years, <u>but this is when my sobriety changed into my recovery</u>. As I started doing these things, my life in almost every aspect got better. I will never achieve great, but it is fun and rewarding to work for it. When life gives you good or the opportunity to work for great – <u>always choose great</u>. I don't think you will be disappointed. – Mark P



- 2. Can I honestly share my own personal experience concerning any of those without giving the impression I am stating the "AA opinion"?
- 3. What in AA history gave rise to our Tenth Tradition?
- 4. Have I had a similar experience in my own AA life?
- 5. What would AA be without this Tradition? Where would I be?
- 6. Do I breach this or any of its supporting Traditions in subtle, perhaps unconscious, ways?
- 7. How can I manifest the spirit of this Tradition in my personal life outside AA? Inside AA?
