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Setting Up For Spring

Maybe you're embarking on an adventure across the globe to learn about the beauty of the foreign landscapes?

Are you a professional studio photographer looking to offer your clients more?

Start thinking about the size of your ideal camera and how much gear you're willing to lug around and that will help narrow down your options a little.

Once you've established the purpose of your camera and the size of your kit, there are three core factors that can really help lead you in the right direction.

- lifestyle,
- expectations
- budget.

No two people are alike: every person has different expectations and budgets for fulfilling personal photography wants and needs. All of these options help customize your camera to best suit you and give you the best results today and well into the future.

Lifestyle reflects on the "how" and "where" you take your photos and videos.

If you're adventurous, perhaps you want something weather-sealed that doesn't weigh a ton.

If you have Children, think about a shockproof camera.

If you're into video, consider the different types of stabilization, lens selection and ability to add accessories like a high-quality microphone or a continuous LED panel.

There is no "one-size-fits-all" cameras, , there are many to choose from

Budget. You may have a set number in your mind, but are you leaving room for things like memory cards, filters, cases, and a service plan. These are worth considering, as they contribute to your overall experience of owning the camera and getting the best value from it.

Technology is ever-changing, establish a budget for future expansion—allowing room to grow with your camera.

Spring Photography Ideas

It's warming up, the suns coming out and the flowers are in full bloom. It must be spring and there's no better time to get out there with your camera and do some spring photography.

You'll be shown some classic spring photography as well as some ideas you may not have thought of. The kind of insight you only get when you've been doing spring photography for years! I'll also be giving you my tips and sharing the best settings for photographing spring.

A lovely part of spring is seeing all the bluebells starting to appear, so why not get out and photograph them. A great technique here is to have one sharp bluebell with blurry ones in the foreground as well as the background. This will help highlight the beauty of this flower whilst surrounding it with blurry purples and greens.

To get a shallow Depth of field simply zoom in as far as your lens will go and put your aperture on its widest setting.

If you've got a lens that goes to f2.8, great but if not an aperture of f4 or f5.6 will work fine with a higher focal

Bring Spring Inside

Why not set up your own still life photography inside. Very simple idea this one. Bring some flowers inside, arrange them and photograph them. A good tip here is to make the look bright and airy. Have lots of soft light and using the colour white as a backdrop is always a winner.

Composition is important in every photograph but when walking in the woods in spring, one thing you find is lots of fallen branches and logs. This gives a fantastic opportunity to use these logs as foreground interest to lead your eye through the frame.

Find the details

Spring is bursting with life so let's find that life, focus on it and show it using photography. This could be seed pods, insects, flowers or whatever takes your fancy. The typical technique here is to have a shallow depth of field

zoom in, have a wide aperture and set a fast shutter speed. Setting a fast shutter speed will help avoid camera shake. If you're shooting in bright light you shouldn't have any problems here with using your aperture priority mode but if you're in a low light setting you will have to use a tripod and adjust your ISO to compensate for the lack of light.

Wide angle Spring Scenes

Take a walk outside the forest to see the spring landscape in all its glory. This could be a field of spring flowers, looking back at blooming trees. This technique is different to the shallow depth of field look normally used. You need a long depth of field which is created by using a small aperture f16. Also, a wide-angle lens 24mm on a full-frame camera. f2.8 - 1/3200th second - ISO 100

Get the drone out!

Most people don't have drones but if you do it gives a fantastic perspective on spring. Up in the air with a bird's eye view of spring. Having that elevation above the trees or looking down on fields adds something new to your photography.

Waterfalls Photography

Nothing gives more of an instant impact in imagery than feeling like you're about to get drenched by a wave or waterfall! Effective waterfall photography composition will require you to get in the water, get low, and try to time your exposures to capture flow of water being kicked up and redirected by a rock or log.

Photograph Wildflowers

April showers bring flowers, a wet winter and spring will produce extraordinary conditions for wildflower photography. When the dreary winter months begin to break, set out and find some wild flowers.

Flowers up close and personal can be great. Natural foreground elements, and the array of colors can produce compelling spring photography compositions.

Wildflowers in spring also present you with a great time to work on techniques like focus
