Cold weather outside the window does not mean that you should put away your camera and stay indoors! The winter season offers great opportunities for creating cool pictures. Put on your warm clothes and try these tried and tested winter photo ideas for any level without expensive photo equipment.

How to Prepare for Winter Photography

You have to prepare for cold weather if you are interested in winter photography. Dressing properly often means wearing warm clothing taking a hot beverage in a thermos is a great way to stay warm, especially if you're shooting from one spot. But staying warm is just the foundation of every other tip for outdoor photography ideas in winter.

Take Macro Photos to Capture the Beauty of winter

To inspire yourself, start a project that focuses on the beauty of winter. One of the best ways to do that is to photograph snowflakes and frost.

Frost can be found anywhere and always looks stunning. Combining frost and natural sunlight can result in breathtaking photographs.

This challenge will help you find beauty in simple places. And hopefully, cheer you up on a gloomy day!

Take Creative Photos of Snow Falling to Make Playful Images

Falling snow is often used in winter photography. This idea is perfect for having fun and improving your action photography skills at the same time.

You can capture the snowfall itself. But it's even better to combine it with a portrait photography session.

Your aim is to take sharp photos of falling snow and make your model stand out. To make this process easier, take photos using burst mode. Burst mode allows photographers to take multiple photos while holding the shutter.

You can also play with shutter speed to slightly blur the falling snow.

You can use this technique to take adorable and funny photos of people enjoying winter.

Falling snow is not an obstacle on the contrary, it's one of the best winter photo shoot ideas.

To get an excellent photo, you need to consider

- do not use the flash. Snowflakes are tiny crystals, so a haphazard reflection of light in all directions is guaranteed.
- , the shutter speed is of great importance, because it depends on how exactly the falling snow is displayed in the picture – whether it is a slow fall (short shutter speed) or a dynamic flight (long shutter speed).

Blowing Snow

One of the most popular winter photo ideas is to take a handful of snow in the palms and blow on it. Sparkling snow dust is beautiful and unusual. Shoot close-up, the background in the picture should be slightly blurred, so open the aperture wider.

Photograph Icicles

Look around, find an icicle and take a shot until they melt away. The picture will be atmospheric, elegant and gentle.

Freeze Soap Bubbles

Among other creative winter photoshoot ideas is blowing bubbles. Is it frosty outside? Then it's time to go to the snowy yard and blow soap bubbles on flowers, bushes and branches. The camera can capture these tender ice masterpieces best when it is sunny.

When it's very cold outside, you can blow some bubbles and create magic! All you need is soap bubbles, a macro lens, and good lighting.

Soap bubbles can be difficult to work with, especially if it's windy outside. It's best to take bubble photos when the weather is calm.

Blow the bubbles in a location where they can land gently. On Branches, flowers, and bushes

. For the best lighting results, shoot when the sun is high in the sky. Photos like this make winter photography more than just a challenging genre. If you're lucky, your bubbles will end up getting covered in frost. This will make it seem like you captured snowflakes in a drop of water.

Crystal Ball

Winter is a very fruitful time for photographers if you know what props to use. Landscape photos with crystal ball can make another inspiring subject for a winter photoshoot idea. Place the ball on the ground and hold it in your hands to add a human touch to a photo. Don't forget to flip the image inside the ball, as it's going to be upside down.

Create Bokeh

Bokeh images are rich in beauty and magic. They give us an opportunity to implement winter picture ideas more creatively. Ideally, use a high-speed lens and a tripod. To transfer beautiful shades of lights, you need to shoot in low light conditions, which means setting long shutter speed. It is better to use manual focus to select the desired object. Also, think about buying a set of bokeh shapes or making your own ones from black paper.

Activities

Building a Snowman

Building a snowman. Snowman can be decorated with a scarf, a traditional carrot, patterned mittens. Take a photo of the process of its creation, and then take a picture with the result of your work. Pose near the snowman, hug—a *great outdoor winter family photoshoot ideas*.

Skating Rink

One of the best winter photoshoot ideas is games and entertainment on the background of snowy nature. Shoot skating on the city rink and you will get atmospheric and even romantic portraits with happy faces that capture sincere emotions and joy.

Snow Fight

A snowball fight is a good photoshoot idea. You will capture the cheerful emotions of your clients that will remind them of their childhood. Don't forget to increase your shutter speed to get clear and detailed shots.

Logs

Wood logs are a wonderful background for winter shots. Ask your clients to sit on them or just stand in front of them.

Sleigh Ride

Fun skiing or sledding opens a lot of snow photography ideas for shooters. It is a great opportunity to capture the happiness of the moment, the expression of a child while moving down a high hill. The photos, with a group of people, will turn out spectacular and emotional. For family shooting, mom and dad and the the children on a sled riding together.

Making Snow Angels

Find a nice place in the park or forest and ask children to make an angel on snow. That's a typical pose but it always works. Take these pictures from a distance

Bedtime Stories

Ask the children to gather together and read some Christmas stories. You can come up with cute winter photoshoot ideas and capture the moment to get a nice photo, rendering the atmosphere of holidays and fairy-tale.

Landscapes

Capture Snowy Landscapes

Winter is one of the best seasons for landscape photography because everything looks unusual and mysterious. There are plenty of winter photoshoot ideas in the landscape. With proper exposure reflected light from the snow will add a unique charm to your picture.

The winter snow makes everything look different. Go for a walk in a forest with your camera and capture the beauty of this season.

Prepare for the cold weather, keep moving, a small hike can be a great activity. You can shoot to enhance the golden lights. But this is not the only way to go. When it comes to winter photos, you might be tempted to make them as warm as possible to make up for the lack of colours. But what if you did the exact opposite for a change? Make your cold winter photos even colder. Adjust your camera's white balance. Experiment with different cool tones.

This exercise will help you think outside the box and encourage you to break the rules sometimes.

Capture the moment sitting near a window in a cozy warm room and viewing amazing winter landscape. You don't have to leave your room to render the snowy atmosphere.

Wildlife

Wildlife Photography

One of the best snow photography ideas is to shoot wildlife photography. You can excel in [wild life photography](#) by photographing forest-dwellers or birds, such as beautiful woodpeckers and squirrels. During the winter, many animals and birds need food, which makes them more timid. Allowing you to come closer and to make wonderful shots. *Note that it is better to shoot birds in the winter forest using a long-focus telephoto lens.*

Winter might not be the most ideal time for sitting outside for hours while waiting for a wild animal to pass by. But snow-covered environments can give a great backdrop to the animals you spot.

If you don't want to wander in the cold winter weather, you can attract animals to your garden or window. Place food for birds in a feeder and they will come to you. You can start feeding them when the first frost comes. Then continue it until spring. If they get used to a place where they can find food, they are going to come back regularly.

You'll have tons of opportunities to shoot wildlife from the comfort of your living room. Winter is ideal for bird photo shoots because of its perfectly white tones. This makes it the perfect background for simple yet eye-catching photos.

Since winter photography usually consists of dull colours, things can blend together in an unflattering way. This might take attention away from your subject. To blur outback ground distractions, use a large aperture like f/1.4.

Portraits

Cozy Day In

In winter, you want to wrap yourself in a large warm blanket, put on a knitted wool sweater and socks, drink hot chocolate or coffee while watching the dancing fire in the fireplace. These things are the perfect setting for indoor winter shoot

.Bring these perfect winter photography ideas to life and capture the moment of your relaxing day at home.

Wrapped in a Blanket

Another great idea for photography is shooting in a snowy forest with blankets, beautifully knitted dresses, sweaters, hats and other winter attributes. Take blankets, thermoses with hot drinks and, of course, your love.

Shoot in Cozy Outfits

For this idea of a photoshoot in winter outfits, you will need scarves, mittens, soft ear muffs. To help create a warm portrait. Snow is a good natural light diffuser.

High Contrast Portraits

Capturing Water

Create a Contrast with autumn and spring to enhance the Power of Winter

You can find frozen leaves in winter displaying the remains of autumn. They are only beautiful and they make a nice contrast with the previous season.

The first signs of spring, such as little flowers growing from the snow-covered land can also enhance the contrast between the two seasons.

These unique contrasts can remind the viewer of the essence of winter. It can freeze the world in a beautiful way, but it doesn't only mean death. Beautiful things can grow after. Look for these small signs and tell stories of nature and the circle of life by capturing them.

Buildings

Photograph City Lights

The city in winter is interesting for shooting and offers a lot of winter photo ideas:

- the leaves of the trees do not obstruct the beautiful buildings,
- the snow acts as a reflector, highlighting the shadows.
- Especially spectacular are the photos taken in the evening, when the snow is illuminated by lanterns and car headlights.
- Take photos at night with a manual focus to get high-quality shots.

Tree Farm

Another good moment to capture is a family trip to a tree farm before Christmas and New Year.

Take a shot that will render the atmosphere of holidays, family joy and happiness.

Old Bridge

The photoshoot on the bridge, especially using the “leading lines” technique, always turns out to be creative and interesting. A Christmas family shot on a snowy bridge is part of winter photoshoot ideas that help render the holiday atmosphere.

Focus on the Connection between Buildings and Snow

The coldness of winter puts a spotlight on things we might overlook at other times of the year. For example, it's impossible not to notice a vibrant light in a colourless, snowy scene.

If you're a fan of [architecture](#), you can make your subjects stand out even more with the help of snow. You can use all the negative space to lead a viewer's eyes to a building. You can even emphasize shapes that aren't that noticeable when they're surrounded by trees, a blue sky, and a busy street.

[Architectural photography](#) is usually not connected to winter photography by trying it, you'll realize how different buildings look at this time of the year.

Special Shots

Capture Sunsets or Sunrises

Going for a walk with a dog or for a morning jog, take your camera with you. Sunsets and sunrises in the winter are beautiful, the sky is painted in bright red and pink tones. This time of the day offers you plenty of winter photoshoot ideas.

Remember that in this situation, you need to take pictures quickly since in just a few minutes the sky can become pale, and the wind will disperse the clouds.

As with everything in this season, winter sunrises are magical. Look at the weather forecast to choose a sunny day.

Morning light is normally colder than the light of a sunset. And it looks mesmerizing reflecting off of the snow.

The best combination is morning fog with the first signs of a sunny day. The first rays will brighten the scene and make the mist look like it's glowing.

You don't necessarily need a snowy landscape to create stunning sunrise photos. Any kind of winter weather is worth a shot.

One of the best ways to take stunning winter photos is to create contrast. If possible, use a vibrant sunset or sunrise to create outstanding photos of nature.

The dramatic difference between warm and cool tones will make your photos look striking and atmospheric. This is ideal for landscape photographers who want to capture the gritty and vulnerable sides of winter.

During the blue hour in winter, you will find the perfect contrast with the white of the snow. The sky is lighter than the landscape itself. The dark blue sky of the blue hour is going to make a contrast with the snow.

Use Food Photography to Capture the Winter Mood

Winter is the perfect time to stay in and cook something delicious slow down and take time for food photography. *You don't have to leave your house*

There are Christmas foods and winter beverages. That you can almost smell them by looking at their images.

Shooting in the winter at night is interesting and unusual. Night sky in combination with a snowy landscape can create a magical atmosphere. All you need to bring the boldest night snow photography ideas to life is a tripod, a lens and a good external flash.

Capture New Year Fireworks

Do you like bright and dynamic pictures of fireworks?

New Year's Eve is the perfect time to take these shots. All you need to make winter photography ideas work is a tripod, and a nice place and right settings.

Fireworks are usually quickly over, so there won't be a second chance to get the settings right.

Aerial Shots

To take photos from a height is one of the most creative snow picture ideas on this list. Winter creates landscapes that are impossible for other seasons.

Blizzard turns the forest into a shining, brilliant kingdom. These stunning scenes can be captured by drones. When flying in winter, you need to carefully monitor the battery charge. Note that the operating temperature of most drones is from 0°C to 40°C.

Imitation Snow

For the newborn photo session, you can use some imitation snow. Ask parents to put nice Christmas clothes on the baby, such as fluffy pants or red Christmas hat, add imitation snow and take a shot. *Cute photos are guaranteed.*

All the reds and greens are a breath of fresh air during this season.
Even if you're not a fan of shooting in cold winter conditions, you'll love taking Christmas-themed photos

Christmas-themed flat lays are a great way to highlight the best parts of winter photography.

You can photograph your favorite objects like cups or tree decorations from a bird's eye view.

Shoot from the side using a shallow depth of field. Blurred lights in the background bring warmth even in cold weather.

To make this idea as fun as possible, take photos of the things you love about Christmas.

You can capture a handmade decoration or a childhood memory shooting the Christmas table setting is another way to get stunning images.

Once the photos are ready, you can turn them into album photos. You and your family will treasure them for years to come. You can even make postcards of them.

Gear

Try HDR Photography

HDR (High Dynamic Range) can bring excellent texture and quality without unnatural colours. Depending on the lighting, the snow often lacks texture. The difference between bright white tones and deep shadows sometimes can be so visible that it will not work very well. For such photos, HDR is the perfect tool to put everything in its place. It will also enhance the colours, make them more vivid and bright.

Use Your Camera Settings for Enhancing Soft Lights

Shooting in snow is challenging because a great portion of your image is going to be bright white.

A solution is to overexpose your photos in wintertime.

It means let more light into your camera. Open the aperture wider or use a slow shutter speed.

This allows for a soft effect. The gentle ambient light works well for overexposed pictures.

And it looks good in a landscape, especially when everything is covered in snow.

A fast shutter speed or a small aperture will result in dark images.

Experiment with the white balance settings of your camera.

Snowy scenes can turn out magical by modifying the colour temperature a little bit.

Using and Protecting Your Gear

how to keep your expensive photography gear safe and working when the temperature drops.

Bring Extra Batteries

Keeping a camera operating in the cold can be one of the biggest challenges when the mercury drops. Cold temperatures increase the internal resistance in a battery, limiting how much electricity it can discharge.

On a warm day, a battery can rely on all of its available power. But when it drops below freezing, you may only get 50% of the available power.

The solution is easy—carry multiple batteries!

Keep at least a couple of spares in an inside pocket where they will stay warm. When one dies, swap it out for a warm battery.

By alternating back and forth, you can extend the life of the battery. And you can keep shooting hours longer than you would otherwise be able to.

Mind Your Breath

Batteries aren't the only risk to your photo shoot during the winter. One, in particular, can ruin your day of photography. And that is your breath.

A mistimed, warm, humid, breath will condense on your lens, resulting in a layer of milky frost on the glass. It doesn't matter how much money you spend on your lenses, no amount of sharpness will make up for that kind of a blur. Wiping at it usually just smudges it more. And defrosting it inside (see below) can take hours.

Always watch where you breathe!

If you turn your camera around to check lens settings, don't exhale. You can wear a neck gaiter or balaclava that to pull up over your mouth and nose. Whichever method you choose to keep your breath off your lens, it's an important thing to always remember.

Use Your Lens Cap

Breath is the usual culprit of fogged lenses. But when shooting at night, there is always the chance that natural frost will form. To avoid fogging your lens, use your lens cap when you aren't shooting.

If you are walking from one location to another, taking a break, or searching for a new composition, put the cap back on your lens.

Go Back Inside Safely

Last, and perhaps most importantly, is the return indoors. You know how a cold drink on a hot summer day will gather condensation. Ever watch the drips form and rundown the glass, pooling in a messy ring on the table? Now imagine that happening to your camera gear. It can, and it will.

By bringing a camera indoors that you've been using in cold temperatures, the equipment will be cold. After a frigid night photographing outside, an unprotected camera will grow condensation seconds after coming inside.

This condensation can wreak havoc with the camera's electronics, and cause moisture to build up and fog in the internal workings of lenses and bodies alike. It's ugly, and it can wreck a camera.

Fortunately, it's easy to deal with. When you step back indoors to finish for the day, place your camera and lenses into an airtight bag. Zip locks are good, these are tough, reusable, and work like a charm. Once sealed up tight in a zip lock, condensation can't form on your gear. Let your camera warm up to room temperature before you pull it out of the bag.
